REVELLERS CLUB CHANGES PLAY: TO PRESENT "CAT O' NINE TAILS" INSTEAD OF "THIRTEENTH CHAIR"

Reorganization Meeting Held; New Try Out Rules Adopted; John Simons Is Elected President; First Play To Be Given Soon

At a re-organization meeting of the Revelers Dramatic Club, Wednesday evening, February 15, the members decided to present the three-act mystery play, "Cat O' Nine Tails" instead of "The Thirteenth Chair" as originally planned. The decision was reached because the latter play had been presented here previously a number of times, and because numerous requests have been received from the student body to select another play.

The cast for the newly selected play will be chosen by the tryouts during this week and next. Production will start immediately in order to be able to give the presentation during the last week of next month.

"Cat O' Nine Tails" is a mystery play by the well-known playwright, Laurence B. Worcester. It is a Baker's production and their reports describe the play in its manner. "Take one cold-blooded murderer, add to it a human skeleton, referred to as 'offensive', a blood-curdling shriek, unearthly noises, a female Sherlock Holmes, a half-witted nurse, a mad doctor, a man from the ground tunnel, a vicious dog, heard but not seen, a nervous wreck, a mad scientist, an international crime, coffee, flavor with comedy and sweeten with a secret love affair. For the last two hours, the Revelers will serve with thunder and lightning, and you'll enjoy the taste of that most heaving, the mystery 'trappe'."

At the same meeting the play for becoming a member of the dramatic club was changed from "The Thirteenth Chair" to "Cat O' Nine Tails". Debate Team Wins From Austin Peay

Morehead Goes Unanimous Decision Over Tennessee School

Taking the negative side of the cancellation of the inter-collegiate war left question, the Morehead debate team won its first contest of the 1933 season from the Austin Peay Normal School, Peay, Tenn., in the auditorium here, February 10.

Peay team is one of the strongest in the Tennessee Intercollegiate Debate League, and is expected to make a strong bid for John year's state championship.

The Tennessee institution was represented by William Adams and James Mann. Kathryn Pope and Mahan Magarian debated for Morehead. Five members of the Morehead debating squad—Vahan Magarian, George Bailey, John Corlette, Troy Savage, and Everett Cosmanguer, went to Ashbury College, Wilmore, Ky., for an inter-collegiate debate in a non-decision open format. The custom of having one school win and the other lose was established last year, when Ashbury met the Morehead squad at Morehead. In Thursday's open format, Corlette, Bailey and George Bailey took the affirmative side and Troy Savage and Everett Cosmanguer, the negative. Vahan Magarian acted as the manager. Coach Lloyd made the statement that this type of forensic activity aids greatly in establishing a friendly contact between the two institutions.

The Morehead Frosh quintet, defeated in six games this season, lost to the superior height of the Louisville Frosh and lost 42 to 30.

SPEAK IN CHAPEL

Dr. Paul H. Clyde, professor of history of the University of Kentucky, will appear in the Morehead College auditorium during the convocation hour, Monday, March 6.

He will speak of "The Causes of the Chinese-Japanese Conflict," in "Manchuria."

In the evening he will address the Morehead Women's Club on "The Policy of the League of Nations and the United States toward the Manchurian Problem."

Dr. Clyde lectured recently at St. Paul, Minnesota, and Columbus, Ohio, before the Foreign Policy Association, in each place, the Lytle Report with George H. Blakeslee, legal advisor to General Mc Coy of the Lytle Commission, and George H. Sokolsky, Far Eastern expert of the New York Times.

He was in the D. D. Stanford University, Palo Alto, California, and has taught in the Ohio State University and Stanford. He has also had published one book and numerous articles dealing with problems

connected with Far Eastern history and diplomacy. In 1929, he was sent to the Far East by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace to study conditions there.
