Railroad "Tax" Suit Compromised. The following is from the Clay City Times and as we understand the conditions are very much like Carter and portions of some of her neighbors have experienced in several years back.

"Still county has compromised the famous railroad case in which the county has been in litigation with the bond holders for the past several years. In the compromise the county is to pay the bond holders \$58,650.00 The amount of these bonds is \$50,000 with interest for nearly eighteen years.

Nineteen years ago Estill county voted \$100,000 to the railroad built through that county which was then known as the Richmond, Nicholasville, Irvine & Beattyville R. R. While the terms of the proposition on which the issuance of bonds in payment of this amount was never complied with by the railroad company, it is claimed, \$50,000 worth of these bonds were issued to the railroad when the road was completed to Irvine seventeen years ago. The county officials have all along since these bonds were issued refused to provide for their payment, and the matter all the while has been in the courts which has invariably decided against the county. The face value of these bonds with interest will amount to over \$100,000. Thus it seems that the county has made a good deal in effecting a compromise for about half their face value.

Paris Goes Wet.

After the most exciting local option election ever held in the State, Paris went wet last Thursday by a majority of 282 votes, every ward in the town voting against a dry town. There was a large crowd on-lookers from surrounding towns and from the country precincts and the fight was hotly contested from start to finish. There was no disturbance and no arrests during the day. The result was a great surprise to the temperance, as they felt that they had a good chance to carry the election.

Suit was filed in the Breathitt circuit Thursday evening by Lucy Cox, Edward Cox, and Breckie Cox, heirs of the late Dr. B. D. Cox, for \$100,000 damages against James Hargis, Elbert Hargis and Ed. Callihan for the death of Dr. Cox, who was killed on the street there on the night of April 13, 1902.

Run Over By A Wagon.

Taylor Doggett, white, twenty-six years of age, while hauling timber from Mt. Sterling, accidentally fell, a heavy loaded wagon passing over him, breaking his hip, and leg below the knee and injuring him internally. He is in a critical condition.

AT THE CAPITOL, D. C.

The inquiry by the interstate commerce commission into the railroad consolidations engineered by E. Harriman was terminated on Saturday last week. The case was argued by counsel for the government and for Mr. Harriman, the counsel for the government taking the position that the Union and Southern Pacific Railroads were operated in restraint of trade; and that there has been made agreement of the most binding nature between the Oregon Short Line, a Harriman road; and the San Pedro road. According to this agreement neither road was to build in the territory of the other for a period of ninety one years, nor could either party advise another party or parties to build in the others territory, which agreement tended to show, so the attorneys of the Govt. said, that a combination existed that restrained trade within the meaning of the Sherman anti trust act. One of the remarkable parts of the plea of the Harriman attorneys was that which requested that the Harriman lines be not singled out for investigation, that the methods of other roads—the Pennsylvania and other large roads—were identical with those of the Harriman lines. To this the attorneys to the government replied that if the other lines were guilty of wrongdoing, they too, should be punished, and the fact that they had not already been punished should not put a stop to the present investigation of the Harriman lines.

Chairman Knapp, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, announced on Tuesday that the commission would file an application in the United States Circuit Court of New York for an order requiring Mr. Harriman to answer certain questions about the manipulation of railway stock just when the proceedings will begin has not yet been announced. The object of this proceed-

ing will be to determine whether the Interstate Commerce Commission has any jurisdiction over trafficking in railroad stocks under the authority to regulate commerce. Mr. Harriman refused to answer questions along this line, claiming that the commission had no jurisdiction. On the other hand, the commission says that under the law a railroad can not deal in stocks and juggle them and perform other feats which Mr. Harriman has been guilty of in the stock market. The result of this action will be far-reaching in its effects. If the claim of the commission is sustained, it may result in the discontinuance of many of the methods of higher finance indulged in by Wall street financiers which have made stock market conditions so uncertain at times. It would seem that such a decision would tend to place market conditions on a better basis, and prevent to a certain extent the inflating and depressing of stocks far above or below their intrinsic values.

AT THE CAPITOL, D. C.

If Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou succeeds in a reform he has under contemplation there will be no doubt that he will have the friendship of all the men and women who return from abroad. It is announced that he will endeavor to modify the inspection of baggage rule which have been such a sore trial to voyagers of late years.

He is convinced that no inspection of baggage should be made, but that baggage should be hauled out, pulled over and inspected at the desk. It is believed that the announcement of disapproval by Mr. Cortelyou will be followed by remedial action. Any one who has ever gone through the experience of landing in New York after a European trip will be heart a glad for such reform.

The principal topic through the homeward journey is the passenger's baggage. There is anxiety and apprehension in the air. Ninety-nine per cent of the passengers have more than their allowed one hundred dollars worth of wearing apparel and even the hardened ones dread the lie that they must tell to the customs officers who come on board and take down in writing your declaration that you are bringing home nothing dutiable.

You are not obliged to tell the lie of course, but to declare goods means that you will have to produce them at the dock where their inspected estimated and probably taxed at twice their value and that you will be subjected to interminable delays in getting away from the pier. The most conscientious people too are stimulated to falsehood and a desire to deceive in the pleasure business of asking you for a declaration and then expaining your baggage to catch you in the lie.

The practice is a contemptible and a humiliating one. Either a man's word should be taken or his trunks should be examined without a declaration on his part and it is in this particular that

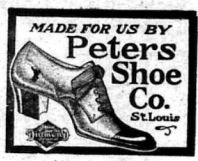

Big Import of Bananas.

During the eight months ended February 1907, \$16,086,236 worth of fruits were imported into the United States. Of this amount bananas represented 41.4 per cent. or \$6,662,254.

Reports are heard everywhere regarding the damage done to tobacco plants throughout the country by the recent severe cold weather and heavy freezes.

Number of Saloons Cut Down.

Threats of local option is reported to have caused the city council of Paducah to make legislation that so fast as a saloonkeeper quit business no more license would be granted him until the present number of 90 saloons are cut down to 60.

All the clothing and household goods of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Durham and baby also burned. There was no insurance. Application had been made but had not been acted upon. Mr. Williams formerly lived at Morehead, and was connected with the Lenora National Bank there.

Levi Oppenheimer has just returned from Cincinnati, where he had been for a few days buying a large replenishing stock.

Destroyed by Earthquake.

The city of Iloilo, Island of Panay, in the Philippine group, is reported to have been totally destroyed by \$20,000 homeless—as the result of an earthquake in Northern Luzon.
