LOOK NOW — DON'T WAIT!: An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure—and one thorough inspection of your property may prevent a disastrous fire.

AN INDUSTRY REACHES MATURITY: The casualty insurance industry has reached maturity, as James A. Beha, general manager of the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters, recently pointed out.

IN 1896, the total of casualty premiums paid in the entire country amounted to only \$17,288,000. In 1935 it came to a total sum of \$990,000,000.

ONE OF THE main contributory causes of the development of the casualty industry was the invention of the automobile. In 1895, there were four cars registered in the United States.

By 1935, there were over 25,000,000. The first automobile liability insurance policy was written in 1898, when 800 cars were registered in the country.

By 1935, there were over \$347,000,000. Thus a minor form of liability insurance grew until it included all other forms.

A great change has taken place in employer's liability insurance—this kind of insurance has been superseded, in all except two states, by workmen's compensation insurance.

Burglary and robbery insurance has also grown rapidly—due largely to high speed automobiles and good roads, which have added to the mobility of criminal gangs.

So it goes, in almost every phase of the casualty and liability field. The industry is performing an invaluable public service which grows increasingly important in our high standard of business and economic life.

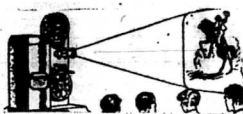

BUSINESS MAN-PRINCE DEFENDS MODERN INDIA



Anandi Prasad Kaicker Tells How Hindus Combine Caste Traditions With Modern Business Methods

"In discussing India, most foreigners and some few native writers refuse to give the devil his due," says Anandi Prasad Kaicker, ranking Indian prince who was interviewed recently during a business trip to the United States.

"People speak of the backward India," he said, "yet throughout the East, which represents in population and area more than half the world, India is referred to as 'the golden sparrow' because of her smiling face and more type of a market."

"Many Hindus of high rank now engage in business," Mr. Kaicker himself is manager for the Remington Rand Company in Delhi, the capital of India. His office has worked out a system for the sale of typewriters which is similar to your installment plan," he explained.

India, as few Americans seem to know, has a compulsory educational system for all children up to a certain age. This is similar to the public school system in the United States.

"To show you the standing of our people as far as intelligence and education are concerned," Mr. Kaicker continued, "I'll give you the successful competitors in British Civil Service Examinations for India are native Hindus."

Meanwhile the wives of Cabinet

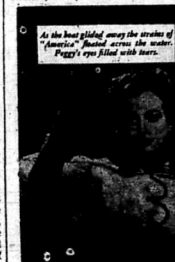
"I have made no statement," said Peabody awkwardly, "that they were actually witnessed by me, or any of my colleagues, but—"

Seven Kentucky colleges are represented in Morehead Independent's all-state K.I.A.C. football eleven, selected today on the merits of the players during the season just closed.

Morehead, Centre, Western and Murray each placed two men on the team and Eastern, Georgetown and Louisville one. The Morehead Eagles who stood at the top of the heap as the general standings, placed four on the second team.

At ends Robinson of Georgetown and Emerson of Louisville were selected. Robinson will be remembered as the lad that has kept the Georgetown Tigers in many a ball game with his punting, and it was his ability to kick that gave him the edge over several other good performers at end. Robinson is, by no means, weak in other departments. He is a good defensive player and a fair pass receiver. Emerson, Cardinal end, has played consistent good ball all year, although he was named on the all-state team by an eye-bash over Hammonds of Morehead and his teammate Lamar. Captain Robert "Bush-hog" Brashear, captain of the Morehead club was named at one tackle berth and also was awarded the captaincy of the first team. This Eagle tackle, who backs up the line on defense, is undoubtedly one of the state's greatest performers. When Coach Ellis Johnson says that he is the best player he has ever seen that means something for Ellis has played against plenty of all-American caliber.

The other tackle selection was

almost as easy as that of Brashear. It goes to Land of Murray, who is one of the spearheads in the "horning" high-scoring club. Land played good ball all year, being equally as potent on defense as on the offense. Since the center berth is awarded to Caple, captain of the Western team, also another outstanding and consistent performer, E. Gaines of Centre was shifted from a center place to a guard. It appears impossible to give Gaines off the team, although it is doubtful if he packs the power of Caple. Cook of Western was named as the offensive end, but wasn't given much of an edge over Griffin of Western.

The quarterback was an easy one to pick. "Tiny Tim" Wyant of Morehead, the flashiest player in the state, a triple threat man and the boy given a great deal of credit for the remarkable rise of the Teachers was picked. Wyant runs, kicks and passes.

The remainder of the backfield did not present much of a problem. German of Centre and Land of Eastern have earned so capably all year that it is almost impossible to leave them out, while Thompson of Murray, has consistently led off the line and made him a deserving selection. Statura of Union, Keating, Louisville, Britt, Transylvania and Reynolds of Morehead, are close second to all of these backs. It was also difficult to leave such players as Sullivan of Centre, Gaines of Centre, Patrick of Georgetown and Lowe of Louisville off both the first and second teams.

Selections were made on a basis of consistency instead of performance in one or two games.

THE SHOT THAT CAN'T BE GUARDED!

Lawrence Carter, Morehead College Forward, Has Developed Basketball Shot That Has Never Been Stopped

Day by day every way this boy Lawrence Carter looks better, and better!

As the Morehead basketball team goes through practice session after practice session different men attempt to guard the shots of this Harlan product lets loose. So far no one has succeeded in stopping it very unlikely that Carter will be halted at any time during the year.

An unguardable shot! You may wonder that there is such a thing, but after you see Lawrence Carter in action a few times at Morehead college you, same everyone else, will have to admit that he has the shot that cannot be guarded.

Certainly Carter doesn't have eyes in the back of his head. At the same time it appears that he shoots without looking at the basket. The surprising part about it all is that he put them through the hoop—getting a far better percentage than any man on the club. Lawrence Carter was named all-state center this year. This year he has been moved to forward and that he will be a greater player than he was last spring.

What most people would call "form". Actually, he is awkward looking—at times ungainly. But, he is a basketball player of the first calibre, a good guard, consistent and a hard player—but most of all he has the shot that cannot be guarded.

To describe just how Carter executes this shot is almost impossible. After you see it a few times you will still not know the fine points of how it is done. He stands with his back to the basket. The ball is slipped to him. He raises one elbow (either one) takes a step forward or towards the center of the floor and then shoots. The surprising part about it is done in the matter of a second or so. The elbow is to keep his guard from reaching over his shoulder and blocking the shot, although even if he didn't throw it up it is doubtful if the shot could be stopped. Carter simply throws his head back just as he shoots. If he is up against a good guard he just uses force for he knows in his mind where that basket is.

Last season Carter averaged 18 points a game. He was a sophomore then. With better teammates this year he should better this average.

Carter is not the only scoring player on this Morehead club. This fact has been amply demonstrated in the scrimmages that have already been held. Arzen, who will be Carter's running mate at forward has a good shooting average. He is fast, sometimes leaving his guard for a clear path to the basket. Arzen is also

12-4 after a great defensive battle. Western was never leading more than 2 to 4 points in this game until right at the last. This was the tilt in which Morehead forced the ball for 10 straight minutes. Last year Western turned on the heat and defeated the Eagles 74 to 36 in the tournament.

If Morehead plays the type of basketball that their supporters believe they will, the Teachers would be invited to the tournament at Jackson. The winner of the tournament and the two teams that finish the highest in the general standings are invited to the meet. Unless other K.I.A.C. clubs have better material than they are conceded at this time, it appears very likely that the Eagles will get to the general S.I. A.A. meet.
