

Regents Keep W. C. Lappin At Morehead

MOREHEAD, Ky., July 2 (AP)—The Morehead State Teachers College Board of Regents indicated today that Dean Warren C. Lappin would continue as acting president indefinitely.

A statement following a meeting of the board described the session as routine, and Roy Cornette of Morehead, a member, said a committee named in Lexington June 15 to canvass the field of prospective appointees "neither made a report nor was asked for one."

Lappin, named acting president after the board voted May 21 against renewal of the contract of President W. H. Vaughan, who had held the office since 1940, was given full authority to proceed with the duties of the office.

The acting president, who assumed office Monday, presented the budget for 1946-47 school operations which was adopted, and he was authorized to fill vacancies and employ new personnel for the fall term.

The budget, which was higher than that for last year, carried an appropriation for increased salaries for certain faculty personnel.

The board also:

Renewed the contract of the Rowan County Publishing Company for publication of the "Trail Blazer," student weekly;

Designated two local banks as federal depositories for the federal housing unit for the construction of six temporary buildings on the campus having 24 apartments;

Employed Duell Williams of Johnson county, a Morehead graduate, as field agent for the college.

The regents also accepted the resignation of Dr. William Wine-land, head of the Department of Mathematics and Physics, to accept a position with the Naval Ordnance Laboratory at White Oak, Md.

Other resignations included those of V. A. Bolen, assistant professor of chemistry, and of Miss Patty Bolin, critic teacher of the Breckinridge Training School on the campus.

Sabbatical leaves were granted to Renzie Jennings, head of the Department of Commerce, for one year, and to Juanita Minish, and at the request of Gov. S. S. Willis, Comptroller Ike Nooe was granted leave of absence for service in the department of Finance at Frankfort.

The board deferred until its next meeting, at a date to be announced, consideration of a proposal to erect lights for night sports contest on the athletics field.
