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THE STEAMER GREAT BRITAIN.—A Liverpool paper thus describes the appearance of this vessel, when lately brought to this port, after having lain so long upon the rocks of the Irish coast:

The red streaks upon the hull are certainly less visible than they were twelve months ago; and in several places a brown hue has been removed, and the excoriations from every one who saw her again, were—"how well she looks!—how little the change!—how splendid her appearance!"

POTATOES.—This vegetable has advanced twenty-five to thirty per cent. in this market in consequence of the accounts published in the newspapers of the appearance of potato rot in different countries of the American Provinces.

The wheat crop of Michigan and Wisconsin in Washington, will not fall short of 8,000,000 bushels, nor exceed 10,000,000 bushels. The quality of the grain this year is superior in every respect to the crop of last year.

In regard to the condition of the crop in Wisconsin, the Buffalo Commercial Advertiser, of Monday, says:—"The big diggings arrived here on Saturday with a cargo of 10,000 bushels of Wisconsin wheat, of this year's crop, which for plumpness, of berry and color, exceeds any wheat thing ever before received from that quarter."
