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

Some McDonalds representatives were in Atlantic City and caught wind of what I had said. They contacted me about posing for some photos and asked me to do some commercials for them."

Ivy called the Miss America experience very rewarding.

"I was just happy to meet so many nice girls. They were all so pretty and friendly," she added.

After the hard work for Atlantic City, Ivy looks back at what made it worth all the time and effort.

"There are a lot of people who make it worthwhile. Especially the children who stand in awe and say, 'Look, it's a queen!', that's very exciting and special."

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MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University's fall enrollment reflects a "slight" increase in the total student population and a "significant" decrease in the number of out-of-state students, President Morris L. Norfleet announced Monday.

The total enrollment has exceeded last fall's 7,234 and is expected to top 7,400 when other data is processed this week, he stated.

As of Monday, the total headcount was 7,305.

MSU has 133 fewer full-time undergraduates from outside Kentucky and has improved its in-state/out-of-state undergraduate enrollment ratio to 79-21, compared to 78 percent and 22 percent last fall.

"We are pleased with these percentages and feel that they represent a significant effort on the part of the University to comply with the out-of-state enrollment policy of the Council on Higher Education," Dr. Norfleet said.

"It should be noted that, when full-time and part-time figures are combined, Kentucky residents comprise 84.26 percent of our total student population," he added.

The percentage change was highest at the freshman level where the proportion of Kentuckians jumped from 75 to 78 percent over last fall, a fact attributed to MSU's summer campaign to reduce its number of in-state "no shows" (admitted students who fail to register for the fall term) and to a drop in applications from out-of-state students.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "I love history, I love Kentucky and I love this campus," says George T. Young, 69, associate professor of government and public affairs at Morehead State University.

"I've been here 46 years and it's become my home," Young added. "I can't imagine living anywhere else."

Young came to MSU as an instructor of social studies at the Robert J. Breckinridge Training School in 1932 and has served the University longer than any other person still employed.

Looking much younger than his age, Young is still very active in campus life and teaches his political science and Kentucky history classes with enthusiasm that younger man would envy.

"He knows more about Kentucky and Kentucky history than any person I know," says Dr. Edmund Hicks, professor of history at MSU.

A native Kentuckian, Young was born and raised in neighboring Owingsville. After graduation from high school in 1927, he entered Centre College in Danville. "I have many fond memories of Danville and my college days there," says Young. "It was right before the depression hit and times were hard. I earned expense money playing piano for silent movies at the Stout Theatre for two dollars a day."

He continued:

"My piano playing was responsible for my friendship with A.B. "Happy" Chandler. He was coaching at Centre, liked music and had a wonderful tenor voice. So we got together and tried to get free lunches singing and playing at hotel functions."

When Chandler was elected governor in 1935, he invited Young and "The King's Jesters," MSU's first stage band to play at the inaugural ball.

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Young's love of music led to the organization of the Minstrel Club in 1934. It continued under his supervision for 29 years. "I've always enjoyed music," he says. "I never had any formal training, but I learned to read music before I could read words. My mother, a student of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, was a fine piano teacher."

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Young's involvement with music took on an added dimension when he enlisted in the "Old Army Air Force" during World War II in 1942.

"I was in special services with a lot of other musicians and entertainers as a morale building group," he said. "We became known as the "Bowman Barricades," because we entertained the soldiers in hangers at Bowman Field, Kentucky.

He was also a member of "All Clear," a group of soldiers who traveled to different cities entertaining troops. "One of my most memorable days," adds Young, "was when I played in the band in Eisenhower's Victory Day parade in Kansas City. We marched for three miles then listened to President Truman's address."

Young returned to teaching in 1945. In addition to teaching he supervised more than 700 student teachers during his years at Breck.

Dr. Don Flatt, head of the department of history at MSU says, "Young was my supervising instructor at Breck. He was great. I credit him with giving me more of a realistic view of what teaching was really like than most instructors could have. Since he's been at MSU he has had tremendous appeal with the students. His classes are full."

Young joined the MSU faculty in 1965 which he calls "the biggest event of my life."

In addition to his regular academic responsibilities, Young also directs the Kentucky Historical Tour, a special weekend class which tours the various historical sites in the state.

Six presidents have come and gone at MSU since Young first joined the faculty and he says he has seen the "University grow in size and stature with each one."

MSU President Morris L. Norfleet calls Young "a valuable member of the University community. From his many years of service at University Breckinridge School to his work on the faculty of the School of Social Sciences, we have grown to appreciate this remarkable man and his love of history and government and his dedication to teaching."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "Give the students as much knowledge possible about the horse industry" is the primary goal of the horsemanship program at Morehead State University.

"We try to give the students a well balanced understanding of horsemanship including riding and handling the horse, management of horse programs, breeding and training and even some about soil fertility and land economics," explains Liz McBride, assistant instructor of agriculture at MSU, "and all our horses have been donated."

The program is growing and according to McBride, "more students are demanding" a program like this and "as far as I know, MSU is the only school in the state with a complete, well balanced program on horsemanship."

Students learn about the industry literally from the hoof up including how to recognize disease and what to do until the veternarian arrives. More than a dozen courses are offered including equine breeding and management, stable management, horse production and horse training with classes in saddling, grooming, anatomy of a horse, basic equitation, riding and preparing to show, purchasing a horse, horse psychology and riding theory.

The program, which attracts more than 150 students per year including 130 this fall, is also rewarding as it gives the students an opportunity to test their ability and expertise at summer horse shows.

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"The shows offer valuable experience," adds McBride. "The students learn to set up facilities, prepare the horses for show and the best techniques to use in presenting the horses and themselves."

She continued:

"The shows are also important because not only do our students receive the experience but our program receives exposure. We get very positive comments from show officials concerning the professionalism of our students in the way they handle the horses."

As a result of the expertise displayed by the MSU students, the University has often been contacted by individuals wishing to donate additional horses to the program, wishing to purchase horses from the University or with job opportunities for students.

The students also visit various horse farms throughout the region to meet with owners and trainers.

"The horse industry is very peculiar," adds McBride. "A person must know the language to succeed. In our program we try to teach this to the students and **as** a result, people at the places we visit are getting more receptive to us. They accept us as students who are willing to learn. Our program is also gaining respect from these people because our students are able to talk to them intelligently and ask very good questions."

"After a student finishes our program," adds Dr. Judy Willard, assistant professor of agriculture at MSU, "he or she usually decides to enter the real world to try to gain more practical experience. We try to prepare the students for the real world so they will succeed."

So far this year, the Charlottesville, Va. sophomore has won five of six cross country races including the 1978 Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Championships.

"I just knew she was going to win it," said teammate Diane Long. "She has the longest, most beautiful running form I've ever seen in my life."

McCarthy, a Junior Olympic swimming champion in 100 and 200yard butterfly, was introduced to running by a swimming teammate.

"One of the fellows on my swimming team was also running on the high school cross country team," McCarthy said. "He asked me to go out to one of the practices and I ended up running on the boy's team as a sophomore."

She ran on the boy's cross country team and the girl's track team during high school and set the Virginia high school state record in the girl's mile.

She was recruited by several schools including North Carolina State and the University of Virginia. She chose MSU because she felt there would be less pressure in her running and because of MSU's academic programs.

During her freshman year, McCarthy set five school records and has consistently improved. She bettered her time at Eastern Kentucky University Arlington course by 40 seconds from a year

ago and one week later cut her best time another 32 seconds in winning the Indiana University Invitational.

"The most satisfying thing in running is your own individual improvement," said the 19-year old psychology major. "Whether you improve in a big meet or a small meet really doesn't matter."

"I was happy to win the KWIC meet but I think the first place finish was a little deceptive. Several of the better runners were out with injuries and I wish they had been able to run."

Though distance running involves a great deal of practice, running has never been a chore to McCarthy.

"It's something I enjoy, especially the cross country," McCarthy said. "I'll probably continue running for enjoyment even after I graduate from college."

McCarthy, who would like to work with children in a children's library after graduation, takes a break from running in the summer and Coach Mary Shull believes that is one reason for her good attitude for the fall season.

"She keeps in shape in the summer by swimming then when she comes back she's ready to run," said Coach Shull. "She has a lot of natural ability. That and her competitive spirit make her run well. She just never gives up."

McCarthy credits Coach Shull with much of her success.

"Coach Shull is really a good coach because of her relaxed attitude," McCarthy said. "She knows our capabilities and sets our goals accordingly."

"I feel pretty lucky because I get tremendous support from

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Musician, poet, composer and student all describe Keith Hubbard, Winchester senior at Morehead State University.

On weekends, Hubbard, 25, plays piano with the Duke Madison Jazz Quartet in Lexington and also plays with the jazz group Bronx Cheer.

"Music has always been my main interest," says Hubbard. "I had eight years of classical piano training but I didn't like the routine and structured discipline of it. Then, at 14 I started playing rock-and-roll with high school groups around Elizabethtown."

Hubbard, a 1971 graduate of Elizabethtown High School, went to Nashville in 1973.

"I just wanted to be where the music was," he says, "I slept in my van until I found a job washing cars on 'Music Row,' where all the recording studios and publishing houses are,"

He added:

"I played piano and guitar in bars all up and down the row and was able to meet several famous people. Once I played at the Inn where the bar scene with Lily Tomlin was filmed for the movie 'Nashville.'

After two months I got a job as a tombstone setter and met a songwriter from Ohio who was also trying to get songs published along with hundreds of other people. The local fire station always had something cooking to feed the starving musicians."

Hubbard says he was "demoralized" and came back to Kentucky after one particular bad experience.

"Some of my songs were finally contracted and were supposed to be copywrited," he adds. "I went back to the place to get my money and found the doors locked, the people and my songs gone. The place had gone bankrupt,"

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Hubbard then enrolled at the University of Kentucky and began to play clubs around the Lexington area. While at the University, he met Jay Flippin, instructor of music at MSU.

"A Morehead student had recommended that I study music with Jay," says Hubbard, "I decided to and found out how little I really knew about music,"

In 1976 Hubbard enrolled in the Berklee College of Music in Boston and "studied music seriously for a year" and "thought about teaching."

In 1977, he came to MSU to study under Flippin and began playing in Lexington again on weekends and evenings,

"What characterizes Keith is his determination," says Flippin, "He wants to be as great a jazz player as possible. His solos are very personal, very unique and make a statement. He has his own style and is very inventive,"

In December, 1977, Hubbard gave an all jazz student recital at MSU. He performed some of his own songs, some alone and some with a quartet.

Hubbard, an English major, also writes poetry and thinks he would like to write poetry seriously but doesn't feel ready yet,

"I think you have to live a lot of experiences," he says, "Then you can look back and put the experiences into a universal perspective, I don't feel fully capable of doing that yet,"

"Keith knows where he wants to go," adds Flippin, "I think he's going to be as successful as he wants to be. He has all the necessary capabilities."

We offer the opportunity to participate at WMKY, not a guarantee. Students must first prove they are capable.

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Jeff Eldred, Covington graduate student and host for WMKY's morning program "New Day," says, "I think we do more at WMKY than any station in Eastern Kentucky. We offer music, sports, public affairs and some of the best news coverage in the state. As for facilities, we have a very good technical set-up and up-to-date equipment."

The bulk of WMKY's daily newscast consists of five-minute, on the hour reports of national and international news from United Press International,

WMKY presents Newsbeat, a 30-minute update of local news at noon and 4:30 p.m. each weekday and 90 minutes of broadcast journalism with "All Things Considered," at 5 p.m.

"Our Commonwealth news coverage has benefitted from the addition of Kentucky State Network Inc.," says Netherton. "WMKY can now provide regular and consistent news coverage for the Commonwealth. The possibilities and opportunities for reaching Eastern Kentucky are limitless,"

WMKY has set a target date of January 1, 1980 for "Inter-Connection" which will link the station with approximately 200 public radio stations from Alaska to the Virgin Islands.

Shuster, 25, coordinates and operates the Resource Room at Rowan County High School in Morehead. This program is designed to assist students who need individual help with studies or other problems hampering their effectiveness as students.

"The kids get the individual help they need, on their own level," says Shuster.

Shuster, of Greenfield, Ohio, received his degree in special education from Morehead State University in 1976, and was hired immediately at Rowan County to set up and coordinate the learning disability program.

"A former instructor of mine at MSU got me interested in working with special students," says Shuster. "I worked with the instructor a great deal while I was in school. Then in 1976, I was a team member of his in presenting a curriculum for multi-handicapped children at the International Conference of Exceptional Children in Chicago."

"I also worked with the Special Olympics," says Shuster. "It's quite an experience working with those kids."

He also worked at a camp in Ohio for the physically and mentally handicapped.

"I worked with some really exceptional kids and realized they were capable of doing so much, if only given a chance." says Shuster. "I was responsible for 12 kids and its a summer I'll never forget."

He continued:

"I'm from a family who expressed affection. I try to give that to my students. I have 15 kids in the program here at Rowan County. During the two hours I have them each day, we work on reading, math, language and personal problems. I think the kids can come into the room and feel they can talk about anything because they feel that someone cares."

David does all the little extra things I think are important in a teacher," says Marvin Moore, principal at Rowan County. "He's very concerned and sincere. He takes the initiative in helping the students with problems at home or at school."

"Some people would disagree with my methods of getting involved and showing affection to the students the way I do but I think it works," Shuster adds. "I can't help but think love and encouragement are the most important ingredients in helping students with their problems."

In addition to his work with the Resource Room Shuster also coordinates a tutoring program at the school. The program, a joint effort between Rowan County and MSU, helps more than 100 students having problems with classwork.

Looking to the future, Shuster says he would like to design and operate his own facility for the handicapped person.

"I would try to make it a place to meet the needs of the people," he says. "It's only a dream, and right now it seems impossible, but maybe someday it might be possible."

While on the Jaritas Ranch, located 15 miles from Springer, the students also visited neighboring ranches to see what techniques were used there.

"We worked six days a week, beginning about 7 a.m. each day," added Smith. "During the day we helped with ranch chores from milking the cows to feeding the livestock and churning butter. We would then work in the prairie and even help with the cooking."

Beginning as a sheep ranch in 1884, the ranch now focuses on cattle with about 3,000 head including 1,200 cows and yearling steers. Floersheim still has about 100 head of sheep.

"This program gives the students an opportunity to work and live in a different part of the country," said Dr. William Moore, head of the Department of Agriculture at MSU. "I don't know of any other rancher who just turns the entire operation of his ranch over to students. The experience gained by the students is very valuable."

The experience last summer has already paid off for Claudia Smith. She will return to the Jaritas Ranch after graduation in December as a full-time employee.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- From Cincinnati to the open range of New Mexico is a big change but Claudia Smith, Cincinnati senior at Morehead State University, made the adjustment.

She and 11 other college students spent three months being responsible for all phases of the operation of the 68,000 acre Jaritas Ranch in Springer, N.M.

The program was a cooperative effort among rancher Don Floersheim, the American Cattlemen's Association and participating universities.

"The purpose of the program was to provide a labor source for the ranch," said Smith, an agriculture major. "The program also gives students hands-on experience in all phases of ranch operation."

She continued:

"From mid-May to mid-August, we lived on the ranch and did everything there was to be done, including mechanical work on equipment, branding cattle, selecting replacement heifers, repairing fences and dehorning cattle."

Students participating were agriculture students, animal science students or individuals interested in various agriculture areas.

The students were from different parts of the country and included three Kentuckians.

"When I arrived at the ranch, I had no idea what to expect," said Smith. "I found out the real work was different from what I had learned in classes or labs."

"Mr. Floersheim was great," she added. "He would slow the overall operation of his ranch and let the students work at their own pace. This gave us all a chance to learn to do the work the right way."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- The Morehead State University School of Business and Economics is showing a steady growth over the past year.

Class size, based on FTE, is up 4.7 percent from the fall 1977 to the fall 1978 with the program's largest growth in management, marketing, business education and data processing.

Only accounting has shown a slight decline in growth during the last few years by almost 10 percent.

In the study of class size, the Master of Business Administration (MBA) program shows a total of 200 students admitted with approximately 60 percent participating in the MBA off-campus program. Another 100 have been admitted to the Masters of Business Education (MBE) program.

On a total count, approximately 1,000 undergraduate students are enrolled in the School of Business and Economics.

More students are majoring in liberal arts and are taking "tool courses" especially data processing. More students are leaning toward data processing minors.

The only chair at MSU is in real estate, funded by the Kentucky Real Estate Commission. The University has also established the Center for Economic Education, funded by the Kentucky Council on Economic Education. The Center's mission is both on-campus and outside the Morehead area.

The Center for Economic Education has also conducted workshops in economics for teachers for the last three years in an attempt to increase the economic understanding at the high school level.

A coming thrust of MSU is the Appalachian Studies Program. The Department of Economics will be designing courses for this program.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- If anyone ever told Joe Creech, 21, to "make the most of what you've got," he certainly took the advice seriously.

Creech, Raceland sophomore at Morehead State University, is four feet tall, weighs 80 pounds and has been a professional wrestler for eight years.

His career started at 13, when a promoter contacted him about professional wrestling. At 15, he completed a wrestling tour of Puerto Rico, alone.

"I was wrestling in an arena filled with 70,000 people," he said. "Fans get a little crazy down there so the ring was surrounded by metal cages to keep the fans from throwing things at us or coming onto the mat after us if they didn't like the match."

During his career, Creech has wrestled in 15 states throughout the South and says the travel has been strenuous and unpredictable.

"The time on the road is the hardest," he adds. "One summer I wrestled in six different cities in one week."

He continued:

"I've had bricks thrown at me and been paid with bad checks. Once I went all the way to Missouri to wrestle, only to be paid a total of three dollars."

Creech says his worst experience was in Southern Kentucky when the building he was wrestling in caught fire. The only exit not in flames was behind the stage.

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"The only problem was that the stage was almost four feet high, " he adds. "It was nearly as tall as me and there was no stairway so I had a heck of a time. I just kept jumping and trying to grab hold of something. I don't know how I did it, but I finally made it up on the stage and out before the whole building collapsed."

Creech says he doesn't think he has been treated any differently because of his size.

"In high school, I think some of the kids were a little jealous because I was getting out of school and travelling, but mostly I was treated like one of the gang," he says. "My size has never really been a hindrance to anything I wanted to do."

He continued:

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"As a matter of fact, I'm sure I would never have gotten into professional wrestling if it hadn't been for my size. The only time I can remember my size bothering anyone was in the second grade. A girl in my class thought oranges made you grow so she brought me an orange every day that year. I guess she was disappointed that I didn't grow much."

During his wrestling career, he found time to do other things including being basketball manager and winning the school spirit award in high school. He is also former Raceland City Clerk.

Creech, the son of Thomas T. Creech of Raceland, says he will probably continue wrestling on a part-time basis but most important to him is getting his college education.

"I think I'd like to teach," he says. "I get along well with young people and it's a big challange helping them learn."
