COLLEGE OF SCIENCE

- Dr. Thomas Pannuti (Earth & Space Science) won an award from the National Radio Astronomy Observatory to observe a peculiar supernova remnant in NGC 7793, a spiral galaxy about 12 million light years away. The remnant is peculiar because its makeup is not spherical and it is over 500 light years in length (most remnants are less than 100 light years in diameter). The purpose of Dr. Pannuti's observation is to classify this source properly as either a single supernova remnant, a "super bubble" or a micro quasar where the radio emission is produced by a stellar-mass black hole that has ejected jets of relativistic electrons.
- Dr. Bob Twiggs (Earth & Space Science) appeared on National Public Radio as part of a podcast on the Planet Money show. This episode highlighted his work in inventing the CubeSat, a miniature satellite that revolutionized space exploration into the large business venture it is today. Twiggs' work continues here at MSU, where a major focus of the Space Science center is nanosatellites – small satellites about the size of a loaf of bread.
- Dr. Jennifer O'Keefe (Earth & Space Science) was recently a guest on the Science Friday show at the Brown Theater in Louisville. The show highlighted Dr. O'Keefe's research on coal. Dr. O'Keefe studies evolution and ancient environments by looking at cellular structures of plants, fungi and other organisms found in the coal.
- Dr. Amy Staton (Agricultural Sciences) was a key speaker at the 25th Annual Association of Veterinary Technician Educators Symposium in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She also was appointed to the Kentucky Board of Veterinary Examiners.
- Dr. Phil Prater (Agricultural Sciences) was recognized by The Ohio State University's Alumni Society as an alumnus who has shown distinction through their professional or non-professional activities and set themselves apart through excellence in veterinary medicine or enhancing their community.
- Dr. Patricia Harrelson (Agricultural Sciences) published a peer-reviewed article titled "Effects of Fluoxetine on Lactation on Weaning in Sheep" in the Journal of Dairy Science.
- Lucy Mays (Nursing) worked with the Menifee County Wellness Coalition to develop "Menifee Matters" to address suicide. This summer there were two teen suicides, one young adult and one elder suicide. Dr. Mays has been working with the Menifee County School system and county government to implement post suicide intervention strategies.
- Dr. Teresa Ferguson, Dr. Teresa Howell and Dr. Lynn Parsons (Nursing) published a peer-reviewed article "Clinical simulation for practicing labor and delivery nurses: Advancing competency through simulated nursing practice." *POJ Nursing Practice & Research*, 1(3): 1-5.
- Dr. Jennifer Birriel (Math/Physics) became president of the Kentucky Academy of Science after serving as vice president and president-elect.
- Dr. Wilson González-Espada (Math/Physics) published two papers in peer-reviewed journals and hosted visiting scholars Jun Peng and Shanshan Li from Xingjian College of Science and Liberal Arts at Guangxi University in Nanning, China. This led to one presentation at the Kentucky Academy of Science and a manuscript titled, "Chinese Exchange Students in Appalachia: Coping with Language and Psychology in an Academic Setting," that was submitted for publication in the Journal of Studies in International Education.

SPACE SCIENCE CENTER PUBLICATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

- Published 10 papers in academic journals in space science and astrophysics.
- Presented keynote, invited and conference talks at professional meetings in Australia, Italy and Spain at NASA Centers and universities including MIT and Caltech.

GRANTS

- The Space Science Center is currently managing eight concurrent NASA grants and contracts including:
 - Lunar IceCube (Morehead State University's largest competitive contract - \$10 million) is currently in development and will fly to Earth escape (then to the Moon) on EM-1, the maiden voyage of NASA's Space Launch System (SLS) – the largest and most powerful rocket ever built in 2019.
 - The Morehead State 21m Ground Station is funded by NASA (\$640K) to become the first non-NASA node on NASA's Deep Space Network.
 - The 21m Ground Station is the primary ground operations center for NASA's ASTERIA mission. All of the mission operations specialists at Morehead State University are students and most are undergraduate students.
 - Morehead State and NASA partners were awarded three interplanetary SmallSat mission planning studies under NASA's Planetary Science Deep Space SmallSat Studies (PSDS3) program.
 - The Exomedicine Center for Applied Technology is operating under a \$300K grant for its start-up activities.
 - Contracts with small technology businesses, including the Busek Space Propulsion Company and Rocco, a space and military product company.

SPACE MISSIONS

The faculty, staff and students of the Space Science Center have three current space missions in development supported by NASA contracts (Lunar IceCube, CXBN-2, DM ISS Flight Experiment):

- DM-7 was launched to the International Space Station from Japan on HTV-6 on December and successfully completed a six-month mission on orbit.
- CXBN-2 was launched on an Atlas V from the Kennedy Space Center in April 2017 and successfully operated by students.
- Lunar IceCube completed a major mission milestone – the critical design review.

- Sam McInteer (18) was accepted to the Savannah College of Art and Design.
- Sierra Hauck won first place at the Kentucky Academy of Science with her astrophysics research project with mentor Dr. Grupe.
- Hunter Matthews (17) was accepted into the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy.
- Lauren Endicott (17) accepted a co-op at Toyota and received an internship offer for summer 2018 at Lexmark.
- Nadia Richardson, Alex Vermillion and Caroline O'Neill participated in a youth panel at Broadband and Your Community Workshop with The Center for Rural Development.
- Caroline O'Neill participated in a workshop at the GEMS Conference in Lexington, Kentucky.
- Current juniors and seniors will have work on display at Posters at the Capitol in February.

RESEARCH AND SPONSORED PROGRAMS

External funding at Morehead State University continues to increase because of the exceptional efforts of faculty and staff. During the 2016-17 academic year, 171 grant proposals and contracts were submitted. The total funding for all requests submitted was \$21,031,533 with the total for awards funded to date being \$15,433,766, a 1.64% increase over last year. Eight proposals totaling \$614,931 are still in pending status. The total request for indirect facilities and administrative (F&A) costs is \$1,942,661 (a 17.19% increase over last year), with \$1,188,452 currently funded (a 28.45% increase).

STUDENT AFFAIRS

- MSU has been named a "Military Friendly School for 2018" and "Military Times Best 2018 Colleges" (ranked #57 out of the top 100 schools in the nation).
- The MSU Rifle Team finished the fall portion of their season and is ranked 12th in the nation, the highest ranking ever for MSU Rifle.
- A school-record 127 athletes were named to the Ohio Valley Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll and 15 earned an OVC Academic Medal of Honor.
- MSU Volleyball, Women's Golf and Women's Track & Field achieved a perfect 100 percent Graduation Success Rate score for the third consecutive year, while Men's Track & Field also earned a 100 score.
- MSU Police Department successfully completed reaccreditation through the Kentucky Association of Chiefs of Police.
- MSU Police Sergeant Erik Caudill was awarded the Life Saving Award, Medal and Pin for actions taken while on duty that saved the life of a man who was unresponsive and not breathing due to an obstruction in his airway.
- John Haky, Assistant Director for Student Housing, was awarded the Southeastern Association of Housing Officers (SEAHO) Service Award at the 2017 annual conference. He also received the Ruth Ann Howard Service Award, the highest honor for a housing professional in the Commonwealth.
- Dr. Christopher Blakely (Eagle Diversity Education Center) completed the Ed.D. program in December 2017.
- Recreation & Wellness finished 1st in the Outdoor National Campus Challenge for colleges/university in the Southeast.

UNIVERSITY ADVANCEMENT

KFAC

- During the fall of 2017, KFAC curated an exhibition of works by former prison artist, Mark Francis, which appeared at the Intuit Center for Outsider Arts in Chicago and was reviewed in The Chicago Tribune.
- KFAC was instrumental in securing the CD sleeve cover of Oxford American's annual music issues for Somerset-based folk artist Bruce New.
- In the fall of 2017, KFAC opened the first-ever exhibition of photographs by famed Kentucky landscape photographer James Archambeault.

- Chuck Mraz was named the 2016-17 recipient of the Ohio Valley Conference Media Award.

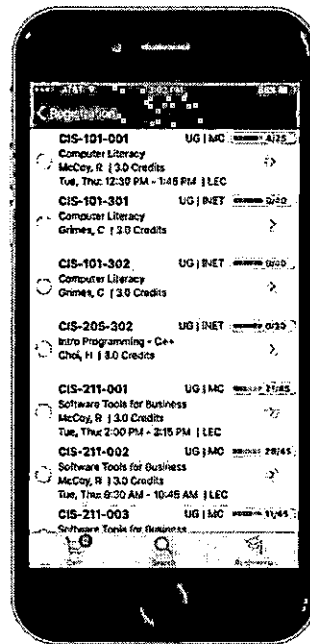
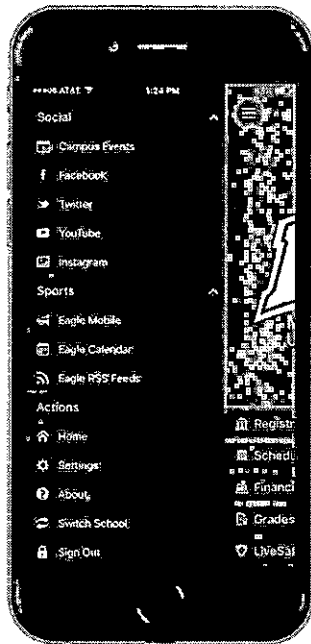
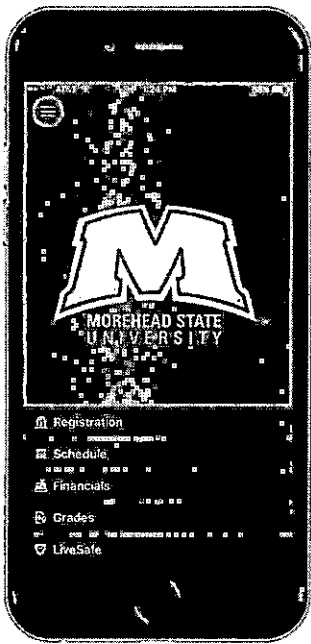
