## Look At The Eternal Hills; Lift Up Thine Eyes To The Mountain

### F. F. A. Hears Mrs. Ellington

Proudly the Foothills of Kentucky raise their heights around the City of Morehead, nestled in their midst. Like protecting sentinels they stand all about the fastest growing little city in Kentucky, lending their inspiration, summer and winter to the citizenry of the town, and to the visitors who are here for a short stay or a more extended sojourn. Pine, oak, birch, poplar, rear their heads, in an eternal struggle with the rock-topped peaks that rise on either side, trees that give the mountains the color of rich green in summer time, a green which turns to a darker-hued blue-black as distance intervenes.

Trees that in the autumn of the year, furnish the rich reds, the crimson, the scarlets, the brilliant yellow, the browns and the myriad colors that thrill the sight-seer and make of Morehead and its surroundings, the most beautiful spot in the entire world.

To the Indians of more than one hundred fifty years ago, these hills were sacred, much more sacred than to the white man who came later to despoil the forests with the industry that all but ruined the future of Eastern Kentucky, and it was only in much more recent

years that the descendants of these white men learned the great lesson of conservation and converted this great section into the Cumberland National Forest.

No gold rush has ever marred the tranquility of the Hills of Eastern Kentucky. Minerals there are in abundance, awaiting the magic touch to develop them. Coal and fire clay deposits have been developed, coal in surrounding counties, fire clay in abundance right in our own door yard. Yet the mineral wealth in this section of Kentucky is scarcely touched. Its industrial possibilities are still a matter for the future.

The Black Hills of South Dakota are thrilling and beautiful. The Yellowstone National Park is still one of the seven wonders of the world. The Grand Canyon of the Colorado and of the Yellowstone Rivers are majestic scenes of awe-inspiring beauty and sublime power. Yet, we who live in the Wonderland of Eastern Kentucky, know that we have beauty unsurpassed to offer to the visitor in our own Cumberland Hills.

The casual visitor will find much to justify the spending of at least a few days or hours, to drive over the forest trails from

Morehead, up, up into the hills. The majestic rock formations are at their best. The carvings of the ages stand out, the work of the winds and the elements. Again the Black Hills of the Dakotas have their Needles, but the Needles are not more colorful, not more impressive than the age-worn rocks tumbled in reckless confusion, as though the mountain gods in anger had hurled them and left them as they fell.

Three or four hours spent among the hills are well worth the time and effort. The Forest Trails are excellent, while the glimpses the visitor catches of Nature at her tumultuous best will justify many more hours if one cares to spend them.

More than one hundred, yes one hundred fifty years have passed since this country was first taken into the Union of States. Many more years have passed since it was first settled by the white man. Yet in the far reaches, the hidden valleys, there are still places in which the white man as scarcely trod. There are still forests that are primeval; there are still beauty spots of a wild and unexpected sort.

And as a fitting close to a short visit if it must be short, wind up the trail to the Look- (Continued On Page Three)

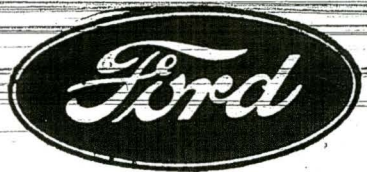

And then you come out on the Licking River Valley where broad smooth acres of farm land unsurpassed in productive quality even in the Bluegrass, soothe the eye, in summer with tossing corn and in winter with the soft browns of ripened and ready grain.

And so you return to Morehead by another route, repeating, but with ever changing variety, the rocks, the hills the scenery with a sense of well-being you have never had before.

A few years ago one of the chief problems encountered by tourists as well as farmers who wished to get to Morehead, or out, was highways. Fifteen years ago this community was proud of the fact that they were located on the Midland Trail, or Route 60, even though the highway was narrow and winding, even though the surface was rough and chuggy, even though the detours marking the route were worse than the average country road of today. Parts of this Trail were not surfaced, and there were in the entire county only eight miles of highway with any kind of a surface.

Today that condition no longer exists. Morehead has become a highway center, with good surfaced roads leading in every direction. We are still on Route 60, main arterial highway from East to West, and Route 60 has since that far day of fifteen years ago, been surfaced through out the length of the state. State Highway No. 11 carries a stream of traffic to the North while it continues through the city and up to the Big Sandy from Rodburn, surfaced to the county line. From here a good gravel highway leads to Sandy Hook and West Liberty and on up into the mountain section of Kentucky.

In addition to these arterial highways, the United States Forestry department has constructed over fifty miles of forest trail well surfaced, over which the traveler is invited to travel any time. These trails wind through the Cumberland National Forest, and furnish to those who are interested in the scenic routes of the nation, a trip that is equal to any found in more widely advertised sections.

Thus in the course of fifteen

or homes, and a poor that even in the poorest house in the community, a home has been established. But, in calling the attention of the reader to the homes of Morehead, the citizens of the city, point with mense number of modern homes pardonable pride to the im that have been erected in the past ten years.

A few years ago there was a demand for more and better housing. It was declared at that time that fifty new houses were needed. A building program immediately was inaugurated. The fifty houses were built and became homes as rapidly as they were finished. Since that time fifty more have been built, and twice fifty more, until today over two hundred new homes of the better type have been finished and the end is not yet in sight.

The strange part of this building program has been that there has been no apparent "boom". The progress has been rapid, it is true, but there has been no mad-rush of construction, such as is seen in boom towns in the oil sections of the Middle West. The growth has been steady, with every new house finished, and rented before the key is turned over the builder.

That is the kind of growth that makes for permanency, a solid growth and solid building. There is no rapid mushrooming of construction. Houses being constructed are as solid as the town in which they are being built. These are being built for homes, and they are being built into homes. There is no "here today, gone tomorrow" atmosphere about Morehead.

### Main Street

New York has its Broadway, Chicago has its Michigan Avenue, Los Angeles has its Hollywood Boulevard. But Morehead has its Main Street. And Morehead's Main Street is just what its name implies, the main meeting place of the people of Morehead and Rowan county. It has no Great White Way, but at night the mile long reaches of Main Street compare favorably with the White Ways of other cities, and, in a small way it is a replica of Main Streets all over the Nation.

And in even a smaller way, Main Street is to Morehead what Michigan Avenue is to Chicago, and Broadway is to New York. And Morehead is proud of its Main Street.

### A Bit Of History

A modern city is an old world setting. That is the opinion of

There is an interesting story about the Main Street of Morehead. In the early history of the village, it wound around and about, hitting here and hitting there, with no known beginning and no certain ending. It is said to have angled off about Brady Switch west of the city, down toward Triplett Creek, where it followed the bends and winds of the creek until it finally decided to come back to town. Then it continued on back of the court house, and left the limits at about the location of the College Stadium at present.

Gradually, however it was moved, first to Railroad Street and later to its present location. Cross streets, there were none, the present cross streets being at that time private roads leading one to a big barn, and what is now called Turnbo Avenue to the old Bishop Funeral warehouse. The only cross street in the town was Bishop Avenue.

Thus did Morehead grow, and of the city, exist a feature that makes the city picturesque and different.

be found in any country or any section.

Here the mightiest Architect of them all has worked His will. Here no man-made monument is carved out of the eternal rock, but the most impressive of monuments, just as the Architect of all nature left it. The chips from his chisel are huge boulders, piled in reckless profusion where he tossed them centuries ago, as he wrought with his magic tools. Here no steel and blasting powder were used. The only tools at the hand of this Master Sculptor were wind and rain and frost. How well He wrought, must be seen to be understood and appreciated.

Again we are in the Forest Trails. We pass Clearfield and climb Clack Mountain. We turn to our left taking what is called the "Wagner Road or branch of the Trail. Hugging the cliff we

glance ahead and the rock formations in all their majesty

are before us. Two miles of travel in this direction suffice. We turn and retrace our route and even more majesty bursts upon us. We pause to gaze down into apparently bottomless valleys, filled with swaying masses of forest as far as the eye can reach.

Back at the divide we take the right hand Fork of the Trail leading to Licking River. We make the round, beauty of the wildest sort on every hand. Far, far below, are seen the humble cabin homes of the farmers, and the small irregular fields that surround it. Like errant patches of black shadow,

they appear. Occasionally human figures, minute in the distance are seen and only then do you realize that you, driving along the trail, are far above the trail. Hugging the cliff we

A modern city is an old world setting. For many of these visitors have been to the middle west where streets are wide and the highways are straight for mile after mile.

There's a bit of history attached to the streets of Morehead without which much of its interest would not exist.

Morehead is the county seat of Rowan county, established as a county in 1856 out of parts of Elliott, Morgan and Fleming counties. And Rowan county, by the way was named in honor of Judge Rowan, the founder and builder of my Old Kentucky Home, at Bardstown, Kentucky. The town itself was named in honor of one of the early governors of the Commonwealth, Governor John Morehead.

But back of the historical setting. The town site was owned by Judge Hargis, one of the early mountain lawyers of the section. Judge Hargis was self educated and was rated as one of the outstanding lawyers of his time. He was lame and walked with a cane.

All of which has a direct bearing on the crooked streets and rakish lots in the city of Morehead.

When he decided to open the town for the sale of lots, he refused to call in a surveyor. He stepped off the lots, measuring them with his cane. A straight line meant nothing to him, except the shortest distance between two points. And what was distance, and why worry about shape? Here he decided, is a lot, and it is worth such a price. Take it or leave it. Usually the buyer took it. Streets were laid off in a similar man-
