College of Education Helps Students SOAR

Gov. Steve Beshear and U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers, co-chairs of Shaping Our Appalachian Region (SOAR), joined educators from 22 eastern Kentucky school districts to help kickoff an education initiative aimed at building a STEM-based (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) workforce by creating new opportunities for teachers through National Board Certification.

Morehead State University has partnered with several area organizations to provide 64 teachers in 22 of the highest unemployment, highest poverty SOAR counties with National Board Teaching Certification (NBTC). The selected teachers started the three-year program in July of this year. Along with obtaining the certification, teachers will

receive a master's degree with an emphasis on leadership at regional teaching centers close to their homes, plus rank change and salary increase, all provided at no cost to them or their school districts.

The program encourages teachers to be trained in STEM education through National Board Certification. The goal is for educators to prepare students for the workforce. "Our vision is to prepare students for postsecondary education and ultimately careers in fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics" said Belinda Hitch, project manager. "Creating a skilled, knowledgeable and dedicated workforce that can fill high-wage, high-demand jobs, drawing employers to the region. "

The vision for the SOAR-STEM project is to create economic opportunities that do not currently exist while fostering transformational change that can only be achieved through preparing a future workforce. Morehead State University's College of Education is pleased to be part of this change.

Featured Program: Master of Arts in English

A Master's in English is available in universities all over the Commonwealth and the United States; however, what makes the Master of Arts in English at Morehead State unique is that students from as nearby as the next county and as far away as the Pacific Rim have the ability to study with the MSU English graduate faculty.

The program, which can be taken entirely online, takes advantage of the convenience of the

current curricular technology which permits students to enter classes on Blackboard at any time of day. In addition, students receive a wealth of communication from faculty and have access to library databases which helps them to daily engage with the rapidly evolving digital world of literature and its scholarship.

Students take courses in British and American Literature and Technical and Creative Writing. Writing a scholarly or creative thesis is an option, though students may also choose a non-thesis option. The faculty are all active scholars and writers committed to bringing the fruits of their classroom experience to their online courses. Graduates of the program go on to earn PhDs in Literature and Composition and MFAs in Creative Writing. What's more, the program is ideal for teachers seeking to earn a

Master's or attain sufficient graduate credits either to teach dual credit courses or courses at the community college level. Courses are offered in fall, spring, two summer sessions and the upcoming winter term.

Spring and fall commencement bring great excitement for our faculty and students, as it presents an opportunity for both to meet each other IRL ("in real life") for the first time after years of getting to know one another through email and discussion posts. Further, each year the department selects an outstanding graduate student who is honored at the Caudill College Awards Convocation. Combining the best of traditional face-to-face programs with the ease of internet technology, the Master of Arts in English at Morehead State is truly blazing a trail forward. Early Graduate School Offers a Jump-Start

Do you know an undergraduate student who is close to completing their Bachelor's degree and is needing classes to fill their schedule? Are you advising students who are interested in graduate school, but are not sure if they have what it takes? Or, does one of your students want to get a jump-start on their Master's degree? The Early Graduate School program at Morehead State University is the perfect solution for these dilemmas!

Since fall 2013, a total of 41 Morehead State University undergraduate students have participated in the Early Graduate School. Of those, 27 students have earned a Bachelor's degree, and 19 (or 71%) have matriculated as graduate students at MSU. With 12 credits of graduate course work completed, Early Graduate School students gain valuable momentum and are close to half-way finished with their graduate degree (depending on the program) by the time they earn a Bachelor's degree!

Drew Kelly, pictured above, was one of the first students to complete a graduate degree having previously participated in the Early Graduate School program. Kelly took full advantage of the opportunity to enroll in twelve graduate credit hours in his senior year of undergraduate school. Not only did this give him a jump-start on his master's degree, it also allowed him time to adjust to graduate school courses at his own pace. Another huge benefit for Kelly was that the graduate hours, which he took as an early graduate student, were billed at the undergraduate tuition rate-a huge savings!
