FARMERS HAD CITY GOVERNMENT

Old Ordinance Prohibited Riding Horse At A Fast Clip

1890's couldn't ride a horse faster than six miles an hour within the town limits, park his wagon on the streets at night, or leave a cow standing on the sidewalk.

Furthermore, he couldn't swear in the presence of females more than twenty dollars. or ministers, be drunk on the streets, or even throw his old beef heads out in the alley. But he could play marbles on Sun-day, even if card games and football were prohibited.

Ordinances regulating these

and other community affairs are found in an old record book of the Farmers Town Council for the period 1885 to 1902. First entry in the volume was made in 1885, when it was officially noted that "this book was presented to the town board of Farmers by Geo. S. Lacey," who was then mayor. A detailed account of pages missing at the time of presentation was duly recorded.
