The Last Twelve-Month Will Go Down With Bad Mark In Financial History.

Despite a period of Financial Strain the close of the year finds country in better Financial condition than when it began.

New York, Dec. 31.—The year 1907 has been one in which there has been much making of financial history. It will go down with 1857, 1873 and 1892 as one of the panic years in American finance, but despite the remarkable stress and strain to which the financial structure has been subjected, the year closed with a more cheerful and safer than they were when the year began.

The year opened with the feeling of conservative quarters that speculation in the market was carried to an unwarranted height and that prudence was imposed by conditions upon bankers and investors. That feeling was moderated to some extent throughout the year and that there was a scarcity of capital for absorbing new securities was indicated by the diminished transactions in stocks and bonds on the New York stock exchange. While the number of shares of stock dealt in up to Christmas of 1907 did not fall below that of normal years prior to 1905, it was very much less than for that year and for 1906.

"We endorse the accepted policy of the states of the South in providing for the youth of the negro race, believing that whatever the ultimate solution of this grievous problem may be, education should be an important factor in it. We believe that the education of the negro in the elementary branches of education should be made thorough and should include special instruction in hygiene and home sanitation for the better protection of both races."

Georgetown, Ky., Dec. 31.—The next two or three days will see consummation of the fourth trial of Charles Powers as accessory before the fact to the murder of William Goebel and will mark the close of one of the most sensational and contested criminal trials in the history of American jurisprudence.

Explosion Romantic Tale. London, Dec. 31.—The coffin of Thomas Charles Druce, in Highgate cemetery, was exhumed just forty hours after it had been buried. The coffin was found to contain the remains of a human body, thus exploding the romantic tale told by Robert C. Caldwell of New York, and others, who swore during the recent hearing of the Druce perjury case that it contained a roll of lead.

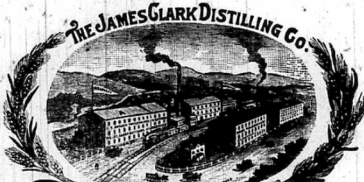

# WANT THE TROOPS

Goldfield Mine Owners Deplore Resolution to Withdraw Soldiers.

# AN APPEAL TO ROOSEVELT

The President Has Been Urged to Reconsider His Action in Ordering Troops to Leave Disturbed Mining Camp in Nevada.

Goldfield, Nev., Dec. 24.—Despite the positive statement which came from Washington to the effect that the federal troops will be removed from Goldfield on Dec. 30, mine owners have not given up and will appeal again to the president. They will present, they say, matters which have not yet been laid before him; one of these being that they regard as positive evidence that at least one deportation was attempted by the Western Federation of Miners, in which attempt four rifles were used.

While the miners are preparing to send further evidence to the president, Sheriff Ingalls and Captain Cox, the personal representative of Governor Sparks in Goldfield, are conferring on plans for the preservation of law and order after the troops depart. Sheriff Ingalls said that he is seeking at least fifty new men to constitute a force of deputies who will patrol the camp, night and day, armed with guns.

The rumor has been current here that a company of rangers is contemplated and as this could not be done without the action of the legislature, the statement of Captain Cox is taken to mean that if such a plan is decided upon the legislature will be convened.

A suit against the Western Federation of Miners is to be brought by the Goldfield mine operators' association in the federal court. An injunction will be asked for restraining the members of the local miners' union, which is affiliated with the Western Federation, from interfering in any way with the operation of the mines of Goldfield. The suit will be filed Dec. 23.

It had been definitely decided that Dec. 20 each individual mine owner of each company, lease or mine, shall take care of his own property. Independent of the association, "which will necessitate the putting on of many guards."

**THIRD OF THE SERIES**  
**Explosion in Pennsylvania Colliery Claims 250 Victims.**  
Jacobus Creek, Pa., Dec. 24.—An explosion of gas in the Darr mine of the Pittsburg Coal company, located here, numbered between 200 and 250 miners and there is scarcely a ray of hope that a single one of them will be taken from the mine alive. Partially wrecked buildings in the vicinity of the mine and the condition of the few bodies found early in the rescue work, indicate an explosion of such terrific force that it seems impossible that anyone could have survived it. All of the bodies taken out up to this time are horribly mutilated and several of them are badly charred.

This is the third mine disaster since the first of the month in the veins of bituminous coal underlying western Pennsylvania and West Virginia, for the Naam mine near Fayette City and the two mines at Monongah, W. Va., in which the earlier explosions happened, are in the same belt as the local workings.
