Betty had poor coordination: and could say only "mommy" and "daddy." She cried frequently, shedding her tears silently. Bonnie could speak only very simple words and was openly hostile. She had daily temper tantrums.

Through weekly visits from small groups of the sorority sisters and periodic outings, the youngsters began to lose their shyness.

With their grownup playmates providing attention, love and adventure, Betty and Bonnie overcame some of their handicaps. Both now can speak in simple sentences and run, jump and skip like other four-year-olds.

Tests have shown that neither child is retarded and, if progress continues, both will be normal within two years and start attending public school, according to local doctors.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University has announced plans to construct a \$3 million building to house its Appalachian Technical Institute, hailed as a "significant breakthrough" in technical education

The five-story classroom and office structure will house a technical education program ranging from college graduate work to high school teaching.

"This new facility will be the only one of its kind in Kentucky and among just a few in the country," said MSU President Adron Doran.

"It is a significant breakthrough and will enable our institution to better serve the career needs of Eastern Kentucky and Appalachia."

Financed through an \$800,000 federal grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission and university revenue bonds, the building is expected to be completed in early 1973. Construction will start late this year and require about two years.

Dr. Doran said the institute, to be operated by the university's School of Applied Sciences and Technology, will enable MSU to expand technical course and program offerings on the graduate, four-year and two-year levels.

A cooperative agreement with the Kentucky Department of Education will provide laboratory teaching experiences at the nearby Rowan County Vocational Extension Center, a satellite of the Ashland Area Vocational-Technical School.

"Not only will Morehead State University be able to improve the quality of technical education in this region but we also will be in a position to prepare more industrial technicians through our associate degree (two-year) programs," Dr. Doran added.

The reinforced concrete structure will connect to the existing Industrial Arts-Home Economics Building via an overhead, enclosed
bridge. Encompassing more than 109,000 square feet of floor space,
the new building will have two floors of parking and three floors of
classrooms and offices.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Adovcates of campus violence "belong in the reformatory not the dormitory," State Budget Director Lawrence Forgy Jr. told Morehead State University's summer graduates here Thursday morning.

However, the 31-year-old financial whiz added that peaceful student dissent should not be categorically condemned.

"I can tell you from personal experience that you can make your presence felt and move this great nation and state toward meaningful social change," he told the 320 class members. "But this must be done within the existing political structure."

Forgy, who said his age placed him astride the generation gap, said students had been guilty of impractical idealism and that older adults had formed a distorted view of campus unrest through the "big eye" of television.

"The problem you, the young generation, have is one of public relations," the Lewisburg native said. "You project the wrong image to many people and this creates a misconception."

Many adults misunderstand today's youth culture and have reacted with contempt and fear, the deputy finance commissioner said in a plea for understanding of the "over 30" set.

"Most of you want construction, not destruction," Forgy said.

"And you are not willing to throw away 3,000 years of painfully achieved civilization, no matter how imperfect it may be."

He added:

"But the real danger in the people's objection to the educational community lies in their feeling that the universities are being transformed into political organizations for the adoption of partisan political goals....The institutions cannot have it both ways. They cannot be politically involved and then expect immunity from reprisal from a public which disagrees."

Calling for understanding of the fears of the old and the aspirations of the young, Forgy concluded:

"As you go out and away from this great university, I trust you will not rob yourselves of the bright future which can be yours in this land if you join hands with others in an effort to breach the gaps in our society."

This is the third year MSU has been selected to help make the program on peaceful uses of atomic energy available to Kentucky students

Entitled "This Atomic World," the traveling demonstration is designed to acquaint students with basic principles of nuclear energy, its sources and its role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research.

in chemistry, presents the 40-minute assembly program which explains in simplified terms the structure of atoms, the operation of nuclear reactors and concepts of radiation, fission and fusion.

Specially designed electronic equipment is used to demonstrate the sources of radiation, how nuclear energy is harnessed to furnish electric power for cities and the use of radioisotopes to aid in diagnosis and treatment of diseases and to learn more about life processes.

Following the assembly, a chalkboard talk to science classes deals more specifically with the topics of atomic structure, radio-activity, radiation biology and careers in nuclear science.

The program is presented by Morehead State University in cooperation with Oak Ridge Associated Universities, a non-profit educational and research corporation of 41 Southern colleges and universities which operates the nationwide exhibits program for the Atomic Energy Commission.



vation of Rader Hall, the oldest structure at MSU. The \$1.8 million project was just beginning when alumni made their pilgrimage last fall. Now it is nearly completed and the former administration building has taken on a modern image more fitting to its role as home of the School of Social Sciences.

Waterfield Hall, a bulwark of male housing for 10 years, has been converted to a women's residence hall and its 201 rooms are occupied by coeds. Used almost exclusively for freshman males since its opening, the four-story building gave way to increased female enrollment.

Other physical changes are coming to Morehead State. President Adron Doran last summer announced plans for a \$3 million Appalachian Technical Institute to bring "a new vista in technical education" to Eastern Kentucky.

Perhaps most significant of all the year's modifications was the recent unveiling of the Morehead State University Bald Eagle painting which has been adopted as the university's official symbol.

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Painstakingly researched and painted by Lexington wildlife artist Gene Gray, the work has been printed for limited sale to friends and alumni of MSU. Only 2,000 copies have been made available at a cost of \$25 plus \$2 for mailing. Sales are reported brisk and will continue during the Homecoming weekend.

Regardless of the changes which occur from year to year, the nostalgia, entertainment and excitement of a Morehead State University Homecoming will be in even more abundance as thousands of alumni flock to the campus.

The festive observance, billed as "Kentucky's Greatest Collegiate Weekend," starts Friday, Oct. 23, with a 6 p.m. candle-light dinner at the Adron Doran University Center. The evening is capped by an 8:30 p.m. concert by trumpeter Al Hirt at Laughlin Fieldhouse.

Saturday's crowded schedule opens with registration of alumni and various receptions during the morning. A smorgasbord luncheon begins at 11 a.m. and the traditional football game kicks off at 2:30 p.m. with the Eagles facing Tennessee Tech at Breathitt Sports Center.

Mayor of Fayette, Miss., since July, 1969. Evers was instrumental in voter registration drives which increased black registration in Mississippi from 20,000 in 1965 to more than 275,000 by early 1969.

The 47-year-old graduate of Alcorn A&M will address a 10:20 a.m. convocation in MSU's Button Auditorium on the topic: "A Black Mississippi Mayor's Attempt to Implement the American Dream for all Citizens."

Married and the father of five, Evers narrowly lost a bid for Congress in 1968 and became a Democratic national committeeman after leading a challenge of Mississippi delegates to the Democratic National Convention.

He succeeded his late brother as field secretary of the Mississippi NAACF in 1963 after the nationally-known activist had been murdered by a sniper.

By 1967, Charles Evers had led black Mississippians to electoral control of five rural counties south of the capital city of Jackson.

Other speakers scheduled include retired Air Force Lt. Gen. Benjamin O. Davis, the highest ranking Negro ever to serve in the U.S. armed forces, and Mrs. Betty Shabazz, widow of Malcolm X.

Hill climbing usually involves a dirt incline ranging from 50 to 75 degrees and from 100 to 500 feet long. Riders try to climb the highest in the shortest time. Terry says climbing is "a thrill a second."

"Some people think hill climbing is too dangerous," he said.

"But if you have confidence in yourself and your equipment, the fear factor is not a handicap."

The stocky champion has been flipped backwards numerous times but escaped injury due to his quick reaction and the protective gear required of hill climbers.

"It's a wild feeling when the bike comes back over your head," he said. "You have to know what to do or someone will carry you away."

"When you consider how many good hill climbers were on the circuit this year, winning the national championship really is a great honor," he said. "I hope to do it again next year."
