NEWS OF KENTUCKY

Tasley Told Information Concerning Matters of Current Interest to Kentuckians.

THE STATE NEWS IN A NUTSHELL

Mere Ar's Fame Accurately Detailed the Happenings of the Largest Incident Which Are Attracting Attention Throughout Kentucky.

Hopkinsville, Ky., Dec. 21.—Colonel Junett Henry, commanding the First in Tenth Kentucky state guard, had tendered his resignation as colonel of the regiment because he felt that he had been treated with scant courtesy by Governor Williams and Adjutant General Johnston, who failed to consult on any formal communication with him concerning the military situation in the region, growing out of the night riders troubles.

Colonel Henry is the former mayor of Hopkinsville and a Spanish war veteran.

REPARATION Will Be Demanded by Italy for Damages Done by Night Riders.

Washington, Dec. 22.—A claim for reparation will be made because of the damage suffered by Italian interests in the destruction of one of the tobacco factories in Hopkinsville, Ky., which was burned some time ago by night riders. The loss amounted to several thousand dollars. It is expected that application for reimbursement will be made with a view to its payment by the state. It appears, according to the best information obtainable, that the raid was not because of any antipathy to the Italians or Italian labor; but was a development of interest between the American Tobacco company and the Independent Congress. The Italian ambassador here has been discussing the question with the officials of the state department, and it is expected that the efforts toward securing a reimbursement for the loss suffered will soon take definite shape.

BOE'S CARCASS BARRED Court of Appeals Folds Bar on Animal Interment in Cemeteries.

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 20.—The court of appeals has reversed the case of Henry Herfle against Alton Reddie, W. C. Hancock and Ada Hancock from the Jackson county court, Louisville, and the latter will be compelled to remove from their lot in Cave Hill cemetery the body of a dog buried there several months ago. Herfle sought to enjoin the defendants and compel them to remove the carcass of the dog after learning that it had been interred on a plot adjoining his family lot in the city of the dead.

The opinion of the court by Judge Parker holds that it would be possible for an owner of a lot to bury a horse or a donkey if he or she was so disposed. The court held that Herfle was entitled to an injunction against the cemetery company and the owner of the lot in which the dog is buried.

POWER LIMITED Police Judges Have No Authority Outside City Limits.

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 19.—The court of appeals has construed the statute relative to the power of police judges in the case of Davis, mayor of Landon, against the Landon Agricultural association, holding that such officials have no power to try cases originating outside the city limits.

An attempt was made to prosecute the Landon race track management for the sale of liquor at the track when the city ordinance prohibited the sale within half a mile of the city limits. The state court rules that the police judge has no authority to try the case, but policemen may take offenders before a magistrate or court.
