Swift's Mine Again.

About the time so much was being said about the discovery of "diamonds" in Elliott county they predicted that it would not be very long until somebody would again "discover" the famous Swift Silver mine. These mines have been lost and found a good many times in the past 153 years mostly lost. A certain Louisiana was sure he had found it, or he knew exactly where to find it, five or six years ago. One Michael O'Neal, of Parkersburg, put in the last 11 years prospecting, and now he has gone on his tenth trip to locate the famous lost silver mine which was operated over 150 years ago by Jno. Swift. O'Neal believes he has secured information that will enable him to locate the mine from which Swift took ores that made him a fortune but which has been lost for over a century. This time he says it is in Wolfe or Estill county.

Sustains Judgement.

The Court of Appeals has sustained the Clark Circuit Court in the Marcum damage suit. The lower court gave Mrs. Abrelia Marcum, widow of the late J. B. Marcum, who was murdered in Jackson a few years ago, a judgment for \$8,000 as damages against Judge Hargis and Sheriff Callahan for the alleged complicity in the murder.

OBITUARY.

The sad and untimely death of Hon. W. H. Counts which occurred on the night of July 4th has brought sorrow to those near and dear to him and to all who knew him and were associated with him in a business or social way.

Mr. Counts was born in Pleasant Valley, about 4 miles from Olive Hill, Carter Co and attended the State Normal School at Lebanon Ohio. He was for a number of years a Teacher in the Public Schools of his native Co.

He also served his Co as Representative in State Legislature. He was married in Olive Hill in 1891 to Kate E. Brooks, who died 4 years later and in 1903 he was married to Minnie B. second daughter of Capt. C. C. Brooks who survives him.

Mr Counts tragic death has cast a gloom over the entire community, he was of a very cheerful nature and made many friends, and was the very soul of honor and fair dealing.

For the last 5 years he was engaged with the large Lumber firm of Vansant Kitchen & Co of Ashland Ky but had severed his connection with that firm several weeks ago. He went to Ashland on July 2nd to transact some business and returned on the 3rd and was not in Olive Hill again. He did not leave home except to visit a neighbor, Mr Jim Jarvis on the evening of the 4th for a short call.

He was in the best of spirits all the evening and retired at his usual time, his wife was awakened by the report of a shot about 11 o'clock and found him shot in the right temple and the revolver beside him.

The only cause that can be given was broken health and overwork.

He was buried beside his first wife at Lebanon Mo in the Brock cemetery 1/2 mile east of Olive Hill; there to await the Resurrection morn.

More blood-stain was added to the life garments of the Hargis-Abner side of the Beathitt feud, when Curt Smith was enticed into a death trap by the friends of the Hargis and Abners, of which he was prematurely warned but scoffed at the idea. He was enticed into a card game and when seated at the table with one Seigel Turner, he immediately noticed friends of Hargis and Abners closing in the room, whereupon he threw his hand to his hip pocket but before he could bring his gun into action Turner arose from his seat and shot Smith twice, then Smith fired three ineffective shots at Turner who had crouched behind the table.

Turner surrendered to the authorities and was locked up in jail at Jackson.

Bad feeling has existed between the Smiths and Abners and it is supposed his death was only the carrying out of a plot to get Curt Smith out of the way.

New Court House

Yes, a fine Concrete Court House in the Business Section of Town is certainly a very Commendable step. And, too, a new Brick Yard in the East End of Town goes to further add to the "good things" besides better balancing the Town.

At the last regular meeting of the City Council of Olive Hill Lodge No. 629, F. & A. M. laid before it a proposal for its consideration.

In substance the proposal was that said Lodge donate to the City of Olive their lot upon which the Masonic Hall is now standing, for the purpose of erecting public buildings thereon.

The proposal carried the provisions that, when the building shall be completed the city of Olive Hill make the Masonic Lodge deed for the third floor of the building.

A committee of six—three of the City's Councilmen and three of the Order—met Monday night and the matter was discussed and the sight agreed upon and the proposal accepted by the committee.

Further provisions were that the building is to be of concrete blocks, a three-story structure, not less than 50 x 60 feet, to be commenced in construction within 6 months and completed within 18 months and that no part of the building shall ever be used for a pool room or a saleroom for any kind of intoxicants.

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As regards the brickyard, we are able to assert that she is a sure go and no question or a shade to a supposition to the contrary. Dirt will be flying toward its building long before "snow time," but the tale will be told in time for us all to get in the rejoicing ring.
