THE RING FINGER.—An opinion has prevailed, from the earliest ages, not confined to the ignorant Americans, that the ring finger of the left hand, by means of some extraordinary vein, or other channel, possesses the extraordinary faculty of drawing from or discharging the blood from the heart, which makes it in a peculiar manner the appropriate finger for "a marriage ring."
