PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR

To the People of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

I shall myself by my official position, not to address you by proclamation by authority as Governor of the Commonwealth, but as your fellow citizen, representing a great and generous people, to express at once your sympathies, and invoke your aid in the cause of suffering humanity.

A terrible disaster has befallen the impopular of a neighboring Commonwealth. The city of Chicago, in the full tide of its prosperity, has been utterly destroyed by a conflagration almost unparalleled in the history of such calamities. Very much of the vast wealth which the industry and commercial enterprise of her citizens had accumulated has perished in a day.

It is a cheering testimony to the brotherhood of Christendom, and the charity of our age in which we live, that not only has the heart of the nation been touched, but other peoples have united with our own in words of earnest sympathy and deeds of beneficence to relieve our distressed and suffering fellow-citizens.

[L.S.] In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the Commonwealth to be affixed, Done at Frankfort, the 20th day of October, A. D. 1871.

Description of the Davidson Fountain

The Cincinnati Gazette gives the following description of the fountain, which has been translated from the German of F. Parrot.

To exhibit the eagle as a blessing from Heaven, a globe descends from above, from whose extended hands the blessing gush copiously forth, and descends in the form of a gentle rain.

Finally on the rear side, a handsome lady, her father to the leading spring, eagerly the old man awakes the draught which is to gain give him to the public.

Two teams resting upon heifers, charmingly depicted, as well as flowers in the foreground, form a pleasant ornament of the work. They represent the use of water for the most different human activities as recreation, and fishing, and finally as motive power direct, as in the case of the mill.

In the niches which break the corners of the bowl, four children stand as if youth; a girl viewing her image in the clear water; a boy joyfully shouting some a crab which he has just caught, while another maiden listens attentively to the humming and roaring of the shell, and the last, a youth wrapped in furs, lurches on his skates, thus illustrating, after the soundest style of water into steam by warmth, the transformation of water into ice by cold.

The whole, resting upon a base of granite, is surrounded by a wide basin of the same material.

One of the basins contains the water-spouting dolphin; the other remains in a mighty rushing stream, and would naturally surround the foot of a third, which he, "stricken," attempts to remove, while the fourth, in the middle of the capital informs us that the fountain work was presented to the people of the city of Cincinnati by two of its citizens, Mr. Henry Probasco and Mr. J. C. Davidson.
