Hayti, that the people of that county are boring under great embarrassments from the depressed state of commerce and credit and the scarcity and dearness of the means of subsistence. The embarrassment is altributed partly to the financial difficulties in foreign countries, particularly the United States, and partly to drought, which has affected the different parts of the re-public and cut off its principal resources. President Boyer in his proclamation exhorts the Haytians to apply themselves by their industry and a prudent economy, to in-uring the means of subsistence for themselves and their families-to rely upon their own resources, without depending for the supply of their wants upon foreign commerce, which may be again struck with the same disasters which paralise it at present, and its relations may be sud dan'y in'erupted by unexpected wants. He exhorts them particularly to apply themselves to the cultivation of the earth and to the raising of those nutricious roots which are safe against the fury of huricones, long continued drought, or an ex-cess of rain. He calls upon the public functionaries to watch over the execution of the laws, to exhibit in their example a zeal in the cultivation of the earth, to repress idleness, and to see that the rights and property of their fellow citizens are protected.
