LABORING CLASS IN EUROPE.

In Norway the ordinary food of the peasantry is bread and gruel, both prepared of oatmeal, with an occasional mixture of dried fish. Meat is a luxury which they rarely enjoy.

In DENMARK the peasantry are still held in bondage, and are bought and sold together with the land on which they labour.

In RUSSIA the bondage of the peasantry is even more complete than it is in Denmark. The nobles own all the land in the empire, and the peasantry, who reside upon it, are transferred with the estate.

In POLAND the nobles are the proprietors of the land, and the peasants are slaves. A recent traveller says, 'I have travelled in every direction and never saw a wretched loaf to the eastward of the Rhine...

Of the people of FRANCE, seven and a half millions are not able to reap all they sow, and their bread is wheat and rye, which they live upon with potatoes, buckwheat, chestnuts and a few potatoes.

Among the laboring class of the industrious Republic, most, except on Sunday, are in a state of bondage. In HUNGARY their state is if possible still worse. The nobles own the land, do not work, and pay no taxes.
