J. J. HOOPER. A few words of explanation to the fellow farmers and mare owners of Johnson county, I feel that we are fortunate in securing one of the eleven stallions belonging to the Kentucky State University for this season.

The horse is at my place and will make the stand there, but when a neighborhood can furnish a bunch of good mares, say 10 or more, I will meet with the owners at one central point convenient to them. I am required to put the service fee at \$10, but not in advance, which is very low considering the breeding of this horse. (Which you usually stand on.)

Where a mare owner is old and feeble and wants me to will let the horse to his place if he will let me know. This breed of horses possesses more stamina, courage and endurance and are more tractable (touchable) than any other breed of horses.

NOTE—I would suggest to owners whose mares are not carrying foals this spring to begin breeding early.

Don't forget to feed the birds this cold weather. Remember that it is impossible for them to get anything to eat now when the ground is covered with snow.

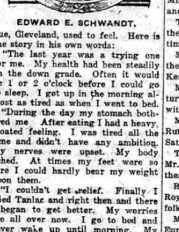
