DEATH IN A MINE

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A DEADLY EXPLOSION OF DUST

This is thought to have caused Disaster at Works of Volante Coal Company—near Virginia City, Where 111 Were Killed Two Years Ago.

Volante, Ala., Dec. 18.—Forty-two bodies have been taken from the ill-fated Volante mine, in which an explosion occurred Monday. Nineteen more are reported in the mines, making a total of sixty-one victims.

Birmingham, Ala., Dec. 17.—Advisors from Volante indicate that there may be more than 100 bodies by the explosion in the ill-fated Volante mine. The explosion is very deep and while hundreds of miners from the adjacent mining camps are present to assist in the work, it is thought that all of the dead bodies lie frozen out below the surface.

So far the cause of the explosion has not been determined. The mine had not been seen pronounced free from gas by the state mine inspectors, and it is supposed that the explosion was caused by dust. When a mine is not properly sprinkled and the air is allowed to get filled with the dust, particles of it become almost as explosive as gas itself. Not until some hours after the explosion was it possible to venture over near the site of the mine, so hot was the air that it was rushing out.

The explosion was beyond the second right shaft. The mine gas was something like 1,500 feet. There was a terrific explosion, the force of which was seen outside and timber being blown out in great quantities, destroying small buildings near by and also landing on the depot some large distances away. There was a second blast wave immediately after the explosion.

Officials of the company on the scene immediately took steps to make a rescue party to get to the men on the inside. The fans were started up, the mine gas was bled out, and the explosion was still in progress to venting even near the mouth of the mine, so hot was the air that it was rushing out.

Volante mine is but a few miles from Virginia City, where a similar explosion occurred about two years ago, 112 men being killed at that time.

All Bodies Not Yet Removed. Panama, W. Va., Dec. 18.—Several more bodies were today brought from the mines at Monongah, the scene of the explosion on December 6. The total number of bodies removed is 228, and the records show at least ten more in the workings.

Washington has been teeming with politics during the past week. President Roosevelt has reiterated his statement made on Election Night, three years ago, that he will not under any circumstances accept another nomination for the Presidency. The Democratic National Committee has held its regular meeting and selected Denver for the place and July 7 for the date of the next Democratic national convention. Political gossip regarding the result of the President's announcement and the nomination of the Democracy's presidential candidate have been rife.

As soon as it became known that Mr. Roosevelt had officially reiterated his determination not again to run for the presidency, every would-be Republican presidential candidate's heart beat faster, everyone but Cortelyou's. Secretary Cortelyou had been conducting a gun-shoe boom under the cloak of enthusiasm for a third term for Teddy and his declination proved a severe blow to Secretary Cortelyou's aspirations. These goods should be searched for high and low till found and then put the thieves where the law says they belong. A little more boldness on the part of the lawless and a little more "humbleness" on the part of the law-abiding citizens will practically place thugs in controle and result in a desperate thug gang with headquarters in our vicinity in an impregnable rendezvous from where the may plot, plan, sell liquor, take their stolen goods and carry on unmentionable lawless deeds in defiance to any kind of government, morals, law, officers and citizens. Determination to do their deeds at any expense, at any hazards—risk of life not excepted—is the limit of their aspirations, and until citizens awake to their duty to their families, themselves, relatives, friends, the law that they helped to mould—their govern-

ment—and enter the army for eternal destruction of such characters armed to the teeth with equal determination and invade their haunts and disperse them without mercy, we will continue to be terrorized, annoyed and victims of danger and treachery.

We have something more to say this week in regard to the lawlessness in and around Olive Hill. But before beginning we want to tip our hat to the Grayson Tribune for its timely article on the situation in the West end of Carter. It is in a spirit of eminent fairness and is timely and good. Come again, for we need your suggestions and assurance of assistance, for if ever a community was in the throes of a reign of lawlessness and passing through a period of reconstruction it is ours. We are still of the opinion, however, that the law is all powerful and if rigidly and rigidly enforced, will clean up the filth in this part of the moral vineyard and restore law and order where all now is a most chaos.

We were on the train a few days since with a gentleman from Kansas, just before reaching Olive Hill he asked me if I thought he would be in any danger or in passing through Olive Hill if he stayed strictly in the car. I said I thought he would be in no danger.

This goes to show what kind of a name we have abroad, and no wonder. Stumblers hold forth almost under the very noses of our officers. Prostitutes carry on their soul destroying traffic within the city limits. Traveling moonshiners and bootleggers make our young men, and some of the older ones, drunk seven days out of the week, while souls are damned, homes wrecked and mothers' hearts broken. We say nothing of the murders and other crimes committed within less than two miles of Olive Hill, and all of who go practically unpunished. But we are going to do something for we are already talking about it.

This article contains a whole lot of awful indictments against the good people of our community but they are awful truths all the same. One ray of sunshine came in from behind a dark cloud a few days ago when two officers came up from Grayson and arrested three women and two men charged with grave offenses, but one of the men was released on his own recognizance and will likely turn up again about the year 1910.

These articles, calling attention to the awful state of lawlessness existing in and around Olive Hill, will continue from week to week and get warmer each time till our people arise in their manhood and womanhood and give vigilantes to understand that laws were made to be respected and obeyed.

—THURSDAY—

A slight earthquake shock was felt at Santiago, Cuba. No damage was done.

Harry C. Fallam was re-elected president of the National League of Baseball clubs, for the sixth time.

The Farmers' Union warehouse at Taylor, Tex., together with about 2,000 bales of cotton, was destroyed by fire.

Emperor William has benefited greatly by the rest cure taken at Highcliffe castle, and has enjoyed his visit in England very much.

Five valuable pictures have been stolen from the Musée at Amiens, France, together with a collection of coins and art objects, valued at about \$50,000.

The general land office has issued instructions for the sale of certain lands remaining undisposed of in Oklahoma, under sealed bids to highest bidder for cash.

—FRIDAY—

The Bank of Aldrich, Mo., was robbed of \$5,000 by three men, who held up the cashier.

Grave anxiety is felt regarding the condition of Lord Kelvin, the famous scientist. He has been ill for several weeks.

The senate has confirmed the appointment of Abraham L. Lavalee of Indiana to the third assistant postmaster general.

Three unidentified men, apparently farmers, were found dead in a room filled with gas, at a hotel at Chicago. A gas jet in the room was found open.

Henry Lacy, who shot and killed W. W. Parker, whom he mistook for the alleged destroyer of his home, was convicted of murder at Webb City, Mo., and sentenced to life imprisonment.

—SATURDAY—

Secretary Hester's statement of the world's visible supply of cotton shows a total of 4,184,487, against 4,072,125 last week.

Business failures in the United States for the week number 284, against 272 last week and 229 in the week of 1906.

William Shields, a steamboat man, committed suicide at Parkersburg, W. Va., by shooting, after falling to kill his wife, whom he shot through the head.

The commissioner of Indian affairs in his annual report says that the Indians lose millions of dollars every year through dead timber on the reservations.

The official report of exports of products of iron and steel shows a total value of \$10,304,000 in ten months of 1907, or over 10 per cent of the value of all merchandise sent abroad.

—MONDAY—

The saloons of Council Bluffs, Ia., were closed Sunday for the first time in many years.

The plant of the Large Distillery company, located at Large, Pa., was destroyed by fire Sunday.

Louis B. Sternberg, a grocer in Kansas City, Kan., was killed and his wife was injured by unknown robbers.

Fully 250 widows and 1,000 children are left without any means of support by reason of the Monrovia disaster.

Three Italians were killed by policemen in a street fight at Alderson, Ok. The Italians had been drinking and resisted arrest.

The Japanese government is considering the increase of its forces in Korea in view of the activities of the Korean revolutionists and brigands.

—TUESDAY—

Dowager Queen Carolina of Saxony is dead at Dresden.

The repressive influence of the money situation is discernible again in the reaction of the New York stock market.

Pope X. held a secret consistory in the Vatican, in which he created four new cardinals and promoted several bishops.

A bill providing for a survey for a ship canal to connect the cities of Toledo and Chicago via the Maumee river and Lake Michigan has been introduced in congress.

With the laying off of 1,500 men by the Cambria Steel company at Johnstown, Pa., there are now about 4,000 formerly connected with the steel plant, out of work.

Negotiations are now going on between the shah and the Persian parliament, and it is believed an understanding will be reached. A new cabinet is in process of formation.

—WEDNESDAY—

Lord Kelvin, the noted scientist, is dead at Glasgow.

There is now no case of yellow fever under treatment, observation or suspicion in Cuba.

The Albemarle hotel at Richmond Va., was destroyed by fire. Loss estimated at \$75,000.

A rough count of the census of Cuba shows the total population of the island to be 2,028,282.

An investigation into the killing of three Italians at Charleston, La., is now under way by Italian officials.

The Peruvian government is making special efforts to prepare a gracious welcome for the American fleet when it reaches Lima.

The Missouri Republican state committee adopted a resolution endorsing the candidacy of Secretary of War Taft for the presidency.

The capital stock of all banks and trust companies doing business in the state of New York amounts to round numbers to \$26,799,869.

THE POWERS TRIAL.

When Caleb Powers took the witness stand in his own defense Tuesday morning, he created the greatest sensation of the trial, when, in answer to questions of his attorney, he announced that he has information that the noted Marlin rifle, with which Goebel was shot, and the whereabouts of which since the day of the tragedy, has not been generally known, was in Georgetown, tho he did not have possession of it that it was in Georgetown.

His testimony covered an account of his past life almost minutely, which shows him at all times in honorable vocations and a white character. He states concerning the canvass of the returns by the Commission and makes no denial that he as well as Taylor and others favored the bringing of men to Frankfort when it became apparent that their just rights were being taken away from them, and that the men were only summoned for the purpose of petitioning the Legislature, and that recommended by Gov. Taylor.

Wednesday Powers was placed under a severe cross-examination and lead it through without one break and ably denies having any connection with any kind of plot to kill Goebel.

The following day, Thursday, was the sensational day in court when the noted gun was brought to the stand by Grant Roberts. It was carefully screwed up in a wooden box, made for the purpose of its preservation, and its condition showed it had not been used since it sent that missile on its fatal mission. Youtsey was ordered brought back from the penitentiary. Roberts testified that he was "pretty sure" it is the gun he bought of Clarence Fupazzi, of Frankfort.

Today, Friday, Roberts finished his testimony, as Rheuben M. Miller testified, and these two in testimony show Hy. Youtsey the man who fired the fatal shot. Miller testified to even seeing him raise the window and adjust the blind.
