The proposal emphasizes integration of professional education courses with actual student teaching experiences and the individual approach that allows nine different staff members to guide and support each student teacher.

This is accomplished through the teacher education professional semester which provides maximum assistance to the student teacher through a rotating 4-4-4-4 plan in which the prospective teacher spends four weeks on campus in classes and four weeks off campus doing actual student teaching.

By repeating the pattern twice, each student is assured of eight weeks on campus and eight weeks off campus during his professional semester.

During the eight weeks of on-campus experience, the student teacher participates in professional education classes that integrate on-campus laboratory experiences with off-campus practice teaching. Through such mini-courses as microteaching taken on campus and from the assistance and support offered by his team of supervisors in off-campus teaching situations, each student is guaranteed individual guidance that encourages the full development of his teaching strengths.

"We have desired to have a portrait of a bald eagle to display on the campus for a lengthy period of time," said Dr. Doran, "as Morehead athletic teams have long been identified as the Eagles. We sincerely feel that in Gene Gray we have a great talent who will provide us with a painting worthy of display as the official Morehead State University Eagle."

Gray will journey to central Florida during the first of March to spend several weeks studying the bald eagle in its natural habitat. The bald eagle, which is a national symbol used on currency, seals, and documents, is a near extinct bird enjoying total immunity from hunters and trappers. Only 250 of the species are thought to exist in the central Florida region near Ocala where Gray will be assisted by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission in his search for the bald eagle.

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Animal Graphics, Lexington, will print a limited edition of 2,000 copies for Morehead State University which are expected to be sold prior to the release date of Sept. I. The original painting will hang on the Morehead campus, while the limited edition of prints will be made available for sale to alumni, students, faculty, and friends on a "first come, first serve" basis. Parental influence in the classroom does not end with her father's class. She is taking another course from Dr. Ruth Barnes, her mother and also a professor of English at MSU.

However, Mrs. Barnes may not be considered in the rank question. She only has two doctorates.

to Westerners.

Salisbury's observations of what he calls "the rising conflict between Russia and Red China" are based upon his experience in Russia and trips in 1959, 1966 and 1967.

He was the last American reporter to visit North Vietnam with the approval of the U.S. State Department. His articles on U.S. bombing of North Vietnam were front-page features across the country in late 1966 and early 1967.

Also a war correspondent in World War II, Salisbury once was banned from Russia for articles considered critical of the Soviet system. He is the winner of a recent George Polk Memorial Award in Journalism and the author of three new books: "Orbit of China," "Behind the Lines-Hanoi" and "The 900 Days - The Siege of Leningrad."

Thomas sings the theme music, "Raindrops Keep Fallin' On My Head," in the Paul Newman film, "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid." The recording has sold almost two million copies and is Thomas' fifth golden record.

Other Thomas hits have included "Billy and Sue" and "The Eyes of a New York Woman." He was voted Billboard Magazine's "Most Promising Male Vocalist" in 1966.

Television brought almost instant fame to David Frye in 1968 with his popular mimicry of presidential candidates Nixon and Humphrey and retiring President Lyndon Johnson.

Frye's impersonations, an uncanny blending of voice and facial contortions, have been in demand ever since on television variety and "talk" shows and on college campuses.

His success story has been featured in national magazines and reportedly discussed in high political circles, including the White House. Frye's name has become synonomous with political satire—in person, on television and on record. His first album, "I Am the President," is a top seller.

MOREHEAD, Ky., March 25---A new educational opportunity for area residents is now available at Morehead State University's Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center in the form of an Adult Learning Laboratory.

Open to everyone over sixteen (16), the lab is located on the 7th floor of the Education Building at MSU. The lab will be open on Monday and Thursday evenings between 6 and 9 p.m.

The Adult Learning Laboratory offers -- free of charge -- an "up to the minute" variety of education, specifically designed for adults who want to improve basic educational skills such as reading and math.

The heart of the "learning lab" is a scientifically developed system called "programmed learning": a kind of "do it yourself" educational system that allows students to work at their own individual level at their own speed.

Programmed learning uses textbooks, filmstrips, records and tapes to present subject matter that has been carefully organized into logical sequences so it can be easily learned.

If a student runs into any difficulty with a lesson, the learning lab coordinator, who is always on duty when the lab is open, may be called on for help. An assistant coordinator will also be available for aid.

"According to statistics gathered in learning labs in Ohio, North
Carolina, and New York, the learning rate was shown to be twice as fast in
learning labs than in conventional classrooms," says John Gaus, Learning Lab
Specialist for the AABEDC.

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Although planned with the basic education student in mind, the lab has material available up to the college level. No high school or college credit is directly available through the lab, but students can use lab facilities in preparation for the general equivalency diploma. (GED)

Another unique feature of the lab is its informal policies in relation to attendance. "There are no regular hours for anyone enrolled," Mr. Gaus said. The students are free to come and go as their schedule allows, during the time the lab is open, from 6 to 9 p.m., Mondays and Thursdays. Additional hours may be added later according to student demand. This flexible attendance policy suits the needs of working people, women with children, and others who cannot meet classes on a regular basis.

The Lab is a project of the Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center. The Morehead-based lab is the second such learning facility in Eastern Kentucky funded by the AABEDC. Another such lab has been operating near Vanceburg in Lewis County for almost two years.

The AABEDC is itself a project of the U.S. Office of Education under Title 3 of the Adult Education Act. Operating since 1967 at Morehead State University, the AABEDC has initiated a number of experimental projects throughout the thirteen-state Appalachian region to improve the quality of adult education.

MOREHEAD, Ky., March 27---The Morehead State University Board of Regents has approved a budget of \$15, 158, 220 for the 1970-71 academic year.

In other action, the board authorized formation of a nine-member Committee on Student Appeals, approved a new master's degree program in adult education, and okehed the awarding of honorary master's degrees.

The new budget is up from the \$13,941,567 budgeted by the board in 1969-70 and reflects an increased appropriation by the 1970 General Assembly of \$657,912 for the fiscal year.

"This budget is an extremely conservative one," said President Adron

Doran, " and only provides for a continuation of programs at their present levels

with a cost of living increase in salaries."

The committee on student appeals, composed of six faculty members and three students, will serve as an appeals board for students who have been suspended or expelled by the Vice President for Student Affairs or the Dean of Students.

Suspension or expulsion rulings upheld by the newly-formed committee can then be taken to the Board of Regents if the suspended or expelled student so desires.

The new master's degree program in adult and continuing education, a first in the state, is a natural outgrowth of Morehead State's Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center which was established in June, 1967. Since the center's founding, MSU has become the recognized regional center for adult education and members of the federally-financed center will comprise the faculty of the new program.

MOREHEAD, Ky., April 30 --- The prospect of war between Red China and the Soviet Union was discounted Thursday by a veteran U.S. diplomat appearing at Morehead State University.

Charles E. Bohlen, former deputy under secretary of state for political affairs and an expert on U. S.-Soviet relations, told an International Relations Day convocation that leaders of the two Communist giants are aware of the "grave consequences" of such a conflict.

The former U.S. ambassador to Russia predicted the ideological split will widen and the Sino-Soviet propaganda battle will continue but stop short of war.

In other matters, the retired statesman expressed doubt the Soviets would ever accept reunification of Germany but he forecast better relations between East and West Germany.

Bohlen, former interpreter for Presidents Roosevelt and Truman, described the Middle East struggle as potentially more dangerous to the world than the Vietnam fighting.

The diplomat said he had detected "the smell of isolationism" in Congress as a result of America's "tragic involvement" in Southeast Asia.

Bohlen said he is confident of a "meaningful" agreement with the Soviets in the strategic arms limitation talks (SALT) now underway in Vienna.

He was introduced by MSU President Adron Doran.

Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center has received a second federal grant
to conduct a teacher-training workshop.

The \$52,000 allocation will be used to train 52 teachers from the 13 Appalachian states in the fundamentals of teaching reading to adults.

Morehead State received \$78,000 last year from the Office of Education to conduct a summer workshop for adult basic education teachers.

The reading workshop, scheduled June 15-July 3, was developed because adult basic education teachers in Appalachia don't have sufficient training in reading.

It is designed to develop four-man training teams from each of the participating states. Such reading teams would then go back to their home states to conduct reading clinics for adult basic education teachers.

Workshop Director Ann Hayes said the three-week session would be divided into three phases.

Husain Qazilbash, assistant professor of education at MSU, recently completed an exhaustive study on dialect throughout the Appalachian region. Data compiled in his study will be used to provide the teacher-trainees with insight in the unique speech patterns they encounter.

The workshop sponsor, the Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center, located since 1967 on the MSU campus, was created to improve adult basic education in Appalachia.

Besides summer workshops, the AABEDC also operates 14 demonstration projects in 11 Appalachian states.

MOREHEAD, Ky., May 7 --- More than 100 black students marched into an assembly program at Morehead State University Thursday morning and announced 21 demands on the campus administration.

Scheduled originally for discussion of the Vietnam controversy and resulting campus unrest across the U.S., the morning convocation was diverted to racial issues when the unnamed group of black students filed quietly into Button Auditorium carrying placards and banners.

After waiting for two other speakers to finish, Lexington sophomore

Hosea Johnson delivered the black demands, ranging from creation of an Afro
American studies department to a campus ban on the Confederate flag.

Both Johnson and the other black spokesman, Lexington freshman Felix Williams, praised MSU President Adron Doran for his attitude and record in racial matters but they branded other campus administrators as "terribly corrupt." Both claimed racist policies were being used without the president's knowledge, especially in disciplinary matters.

Dr. Doran, who interceded at one point to give Johnson time to complete his remarks, addressed the convocation in response to the list of demands and called for "more of the reasonable, responsible discussion we have had in the past concerning black affairs."

"You don't solve problems by making demands," he said. "We accomplish things by keeping respect and regard for each other and by rational discussion of these matters."

Dr. Doran, recognized statewide for his biracial policies, said MSU "has come a long way from the Jim Crow days of the past." He recounted several

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of the university's racial firsts among state universities, including admission of black undergraduates and recruitment of black scholarship athletes.

The president pledged to continue his "open door" policy of hearing student complaints and said the black grievances would be examined.

Dr. Doran told the convocation that MSU students, not the administration, would decide if martial law would come to the campus as it has elsewhere.

"We don't want violence here and we won't have it as long as we remain men of peace and reason," he added.

The convocation was one of three suggestions accepted by the university as a memorial to the students killed at Kent State. Student Council made the recommendations late Wednesday.

An American flag over the Administration Building was lowered to half-staff and classes were dismissed for the first hour of the convocation.

"We are also aware that many campus disorders have occurred as the result of the failure of the various elements of our campus communities to establish effective communications channels."

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"We as alumni of Morehead State University take this opportunity to commend President Adron Doran, his administrative staff, the faculty, and students of our alma mater for the exemplary fashion in which they have developed lines of communication in such a way as to eliminate needless and tragic campus violence. We commend the great wisdom which has seen the placement of students on all university committees and the fine manner in which the total university community at Morehead State University has joined together to work toward the solutions of the great problems of the day."

The surprise reaction of the 907 graduates came in response to the traditiona "charge" which encouraged the Class of 1970 to help build a better world.

Earlier, the day's principal speaker urged the graduates to base life's vital decisions on "the best evidence available" and not on personal prejudices and assumptions.

In a plea for reason rather than emotion, Dr. Franklin M. Mangrum said decisions founded on carefully-analyzed facts would help them conquer issues and problems waiting in the outside world.

Dr. Mangrum is head of the MSU Department of Philosophy and faculty representative on the Board of Regents.

The philosophy professor appealed to the Class of 1970 never to accept so-called facts without question. To do so, he said, would be to forfeit the advantage of education.

"The unexamined fact is not worth believing," Dr. Mangrum said in a paraphrase of Socrates.

More than 6,000 parents, students and faculty members packed Laughlin Fieldhouse for the traditional ceremony. The record class surpassed last year's 854 graduates, then an all-time high for MSU.

MOREHEAD, Ky., June 3 --- Effective late this summer, Morehead State University will initiate a new academic calendar which eliminates extension of the fall semester into next year.

Approved after a year of detailed study by faculty, students and staff, the new schedule starts the 1970 fall semester registration Aug. 24 with classes meeting Aug. 27. The semester closes Dec. 19.

Spring semester registration begins Jan. 11, 1971, and classes start Jan. 14. The semester ends May 7.

A special, three-week spring "intersession" opens May 17 and finishes June 4. The regular eight-week summer session in 1971 begins June 14 and closes Aug. 6.

The new "intersession" replaces the post summer session which will be in effect for the last time this summer. The "intersession" is intended to accommodate special programs like independent study.

Adoption of the new schedule moves the spring break from mid-April to March 13-21. Previously, Morehead State's fall term began in mid-September and ended in late January. Spring semester traditionally ended in early June.

"The new calendar will provide a great deal more flexibility," said MSU President Adron Doran, "and we made the move only after a year of extensive study."

Dr. Doran cited several advantages of the new system, including more time for students to find summer jobs, reduction in student travel expenses by combining semester break and the Christmas vacation, additional time for faculty members to prepare for new courses between semesters and more class time for potential summer graduates whose use of the new "intersession" might allow them to complete degree work in time for summer commencement.

Also, the new schedule will be more convenient for students transferring to Morehead State from other schools and for students preparing to enter professional schools at other universities.

MOREHEAD, Ky., June 5---Morehead State University received final approval Friday of a project to make the campus radio station 5,000 times more powerful.

Sen. Marlow W. Cook notified university officials that the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) had approved a \$64,000 grant to MSU for equipment needed to boost the output of WMKY Radio from 10 watts to 50,000 watts.

Also Friday, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting announced that WMKY would receive a \$15,000 grant for the employment of additional personnel.

Morehead State's project was among only 10 approved nationally by CPB from 120 applications. The smaller grant will furnish salaries for a news and public affairs director and a traffic and promotion manager.

Donald F. Holloway, associate professor of communications and director of the MSU Institute for Public Broadcasting, which operates WMKY, said news of the two grants made Friday "a banner day for public broadcasting in Eastern Kentucky."

The \$79,000 approved Friday and \$26,000 in university funds will allow the five-year-old FM station to expand its coverage area from one county and 11,000 persons to 12 counties with a population exceeding 127,000.

Holloway said construction would start this summer and the 50,000-watt station would be broadcasting on its new frequency by early fall. The station's offices and studios will remain in Combs Classroom Building on the MSU campus.

MOREHEAD, Ky., June 9---More than 50 teachers from 13 Appalachian states will converge on Morehead State University this weekend to attend the Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center's Adult Reading Workshop.

For the second year the Appalachian Center has received U.S. Office of Education funds to conduct a teacher training workshop for educators located within the Appalachian region.

This year's grant of \$52,000 will be used to train 52 teachers in the fundamentals of teaching reading to adults. The workshop, scheduled June 15-July 3, was developed on the premise that most adult education teachers in Appalachia do not have sufficient training in reading.

The workshop is designed to develop four-man training teams from each of the participating states. These reading teams will then go back to their home states to conduct reading clinics for adult basic education teachers.

According to Workshop Director Ann Hayes, the three-weeksession will be divided into three phases: an overview of reading, diagnosis of reading disabilities and actual teaching of adult students.

The Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center has been located since 1967 on the MSU campus. Its purpose is the improvement of adult basic education in the Appalachian region.

Besides hosting this summer's workshop, the AABEDC also is currently operating 14 demonstration projects in 11 Appalachian states.

MOREHEAD, Ky., June 18 --- Few were surprised recently when Morehead State University's 1970 distinguished faculty award went to Allen L. Lake, associate professor of biology.

Since his arrival on the MSU campus in 1957, the 45-year-old biologist has proven himself a versatile and dedicated teacher and researcher, a skilled academic writer, a talented photography enthusiast and a wise counselor of youth.

His scientific contributions to Morehead State include the nationally-recognized discovery and reconstruction of the fossilized root system of a giant, 235 million-year-old plant, detection of a rare microscopic organism in the University Lake, publication of three textbooks and the chairmanship of a well-received "Ecology Day" convocation.

Also, Lake has produced more than 10,000 "micrographs" of biological subjects, many of which are used as teaching aids. The photographs of highly-magnified objects were the basis of a one-man photography exhibit last winter at MSU's Claypool-Young Gallery.

More than 300 of Lake's color and black-and-white prints and color slides were displayed for 10 days in one of the gallery's most popular showings of the year. The professor began his micrography hobby years ago as a natural union of his interest in photography and science.

A transplanted New Yorker who loves Kentucky as a native son,

Lake also has made his mark in extra-curricular activities at MSU.

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He founded in 1958 and continues to advise the Diving Eagles, a group of scuba-diving buffs. His service to Prae-Medicorum, an honorary for pre-medical and pre-dental students, earned him an award of appreciation. His expertise in the medical area prompted the School of Sciences and Mathematics to appoint him the official advisor for students preparing for medical or dental school.

His classroom versatility is reflected in the more than 100 semester hours of different courses he has taught at MSU and, for seven years beforehand, at Lees Junior College. Now a specialist in biological courses, he is generally regarded as one of the most effective teachers on the MSU campus.

Allen Lake the teacher has found time in his busy life to become equally admired as Allen Lake the devoted father of five children and Allen Lake the church elder who helped found Morehead's Faith

Presbyterian Church and represented his adopted state at a national church convention.

His offspring include Ann Lea, 19, a pre-med sophomore at MSU; Aleson, 17, an MSU freshman studying math and biology; Allen Lee, 16, a sophomore at University Breckinridge School; Mary Beth, 14, a freshman at UBS; and Alma Lou, 13, an eighth grader at UBS.

Lake married his hometown sweetheart from Jamestown, N.Y., the former Betty Phillips, a teacher of art and English at Rowan County High School in Morehead.

The popular professor has degrees from Edinboro State College (Pa.) and the University of Buffalo. He is pursuing a doctorate in biology at the University of Kentucky.

"We came hesitantly to Kentucky some 20 years ago," Lake recalls, "but now we never intend to leave. This is our home and we're glad to be here."

At Morehead State, the feeling is mutual.

This year's grant marks the fourth year the AABEDC, a "Special Project" under the Adult Education Act of 1966, has been in operation at Morehead State University.

The Appalachian Center, one of 21 similar projects throughout the country, has as its purpose the improvement of the quality of Adult Basic Education in the Appalachian region.

The Center is operating 14 experimental modules in 11

Appalachian states. Each of the modules test or demonstrate certain components of the Adult Basic Education program. The project in Mississippi is testing the usefulness of a specially written newspaper for adults with low reading levels. In Kentucky, reading instruction is linked to driver education. The Ohio project is experimenting with home instruction and in Alabama, television lessons are being produced especially for adult students.

The AABEDC is also running a Teacher-Trainer Workshop in Adult Reading and administering several research studies, including one on Appalachian dialects. The Center will also administer a master's degree program in adult education to begin at Morehead during the fall term.

More than 800 college, senior high school and junior high bandsmen are expected to attend the camp's various phases.

Also opening July 6 is the two-week-long High School Summer Art Institute which offers instruction and experience in drawing, painting, photography and sculpture.

The second session of MSU's sixth annual Summer Linguistics Workshop starts July 13 and closes July 31. Courses are available on undergraduate and graduate levels.

A new institute for vocational education teachers is scheduled July 20-31. Limited to 30 persons, the in-service training session is designed for vo-ed instructors working primarily with disadvantaged students in rural areas.

Other campus activities slated for July include the third annual MSU Invitational Golf Tournament on July 2-4, two art exhibits, a two-day convention of the Kentucky PTA on July 21-22, a day-long conference of the Eastern Kentucky Education Development Corp., and Polled Hereford Field Day on July 18.

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
