The casualty insurance industry has reached maturity, as James A. Beha, general manager of the National Bursau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters, recently pointed out—and its history since the say nineties marks one of the most dramatic and interesting pages in the story of American industry.

In 1896, the total of casualty premiums paid in the entire country amounted to only \$17,288,000. The first compensation laws were adopted in 1911, and by 1200, 41 other states had followed suit. In 1929, compensation premiums totaled \$235,000,000. 




