



BUSINESS OFFICE REPORTS BIG INCREASE IN RESERVATIONS; NEW COURSES ADDED TO CURRICULUM

On Monday, January 30, when the first student wends his way across campus to the first registration station in the gymnasium of Morehead State Teachers College, from all reports and expectations it will be the biggest day in the largest enrollment of students ever to come here for the second semester.

Reports from the business office show that more reservations have been made for the second semester than the records have ever shown at this time of the year, and if reservations continue to increase in numbers, the school will see an increase in income. Morehead can look forward to a larger and more successful school year than she has heretofore experienced. The deans of the halls report that if all the reservations are taken, the dormitories will be filled

The reports referred to above indicate that not only are the rumors of the depression's diminishing the number of students attending college not true so far as this college is concerned, but also that the organization of the school is being improved to such an extent that the young man or woman can find more opportunities here than ever before, and can get his or her prerequisite work at this school, no matter what profession he is planning to take up. For example the student who is considering a career in medicine or law can now do his premedical or prelaw work here.

To make this possible, the administrative forces of the college have added new courses, enlarged the old courses, and improved the facilities so that the professors will be able to instruct the student in the most efficient manner possible.

ter the student will have approximately 170 courses from which to choose his schedule. About 80 of these are open to sophomore, junior and senior rating, but the remaining courses are open to all students. Five courses will be offered in Agriculture, eight in Art, nine in Biology

five in Chemistry, ten in Economics and Sociology, twenty-two in Education, twenty-six in English, four in French, four in German, ten in Geography, thirteen in History, three in Government, six in Home Economics, three in Library Science, fifteen in Mathematics, three in Physics, even in Music, eight in Physical Education and Health, and four in Industrial Arts.

The Agriculture Department, under the supervision of Professor H. C. Haggan, is offering a new course next semester dealing with the structure of soils.

Four additional courses in the Department of Education, under the direction of Prof. E. V. Hollis will be offered. They are "Teaching the Common Branches," "High School Administration," "Educational Psychology for Elementary Teachers," and "Educational Psychology for High School Teachers."
