TEXT BOOK LAW GOING TO COURT

BIDDERS AND STATE OFFICIALS WANT AMBIGUITIES CONSTRUED.

TAXPAYERS WILL START SUIT

With an Arbitrary Commission of 15 Per-Cent to Retail Dealers, Book Concerns Wonder How They Can Sell at the Lowest Price.

(Special Frankfort Correspondence.)

Frankfort—Patent ambiguities in state text book law probably will be brought to the attention of the court of appeals through a taxpayer's suit some time soon. State officers and text book concerns all desire that the law be construed, so that they can contract under it with safety. The title of the law is "an act creating a state text book commission to adopt for use in the common schools of Kentucky a uniform series of text books, regulating the price thereof, defining the powers and duties of said commission and the method of selection of such text books and their distribution, prescribing penalties for the violation of this act, and hereinafter the trouble commences—repealing Chapter 13, of the Acts of the General Assembly of Kentucky, approved March 15, 1914."

Section 8 says, "The act of 1910 regarding cities of the first, third and fourth classes and the act of 1912 regarding the cities of the second class shall be and remain in force unmodified by this act." The title recites that the act of 1910 is repealed, and the act of 1912 relating to cities of the second class, referred to, has nothing to say about the manner of selecting text books.

As to the price to be charged for the text books the law says local dealers "shall receive 15 per cent of the retail price at which the books are sold." The retail price shall not exceed the retail price at which same book or books are sold in any state, county, township or school district in the United States.

At no time may any book be sold in Kentucky by the contractor at a higher or net price than is received for the same book elsewhere.

With an arbitrary commission to the retailer of 15 per cent, while the dealer's commission in other states ranges as low as a maximum of 10 per cent, the book concern is endeavoring how they can sell at the lowest price and at the same time the lowest retail price that they sell the books elsewhere; for the other states also stipulate that they must have as good price as any other.

Eliminating the Rooster.

Little does the Kentucky rooster realize what the department of agriculture and the Kentucky poultry dealers have framed up on him. From May 1 to December 1, now and here after, according to an announcement, he is to be deprived of the society of the fair sex—that is, the hens. He is to be sold for slaughter at horrendous prices, and May 16 has been set aside as "Rooster day" in Kentucky and Tennessee. The department bulletin follows:

"In the interest of the infertile egg the poultry specialists of the department of agriculture have started a campaign for the elimination of the rooster among poultry flocks during the seasons between May 1 and December 1. In this connection Saturday, May 16, has been set aside as 'Rooster day' in Kentucky and Tennessee, when every poultry dealer in these states is to sell his roosters at the same prices for roosters as they do for hens and pullets.

On May 15 the school authorities of the cities, counties and towns of Kentucky and Tennessee have been requested to announce rooster day to the scholars, and it is expected that it will be observed. It is supposed that other states will follow the lead of these two states and that 'Rooster Days' will be pretty generally established.

Will Furnish Budded Apple Trees.

The state department of forestry is going into the apple tree business and furnish budded trees to the people of the state at cost. So great a demand for apple trees has arisen that at a meeting of the forestry committee it was decided that apple seed beds should be established in the Louisville nursery and State Forester J. E. Barton said he would secure the seeds at once. The seedlings raised in the state nursery will be budded and grafted to the proper varieties for this state before shipment. A storehouse and packing and sorting plant will be erected at the cost of \$1,000 in connection with the Louisville nursery.

Jumped into River

Catlettsburg, Apr. 27—Walter Day, a brakeman on the Big Sandy division of the C. & O., whose home is at Olive Hill, jumped into the Ohio river off of the Catlettsburg wharfboat this morning about ten o'clock, with a view, it is said, of committing suicide. Officer Farrow, who happened to be near, at the risk of his own life, jumped into the river and saved him.—Ashland Independent.

It has been learned that the Walter Day referred to above is Walter James, who is wellknown and has many friends here.

Roosevelt to Fight

An American official who recently met Theodore Roosevelt in South America, is authority that the former president intends getting into the Mexican fray at the earliest possible moment. Roosevelt is reported to have said that he intends to organize a full cavalry brigade for service in Mexico—not a mere regiment such as he commanded in Cuba. Roosevelt is said to have further declared that all his former officers would be ready to take the field with the shortest possible delay as soon as the formal sanction of the United States war department was obtained. The only stipulation the colonel made was that the affair in Mexico was a "real war" before he intervened.

UPRISING BEGUN BY CARRANZA

Revolt Started in Camp Of Rebels—Constitutionalist Leader Falls Into Trap Set By President Huerta

"Respect and Give Assistance To Citizens of United States," Says Message Sent By Hero of Torreon To Heads of All Garrisons—Crisis in Affairs of Warriors Near at Hand.

Western Newspaper Union News Service, El Paso, Texas—Gen. Pascual Villa left Juarez for Chihuahua City to check a revolt which, it is said, Gen. Venustiano Carranza has started among Villa's commanders.

Information reached Villa that Carranza had taken advantage of the absence of the rebel leader to spread discontent among his officers and men in an effort to rally them to Carranza's support, and that a plot had been formed to make Gen. Melcivio Herrera commander of the rebel army.

Information also is said to be implicated in the plot. It is admitted by Villa's friends that the breach between the victor of Torreon and the first chief of the revolution has reached a crisis.

Villa Flays Carranza.

Villa has strongly criticized Carranza for the note he sent to President Wilson, and but little of his real criticism has been made public. It is known that he spoke plainly, even threateningly, to the first chief in telegrams.

Carranza has fallen into the trap laid for him by Huerta, declares Villa's friends. He has started a revolt on the idea that rebels generally do not like Villa's friendliness for the Americans, and he expects Villa's whole army to turn from him unless that rebel warrior changes his attitude, but rebels in Juarez say Carranza is playing with fire, that Villa has a more firm hold upon the rebel army than Carranza has any idea of, and that 15,000 men which Carranza brought from Sonora with him will be needed by the first chief shortly after Villa begins straightening out matters in Chihuahua.

Clash Is Expected.

It is known in Juarez that Villa went south in haste and in anger. It is known that he has little love for Carranza, and it is believed that a clash which will mean the overthrow of either Carranza or Villa will take place.

Villa had contemplated a longer stay in Juarez, but on receipt of certain telegrams from the south, suddenly announced that he would leave in the morning.

"I have a train ready for me in the morning," he snapped, and the necessary orders were given. Villa invited Roberto V. Pesqueira Carranza's confidential agent here, to go with him, but Pesqueira, who is the real foreign minister of the constitutionalists, although he holds no portfolio, pleaded pressure of business here and the train, after waiting five hours, departed without him.

May Start Revolt.

It is believed in Juarez that Villa already has ordered his army to move from Torreon and San Pedro to Chihuahua, and that he will force Carranza out or start a conflict which will involve all rebel forces in Mexico.

Rebels in Juarez insist that Villa is sincere in the stand he has taken in the American crisis and that he has no idea of changing his position. Patecho Villa, before leaving sent the following by telegraph and by column to all rebel commanders and to all rebel garrisons:

"Respect and show every courtesy to citizens of the United States. Give assistance.—P. J. Villa!"

DEFIANCE IS HURLED BY GENERAL HUERTA

Who Says He'll Take To Mountains and Fight Rather Than Consent To Resigning.

Vera Cruz, Mexico, April 27.—"I will not resign. I will take to the mountains with my men and my cabinet and will fight. That is the message sent out to the people of Mexico City by Gen. Victoriano Huerta, according to reports given by a staff correspondent of El Estrella, the principal Mexican newspaper of the capital, and the newspaper which has been one of the chief organs of the Huertistas. The correspondent is a Mexican, who knows Gen. Huerta well. He arrived here on the American refugee train for his newspaper. The declaration of Gen. Huerta, if later events verify it, means, in the opinion of well-informed men here, that all efforts at mediation by the A. B. C. powers will fail.

WAR NOW ON WITH MEXICO

Americans' Blood Shed To Prevent Huerta From Receiving Ammunition

Federals Expect To Blow Up Bridge To Stay Progress of the Yankees

Four Americans Killed and Twenty-one Wounded

Washington.—The United States and Mexico are now engaged in their second war.
The conflict began when Mr. Adm. Fletcher, acting under instructions from the president, communicated to him by the secretary of the navy, seized Vera Cruz, the gateway to Mexico City.
The finer differentiations of international law as to what constitutes or does not constitute an act of war were aside when marines and bluejackets were landed from Fletcher's squadron, and by force of arms took possession of the principal seaport on the east coast of Mexico.
Blood is shed.

The blood of American enlisted men was shed in this attack, and when Fletcher sent a cable to the navy department that the casualties numbered four dead and 21 wounded it became idle to quibble about the precise legal character of the operations of the United States.

Senators who shrank from characterizing the aggression of the national administration by the seizure of the war, but preferred to describe the action against Vera Cruz as an act of reprisal for an affront to the American flag, were less resolute in defending their definition of the seizure of that seaport when they were told of the purpose of Mr. Adm. Fletcher's dispatch.

Fletcher's first message announcing the seizure of Vera Cruz, as given out at the white house and navy department, read as follows:

"In face of approaching northern, landed marines and sailors from Utah, Florida and Prairie and seized custom house. Mexican forces did not oppose landing, but opened fire with rifle and artillery after our seizure of custom house."

"Prairie shelling Mexicans out of their position. Desantary Bring from house and streets. Hold custom house and section of city in vicinity of wharves and consular buildings, four dead and 21 wounded."

The text of this dispatch was transmitted to the senate when that body convened after the dinner recess and senators gravely were forced to admit that the United States was now engaged in a war with the de facto government of Mexico, of which Victoriano Huerta is the recognized head.

This dispatch from Vera Cruz was made public by the navy department: "It is reported that Commandant General Maas left Vera Cruz in a carriage, that his family followed in another carriage and that he had not been heard from since. The Mexican troops were turned loose to act as they pleased, few officers remaining."

The calamitous development which most men in congress had been hoping would be averted had taken place, and the situation is described by the single word "War."

Subsequently another program came from Fletcher, in which he announced that the railroad yards and rolling stock, cable office and other important buildings had been taken possession of by his men, indicating that he was proceeding in an energetic way to prepare for operations on a large scale by the superior naval force that is soon to arrive and by the regular army that is to sail from Galveston.

May Blow Up Bridge.
Naval officers manifested deep interest in the fall of a railroad trestle 12 miles out of Vera Cruz, which possesses great strategic value. It is feared that the forces of Gen. Huerta will attempt to blow up this trestle to stop railroad traffic between Vera Cruz and the capital and stay the progress of American arms. No information was received up to a late hour respecting operations near the trestle.
The part of Vera Cruz seized by the American forces early in the day included an area facing the harbor in the northern part of the city.

AVIATORS OFFER SERVICES
To Country if Needed, in Telegram Sent to Washington.

Sacramento, Cal.—E. A. Forbes, assistant general of the state national guard, announced that he had sent a telegram to Washington offering a company of California aviators for service in the United States army if needed in the Mexican trouble. Several aviators and airplane mechanics have signed the national guard's muster roll.
