HOW TO BORROW MONEY FROM THE FEDERAL FARM LOAN BANKS. Washington, Jan. 16.—The right to borrow under the Farm Loan Act is limited to farmers and prospective farmers. Farmers or prospective farmers who wish to borrow group themselves into a Farm Loan Association, each association composed of ten or more farmers, and each association starting with a minimum of at least \$20,000 in loans.

PAINTSVILLE, KENTUCKY, THURSDAY, JANUARY 25, 1917. KENTUCKY SOLDIERS MUST SERVE OUT TERM OF ORIGINAL ENLISTMENT. Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 20.—Kentucky ex-armies, some of whom will serve a longer term of enlistment than that of the United States Soldiers, automatically will go back into the Kentucky National Guard for the remainder of the term of their enlistment. Under the National Defense act, which was being put into operation when the troops were mobilized for service on the border, the enlistment is for six years, three years in the colors and three in reserve, with the privilege of serving the full six years without being called to the colors. The term of enlistment dates from the time they were mustered into the Federal service, but from the date of their discharge from the National Guard, and thirty-three of the Kentucky men who had served their three-year period, while on the border, already have been transferred to the reserve and will be called to the colors when listed at Fort Thomas, of course, have their six years to serve from that date.

They feed well at cost \$1.60 for the month. So you see there is \$3.50 profit. Poultry business looks good.
