### Recommendation for Changes in Government Districts of Columbia.

Mr. James B. Reynolds, some time ago authorized by the President to investigate social conditions in the city of Washington and administration of the city Government, has made his report to the President, which was this week made public. In it Mr. Reynolds recommends the most sweeping changes in the government of the national Capital. Among the most radical of these changes is the recommendation that the present Board of District Commissioners, consisting of three men appointed by the President, be abolished and in its stead the District be governed by a "governor," who would also be the mayor of the city. He further recommends that this official be chosen from some other city and be a man who has proven himself efficient in the government of a city, citing the method of choosing mayors for the German cities, where the mayors of the larger cities have first proven their ability in smaller municipalities. He further recommends the establishment of seven city departments, with a head to be known as the "commissioner of the said department," and a citizens committee of 100 to represent all civic interests, all employees of the department to be chosen by civil service methods.

### Kuroki in Washington.

Gen. Kuroki, the hero of the Yalu, whose name was on every lip during the Russian-Japanese war, arrived in Washington with his staff on the 9th inst and on their way to the Jamestown Exposition, and were brilliantly entertained at the Capital. He was met at the station by Maj. General...

army, with a squadron of cavalry and escorted to the hotel. All of the prominent army officers here will pay their respects to the Japanese officers, the party containing some fourteen in all. The party arrived in this country via Seattle, and have crossed the continent under the escort of General Arthur and three officers of the army. The Japanese squadron of vessels has arrived in Hampton Roads, and is with the assembled fleet of the Jamestown Exposition.

### German Singers in Washington

Another entertainment of interest during the past week was the singing at the White House of the members of the Wiener Maennergesang Verein, a society of German wealthy men, who passed through Washington this week. They were received by the President and members of the diplomatic corps and other notables invited to the White House, where the society rendered a number of German songs, to the delight of all hearers. Later they were entertained by the members of the Washington Saengerbund, who presented them with an enormous loving-cup of solid silver, costing some \$700.

### AT THE CAPITOL, D. C.

Washington is all agog over the recent developments in the political situation in Ohio. Now comes the announcement that after all the strenuous fighting of the past two weeks in that State, everything is to be settled practically amicably. At least that is the way it looks at present. George B. Cox, the practical head of the State organization, has come out with a declaration that unity is needed in the party within the state, and that it is the duty of Ohio to furnish the country with another President, which she can only do by supporting William H. Taft; that he wants Senator Foraker returned to the Senate and Gov. Harris nominated to succeed himself. Senator Foraker is out with the announcement that if Mr. Cox's plan should be endorsed by the people of the State he will endorse it. This certainly looks like the Secretary of War had captured the Buckeye State, which is one great step toward the nomination.

Perhaps one of the most sensational developments, if it prove to be true is the intimation that Representative Theodore E. Burton, of Ohio, Chairman of the House Rivers and Harbors Committee, is to be supported to succeed Speaker Cannon at the coming session of Congress. It is generally understood that Speaker Cannon is friendly to the Taft boom, and that he will try to deliver the House nomination to Fairbanks or some one of the reactionaries in the party. In this connection the visit of Gov. Danaher of Illinois, the last of the past week, is significant. It was said at the time that he left Washington that he was

in opposition. If this limited opposition to the Speaker develops next session it will certainly furnish one of the hardest contests ever witnessed at the Capital.

Of course, the developments of the coming winter are impossible of prediction by even the greatest of political prophets. Gov. Hughes, of New York, despite his defeat at the hands of the State Legislature in the matter of the desired dismissal of State Superintendent of Insurance Kelsey may prove a formidable candidate for the Presidential nomination if anything inimical to the Taft movement develops Gov. Hughes this week announced his intention to continue his fight for the proper supervision of railroads, &c., in New York State, and this will strengthen him with the people.

### Exposition May Be Deep Plot.

It is not improbable that a scandal will be added to the interest of the Jamestown Exposition which seems to be falling lower in public favor with each day that its gates are opened. According to prevailing rumor now the Exposition is in reality a graft exposition and it would not be surprising if some of the prominent men who have loaned their names to the Board of Governors or other official rank should be called upon to explain a few things about it. For instance it is said that a party of men, most of them of Jewish persuasion are really behind the Jamestown Fair and it is their object to use the improvements made at Government and public expense, as well as the advertising, to establish a manufacturing centre there when the Exposition has closed. The buildings, it is claimed have been erected in many cases with the primary object of furnishing suitable structures for factories and the grounds are arranged and laid out with a view to the greatest convenience of the manufacturers. At the Exposition the buildings will necessarily be sold at very low figures and the improvements on the grounds, etc., cannot be removed. It will then be the chance for the Hebrew gentlemen to step forward and pick up the bargains. It would seem that evil days are ahead for the Exposition not only as regards as disappointing and unsatisfactory condition, but with reference also the honesty of its promoters.

### Horses are High.

A marked scarcity of horses and men is reported from the northwest. Good draft horses, worth eight years ago \$40 only, are now selling at \$200 to \$300 each. Such horses are needed in the lumber woods and in railway construction, but cannot be had. Men to work in the woods are offered \$70 a month and board. A man with a good team hauling lumber and logs receives \$9 a day. Never have wages been so high or horses so costly.—Ex.

### Liquor Seller Landed.

Major Farrow, of color, was held over by U. S. Commissioner Wood at Mt. Sterling to the United States Circuit Court at London, Ky., and Deputy Marshal Sam Jackson took him there last week. Major was to have his trial Tuesday of this week on the charge of selling liquor without U. S. license.—Owingsville Outlook.

### Menifee County Sued.

Sixty years ago Montgomery county voted a sum of money to a proposed railroad and paid it in county bonds. Before the debt was paid the county of Menifee was formed, a comparatively small portion of it's territory being taken from Montgomery county. At a recent meeting of the Montgomery Fiscal Court brought suit against that part of Menifee that had been taken from Montgomery to compel it's citizens to pay to Montgomery county \$10,000, calculated to be the share of the railroad debt owing by these Menifee citizens. The part of Menifee in question is small, the land is rather poor, sparsely populated and the people not rich.—Owingsville Outlook.

## SPAIN.

### Rejoices Over Birth Of An Heir To The Throne.

### King Alfonso Pardons Thousands Of Prisoners In Honor Of His Crown.

News that the direct male succession to the throne of Spain had been assured by the birth of a son to Queen Victoria last Friday. It sent a thrill of rejoicing throughout the country, and the happy event is being celebrated from one end of the land to the other. King Alfonso, in honor of the event, decreed the pardon of thousands of prisoners, including eight persons who were condemned to suffer the death penalty. Seely alleges that he bought the rope for the express purpose of hanging himself with it, and that when he tried to use it for that purpose it broke and cheated him of attaining his object. Seely says further that when the rope broke his resolve to kill himself broke with it, and that he has not since then succeeded in screwing his courage up to a point where he could make another attempt upon his life. He is a middle aged bachelor and a miller.

### New Department Ruling.

An associated Press dispatch from Washington conveys the information that the Government after July 1, will no longer specify the use of a special delivery stamp, but will accept its worth in any denomination or issue of stamps. To guarantee the prompt delivery of the letter with ten cents in postage added to usual two-cent stamp. Postmaster General Von Meyer, in his ruling, specified that only the words "special delivery" need be written on the envelope to insure that service. This act is the latest in the history of the department for the convenience of the public.

### Sub-Stations, as cities grow larger, are farther and farther from the homes, and as in this way it is often impossible to purchase a special delivery stamp, the new ruling will be welcomed by many city residents. In smaller towns closed Postoffices need prove no bar to securing special delivery after July 1st.—Ex.
