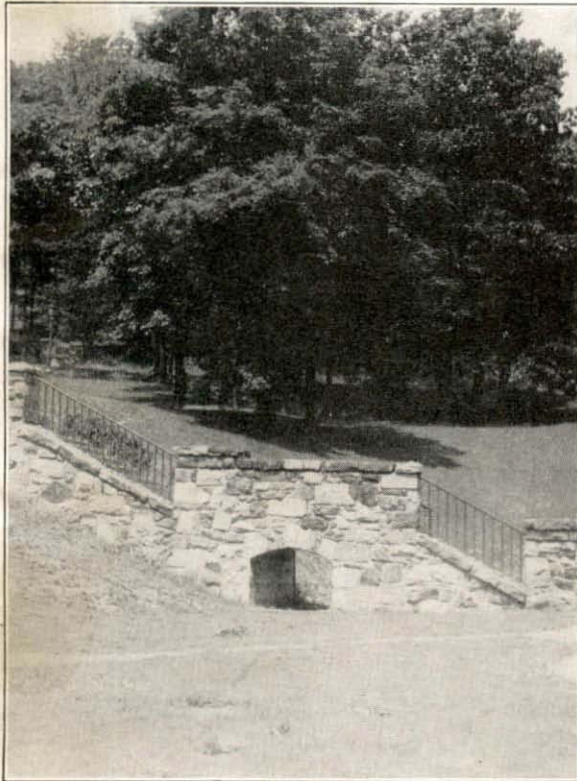

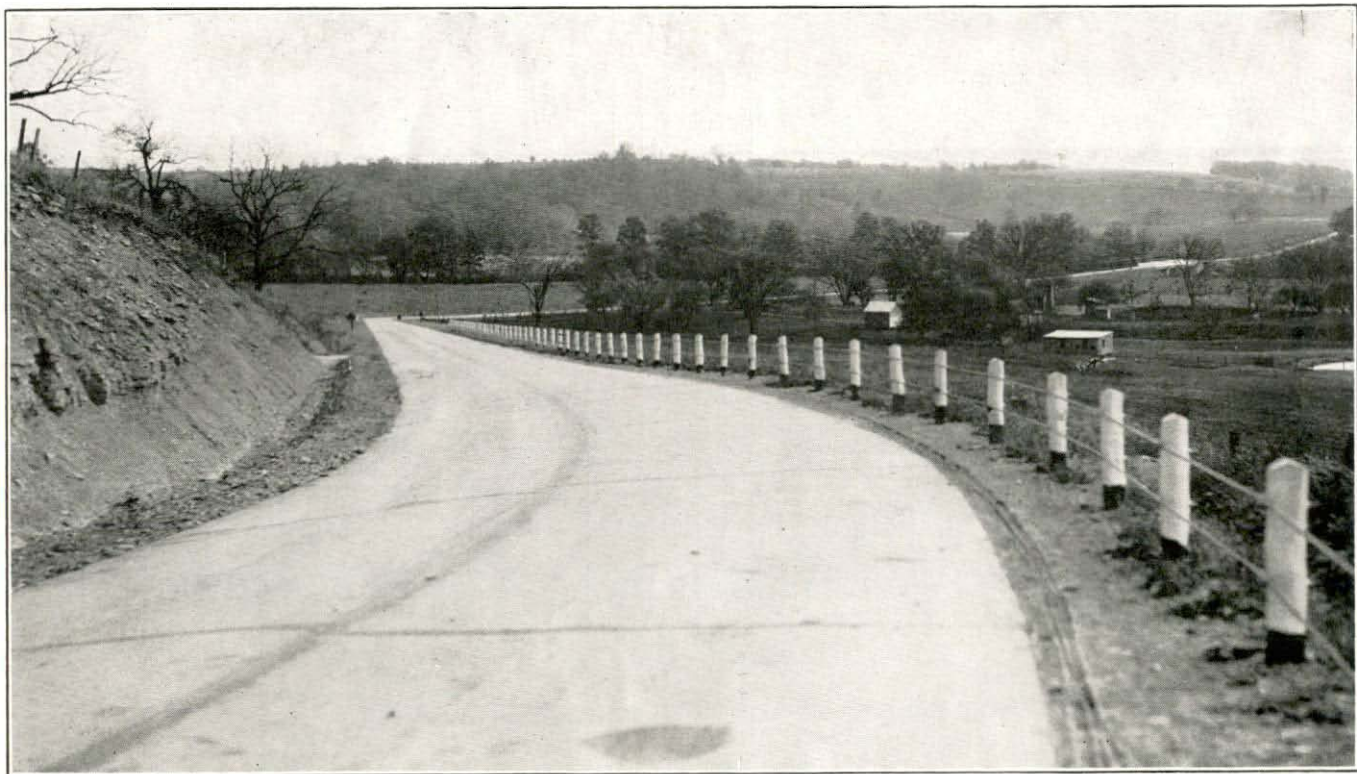

TRAINING SCHOOL

SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL DIVISION

The summer term in the Senior High School will begin on June 10th and close on August 2nd. Classes will meet twice daily for six days a week and a high school student will be allowed to earn one unit of credit during the term. An incidental fee of four dollars (\$4.00) will be charged.

The student-teaching program in this division will follow the same general plan that is pursued during the regular year.

ELEMENTARY AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL DIVISIONS

The Elementary School and the Junior High School will begin on June 17th and close July 26th. School will be in session each morning for five days a week.

The student-teaching program at these levels will be conducted according to the following general plan—

1. During the first week of the college term the critics will meet their student teachers for two hours daily in special conferences designed to prepare them for the actual teaching that for five days a week.
2. Teaching and observation will be carried on during the six-week period that the elementary grades are in session. One hour of teaching and one hour of directed observation will be required daily.
3. During the final week of the college term a program will be arranged that will include—
 - a. Remedial work in the fundamentals of learning for student teachers who need it. This will include actual instruction in spelling, penmanship, reading, composition, speech, etc.
 - b. Conferences for special groups. A series of conferences dealing with the special problems involved at the various grade levels will be arranged for those who are teaching in two and three-room schools. Similar provision will be made for consideration of the various subject fields. This work will be done on regular schedule and an examination given at the close of the week.

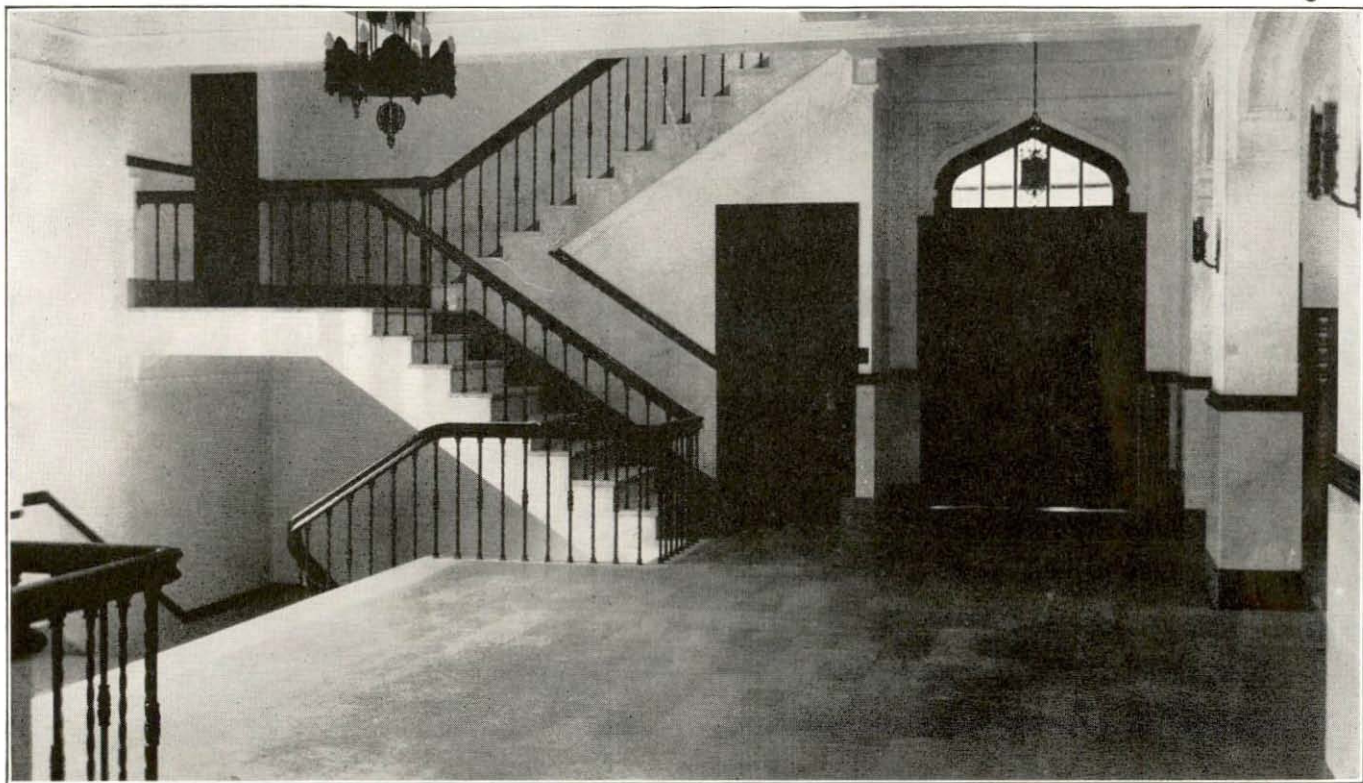

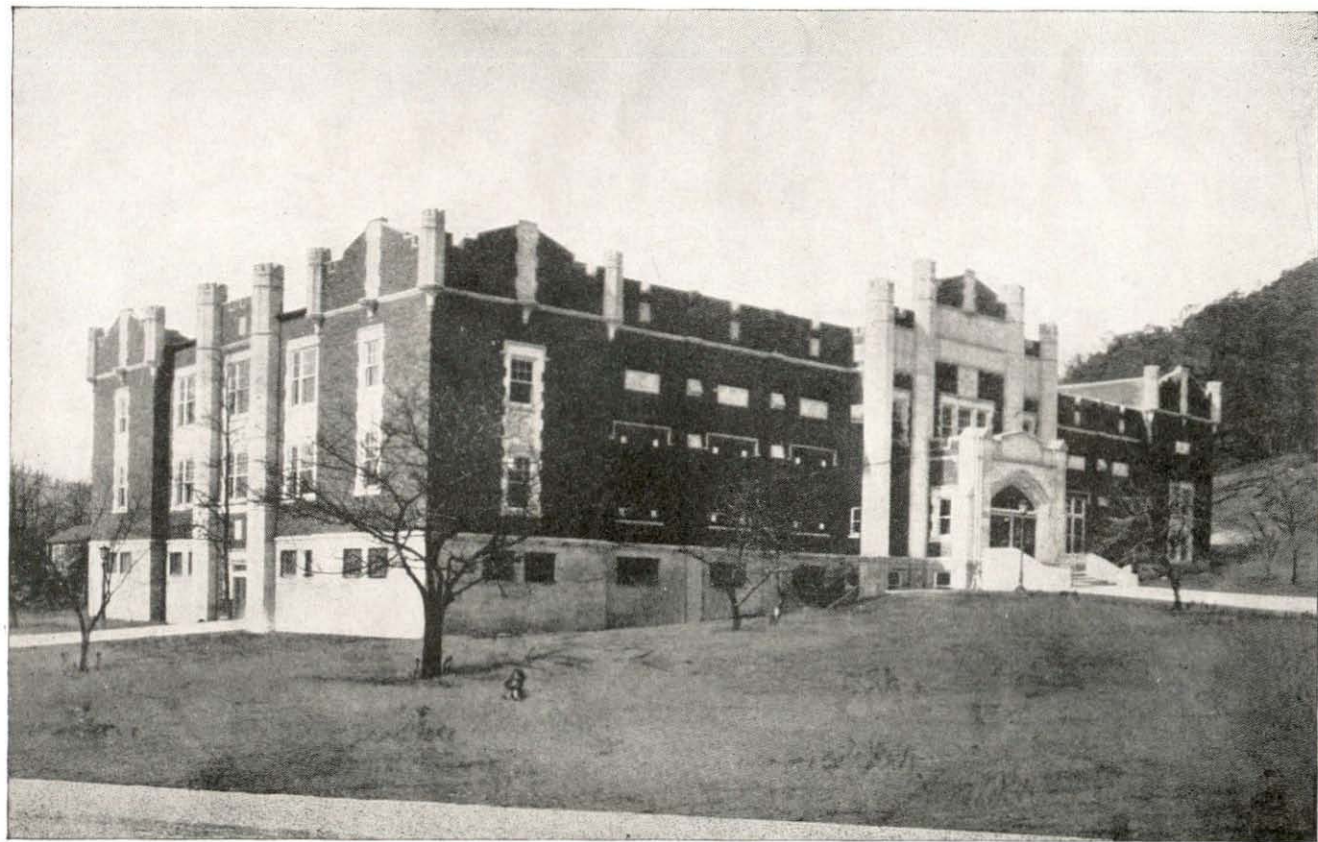

MAJORS AND MINORS

Not later than the beginning of the sophomore year, the applicants for degrees must file with the Registrar their selections of majors and minors. (This does not include those who are applying for the Bachelor of Arts with the Standard Elementary certificate.) The heads of the departments in the major and minor fields must approve the course to be taken before the blank is filed. Two majors of twenty-four hours each, or one major of twenty-four hours and two minors of eighteen hours each, may be selected.

CURRICULA

The curricular offerings at Morehead are varied. Students may pursue courses leading to the (1) Provisional Elementary certificate; (2) the Standard Elementary certificate and the degree; (3) the Provisional High School certificate and the degree; (4) the Provisional certificate in Administration and Supervision and the degree; and (5) the degree without a certificate. The college awards two degrees, the Bachelor of Arts and the Bachelor of Science. Each degree may be taken with or without a certificate. The student should notice that the requirements for the degrees differ according to the type of degree and the type of certificate. The chief distinction between the Bachelor of Arts degree and the Bachelor of Science degree is the 60-hour requirement in science for the Bachelor of Science degree. There are also differences between the Bachelor of Arts degree with the Elementary certificate and the same degree with the High School certificate. There are accordingly eight distinct courses of study leading to the degree. A student should choose early in his college career which course he prefers to take.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE

The candidate for the degree must meet the following general requirements:

1. A minimum of 128 hours of prescribed and elective college credit.
2. A standing of 1 on all work offered for a degree.
3. At least three-fourths of the credit in residence in some standard college and at least one year in residence and one semester immediately preceding graduation in this institution.
4. Not less than 43 hours of the work offered for the degree should be selected from courses numbered 300 or above.

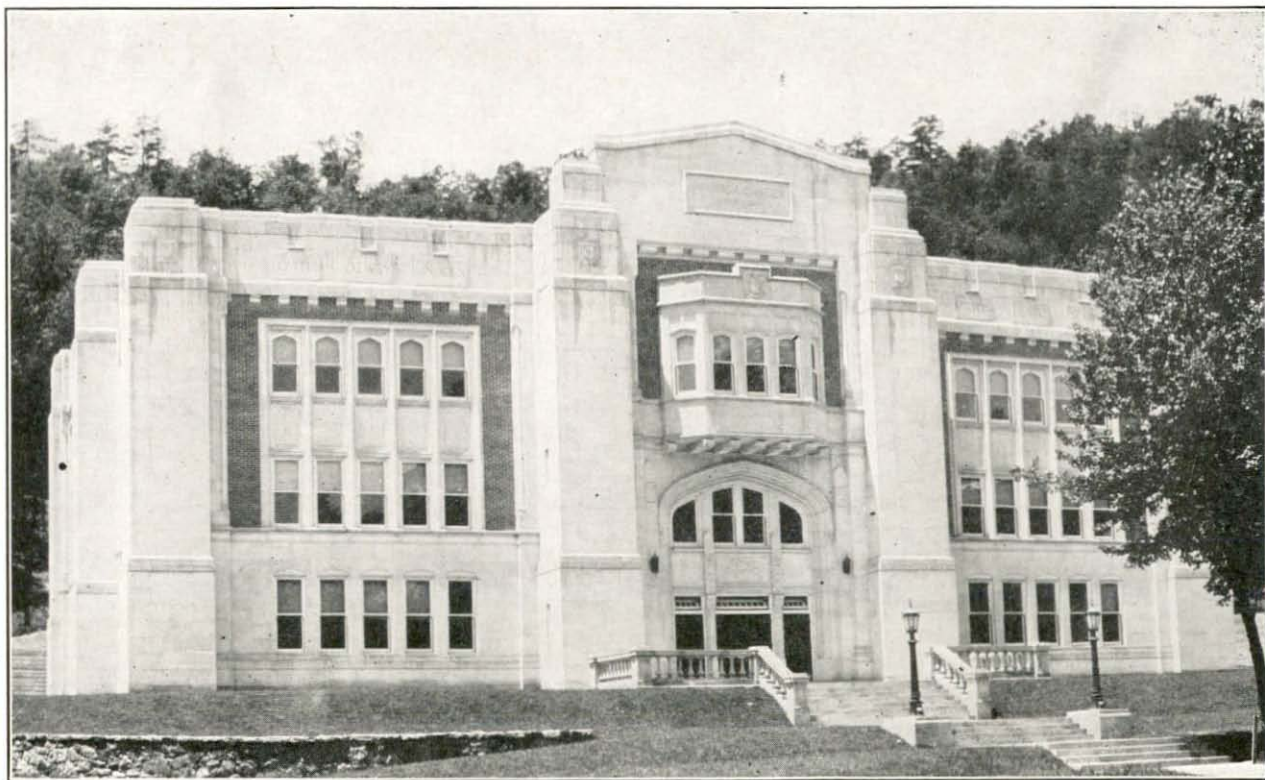

Attendance Officer's Certificate valid for three years shall be issued to a person who has met the requirements of law and who, in addition thereto, completes (a) a two-year curriculum for the training of teachers, which curriculum shall include three semester hours in pupil accounting; or (b) completes a two-year standard college curriculum which shall include 12 semester hours in education courses with 3 semester hours in pupil personnel. This certificate may be reissued every three years upon three years' experience as attendance officer, or 16 semester hours of standard college training.



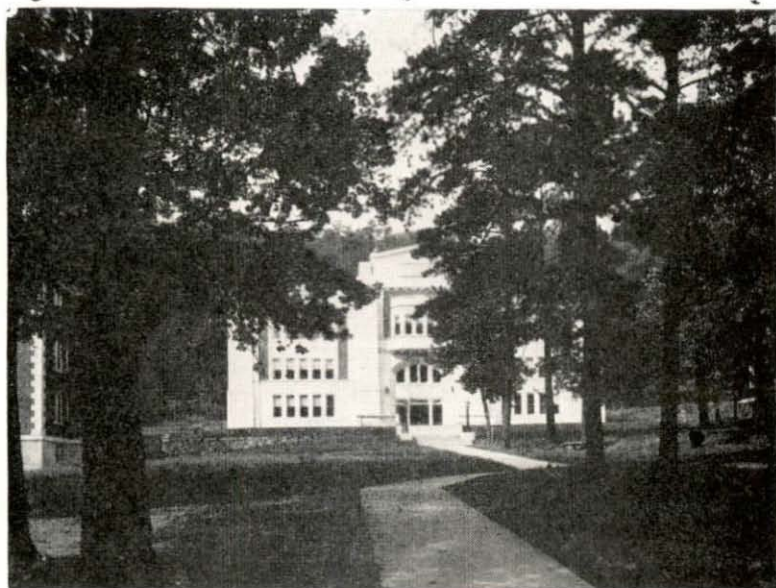
