MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University's Appalachian Development Center has recently published the first issue of the ADC's Monograph Series.

"This is to introduce the first in what we expect to be a long series of informative monographs on the Appalachian Region of Kentucky," said MSU President Morris L. Norfleet.

Dr. Raymond S. Ferell, coordinator of regional research at the ADC, says the series "provides a forum for creative and scholarly works concerned with the cultural, environmental and economic problems of the Appalachian Region."

The publication, "An Analysis of Population Changes in Eastern Kentucky 1970-2000" and authored by Dr. Gary Cox, head of MSU's Department of Georgraphy, focuses on recent and projected population changes in Eastern Kentucky.

"Since the beginning of the 20th Century, the economy of the region has been tied to one product, coal, which has led the region through a series of spectacular booms and heartbreaking busts," stated Cox. "While the present world energy situation appears to have contributed a measure of stability to the coal industry and indirectly to the region, coal remains a highly volatile factor in the future of Eastern Kentucky."

He continued:

"Any one of several variables could alter the demand for Eastern Kentucky coal and would be reflected quickly in population statistics in Eastern Kentucky. These factors should be kept in mind when using population estimates for this region."

Ferell said the monograph series contains a variety of manuscripts including bibliographies, position papers and research studies.

Analyses of regional conditions will also be considered for publication.

"All contributions which address these concerns and are regional in scope will be considered by the editorial review board," Ferell added.

The monographs are free and available immediately.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "Coal is almost certain to become increasingly important to Kentucky and the nation in the near future," says Forrest Cameron of Morehead State University.

Cameron, coordinator of MSU's mining technology program, bases this on the current "turmoil over the energy situation" of the nation and the economy.

"Kentucky is the nation's leading coal producing state and the Morehead service area is the state's leading underground coal producing region," adds Cameron. "If MSU is to adequately serve the region, it makes sense to serve the coal industry through education and research."

The mining technology program at MSU began in 1973 and has consistently grown, offering courses on the economic, environmental, legal, technological and sociological aspects of mining.

Students also receive practical, on-the-job training as summer interns with local coal companies.

"We try to teach our students to interact and communicate within the many facets of the coal industry," said Cameron. "We also try to give them the exposure and instruction necessary for coal management positions in private industry, government or labor."

According to Cameron, a primary concern of the program is to give the students a working knowledge of the ever-changing mine laws and regulations.

"We work with agencies such as MSHA (Mine Safety and Health Administration) and the Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals to keep abreast of the many regulations facing the coal industry," he said.

Cameron, former administrator of the mining technology program at Pikeville College before coming to MSU, says that often the success or failure of many mines depends upon the ability of the coal companies to mine coal profitably and still comply with the laws.

Students in the program are also made aware of the social implications involved with the coal mining industry.

"Mining is more than just digging coal," says Cameron. "You can't just dig the coal and forget about the people and their communities.

Our students must be aware of the sociological and environmental aspects as well."

He added that reclamation is now a very important part of the mining cycle.

"We try to get students into the program who are interested in all the various aspects of mining and I think we have succeeded," he said, adding that the program has experienced very good response from employers in the industry.

There are 92 students majoring in mining technology at MSU with more than 100 taking courses in the program, which is part of the School of Applied Sciences and Technology.

Cameron says he expects the program to double in the next year because "coal is the backbone of the Eastern Kentucky region and we are here to serve that region."

Several companies have become involved with the program. Ashland Oil, Inc., recently donated funds toward the construction of an on-campus coal mining technology laboratory and the Eastover Mining Company has donated a continuous mining machine.



MOREHEAD, Ky. --- It was an invasion of "strange, white men who dressed in metal and rode animals as big as buffaloes."

Beginning with the 16th century Spanish explorers, Dr. James Gifford of Morehead State University describes life among the Appalachian mountain pioneers in a recently published book.

The publication, "Our Mountain Heritage," is the result of seven public lectures during the summer of 1978 presented to more than 1,100 people in southwestern North Carolina by contributing authors Gifford, Dr. James Horton and Dr. Theda Perdue of Western Carolina University.

"The public lectures were attended by people of all ages," said Gifford. "There were usually several tourists at each lecture which was encouraging because it enabled the visitors to learn more about the area and it probably made their stay more enjoyable."

The book concentrates on western North Carolina and examines the Appalachian experience in a chronological order up to the Civil War.

Gifford foresees a follow-up publication from the Civil War to the present.

Gifford's contribution, entitled "Our Pioneer Heritage," begins with the Spanish explorers in the 16th century and their visit to North Carolina in search of gold and other precious metals.

The section then discusses the English explorers, arrival of settlers, mid-18th century conflicts, western North Carolina and the war for independence, the Civil War, slavery and the mountain life.

"Books like this are very important, because there aren't any definitive studies of the Appalachian experience," added Gifford.

He says the book is aimed at the general public readership who is interested in the Appalachian experience but really doesn't know a great deal about it.

The material has been compiled and edited into book form by Clifford R. Lovin and published by the North Carolina Humanities Committee and Mountain Heritage Center of Western Carolina University.

The book, recently presented to MSU's Appalachian Collections, is being distributed by the Mountain Heritage Center and WCU to individuals attending the lectures and to North Carolina schoolchildren.

Gifford is currently presenting a similar project on Kentucky with the assistance of Dr. Don Flatt, head of MSU's Department of History.

"I hope that during the next few years I can develop a similar study of Appalachian Kentucky," Gifford added.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- U.S. Sen. Walter (Dee) Huddleston told more than 500 Morehead State University summer degree candidates here Friday to work for changes.

"If you do not like the way government and institutions are performing, it is your right and even responsibility to work for changes," he said. "But, if you do not succeed on every occassion, that is no reason to give up and quit."

Kentucky's senior senator also told the candidates that "if the system turns you off, change it, don't get cynical. If you fail the first time, try again even harder."

He added that meaning and goals in life require self-evaluation, honesty with yourself and the development of a personal sense of values.

"Life isn't always easy," he said. "But, you do have the freedom, the education and I hope the personal initiative to make of it what you will."

"Nobody wins 100 per cent of the time and even whe you win, it may not be 100 per cent of what you sought."

He also said the development of one-issue groups in the nation today ipresents some serious questions about the future our democratice political process and needs to be observed very carefully.

"I would hope that most citizens would take a broader perspective in evaluating what is being accomplished by the government and by their representatives than by one single issue," he concluded.

"An institution of higher education is only as good as its faculty and we must regain a competitive position in the area of compensation," he said. "Continuation budgets in the face of inflation have seriously eroded the University's salary structure in recent years."

The Regents voted unanimously to direct MSU's administrative staff to prepare the 1980-82 budget request with faculty and staff salaries as the highest priority.

In other action, the board:

- * Authorized the structuring of existing courses as an Appalachian Studies Program, including credit and non-credit learning opportunities, concerts, lectures and conferences.



MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University's 1980-82 biennial budget request totals \$46.7 million, a 41 percent increase over the current biennium support of \$33 million.

MSU President Morris L. Norfleet told a campus press conference that the largest dollar category is faculty and staff salaries where MSU is seeking \$4.9 million over the two-year period.

In addition to yearly salary increases of 9.5 percent, MSU also is requesting additional money for "catch up" funding to make average salaries equal to those at similar institutions in adjoining states.

Dr. Norfleet described salaries as the "No. 1 priority" in the budget request. Among other areas where funding increases are being sought are operating costs, expansion of the Appalachian Development Center, student financial aid, instructional equipment and developmental studies.

"Our budget request will be subjected to a series of hearings before a final figure is sent to the General Assembly early next year by the governor," Dr. Norfleet said. "We feel the request is reasonable and that it is necessary to maintain the University's viability."

Dr. Norfleet made several announcements, including:

* Seven executives from Ashland Oil, Inc. are serving as part-time visiting professors this semester through an "executives in residence" program funded by the energy firm.

* Milton Wright of the Morehead Clinic has been appointed director of MSU's Caudill Health Clinic, succeeding Mrs. Wilma Caudill who retired last month after 20 years. Wright, a physician's assistant, will be paid jointly by MSU and the Morehead Clinic which has a contract to provide professional medical services for MSU students.

* Three field specialists are being employed to expand MSU's cooperative education program which places students in "on-the-job" learning situations. Funded by a federal grant, the new staff members will be assigned to work in the Fivco, Gateway and Buffalo Trace area development districts. After traveling up and down the Ohio River from West Virginia to Augusta, Adams says he has enough subject ideas "to paint for a long time."

"We feel this will be an excellent facility for our instruction program," said Dr. Judy Willard, coordinator of MSU's horsemanship program. "It also will give us space for horses brought to campus by students in the program."

The new barn will house walking horses, saddlebred and quarter horses for show and instructional purposes.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- What happens when the blue lights stop flashing? What rights does a person arrested have? What are the procedures an arresting officer whould follow?

Students in Street Law at Morehead State University are finding out during the fall semester from experts in the field.

"This is basically a practical approach to the study of the judicial system," said Dr. Jack Bizzel, Head of MSU's Department of Government and Public Affairs. "We utilize the expertise and first hand knowledge of various government officials to explain the process of the law to the students."

He added:

"The students get all their individual questions which range from search warrants and procedures to firearm regulations answered by our guest lecturers. The course of events is followed from the time of arrest through a trial and finally to detention."

Through the use of guest lecturers, the students receive insight into the roles of the individual law agencies and learn what the individual citizen's rights are.

Guest speakers include a city police chief, Kentucky state trooper, attorneys, FBI special agent, judges and a representative from the Eastern Kentucky Lega Services with future guest to include a parole officer, prison wardenand District Judge James Ruchardson of Dungsville.



The course attracts students from all academic areas of study especially pre-law and government with several students taking the course as an elective for personal interst.

"There is no standardized lecture, other than the discussion by the guest speaker," said Dr. Lindsey Back, assistant professor of government and course instructor. "The class is an open discussion between the students, the speaker and myself."

With the open discussion, students get more involved with the discussion and can discuss topics of primary interest to them.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- By the end of 1980, Les Meade of Morehead State University hopes to know as much about Kentucky snakes as a person can.

Meade, assistant professor of biology at MSU, is currently involved in a systematic study of the 45 different forms of snakes for his doctoral dissertation at the University of Southern Mississippi.

"My study involves a systematic study of the variations and distribution of snakes in Kentucky," Meade said. "I'm involved with the measurements, scale count, tail length, body length and total length as well as the differences in males and females."

He continued:

"With the tail, it is common to find that males and females have different tail lengths in many species. For example, in copperheads, the difference is not really clear but in garter snakes there is a definite difference."

His primary study is based on preserved snakes with only a few live specimens on hand including small copperheads, black racer, garter snakes and rat snakes.

"I'm also looking at scale patterns on the head where there are some variations," Meade added. "I also count the scales in three different places on the body and study the color variations because some snakes vary in color with age. For example, the black rat snake is blotched when young but the mature adults are almost solid black."

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One concern when working closely with snakes is being bitten.

Meade said he hasn't been bitten by a poisionous snake but has been bitten by a rat snake which "feels like getting scratched by a brier."

Sufficient time and finances prevent Meade from spending very much time in the field, searching for specimens.

"I've had residents from the region contact me about snakes in their area and now and then someone will bring me a snake," he added. "I also contacted every major museum in the nation and have received some information from them on Kentucky snakes."

He continued:

"Of the different forms of Kentucky snakes, not all occur in Eastern Kentucky. There are several that occur only in the coastal plain area of Western Kentucky and a few in Southern Kentucky and few that extend into the northern areas.

"One of the most common snakes in Eastern Kentucky is the black rat snake which grows to about eight feet," Meade added. "But, of the different forms of snakes in Kentucky, only six are venomous."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "Epidemics such as typhoid fever, dysentery and cholera are caused by bacteria transmitted by polluted drinking water."

"This makes it very important to be able to determine whether or not water is safe to drink," said Dr. Ted Pass, professor of microbiology at Morehead State University.

Dr. Pass is director of the newly established Water Testing

Laboratory at MSU which is providing bacteriological examination of public

and private drinking water supplies in Eastern and Southeastern Kentucky.

"We began testing water as a result of the Gateway Area Development District expressing a need for such a service in the region," said Dr. Pass.

He continued:

"Not only do we want to provide a service for the health departments in this region but also all the public water supplies in the area as well. We will also be able to process private water supplies such as well water as needed and we also hope to work with Farmer's Home Administration (FHA)."

Since establishment in July, more than 50 samples from the region have been tested at the lab.

"We've had several contacts, not only from our immediate region, but also from different sections of state," Dr. Pass said. "So it's possible that we may be serving many of the health departments and hpublic drinking water supply sources east of Lexington."

When testing water samples, Dr. Pass and Michael Groeschen, Newport senior and chief analyst, check for the presence of coliforms, bacteria native to the intestinal tract of mammals.

If coliforms are present, this is an indication that the water supply is being contaminated with raw sewage either from barns, outhouses, cattle or where septic tanks are being used.

Before establishment of the MSU lab, water could be tested in Frankfort and Madisonville. The MSU lab will be able to give results of samples within one week and even within 24-hours if it is an emergency. The cost per test is \$5.

"The lab meets both state and federal guidelines for water testing and only certified personnel can conduct the tests on the water samples," said Dr. Pass. "But, our students also have an opportunity to observe the procedures involved and can often simulate the operations to learn about water testing."

These and many other historic events as they were recorded are being heard and seen by history students at Morehead State University.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- When emergency assistance is needed, Don Young is usually one of the first persons to arrive on the scene.

Young, director of Alumni Relations at Morehead State University and director of Disasters and Emergency Services for Rowan County, says that "very few programs or systems in Kentucky are as extensive as ours."

He continued:

"We meet both state and federal requirements and are one of the best equipped rescue squads anywhere."

Young has been involved with emergency services since the early 60's in Ohio and was instrumental in organizing a rescue and recovery squad in Rowan County.

"There are about 35 or 40 students and townspeople who work as volunteers with the squad," added Young. "They all work with social services and other organizations in communities where assistance is needed."

In 1978, the squad assisted in flood areas, making house to house searches and determining damages to the areas.

Young is equipped to carry his message statewide with a video tape program on rescue training used in advanced rescue seminars. The program describes rescue operations required in a variety of emergencies.

"We also work closely with the national weather service to monitor severe weather alerts and with the local cable television company about installation of an emergency warning system," Young said,

Young organizes two simulated disaster drills per year in cooperation with St. Claire Medical Center in Morehead to keep squad volunteers ready --- should an emergency occur in the area.

He added that cooperation with professionals in the community has been outstanding and the emergency and rescue services are constantly improving.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Baton twirlers are often attractive young women who have been twirling since they were little girls.

However, one of Morehead State University's feature twirlers does not fit this description at all.

Tony Dembo is the first male twirler to perform with MSU's band.

Unlike most of the women, Dembo didn't begin twirling until his sophomore year at Lebanon (Ohio) High School where he received his "big break" while trying out for drum major.

The band director offered Dembo the role of solo twirler. Even though he had no previous twirling experience, he learned quickly. His sister had twirled for five years and he believes he learned a lot from just watching her practice.

"When I was little I'd pick up sticks and pretend that they were batons," Dembo said. "My grandparents always told my parents that they were giving the wrong child twirling lessons."

He continued:

"During junior high school I ran track and played baseball but I wasn't getting anything out of it because my first love was music."

Dembo is dedicated, practicing from six to eight hours a day during the summer and four to five hours daily during the school year.

"Twirling is just like anything else, to be good, practice is a necessity," he said.

The hard work has had its benefits as Dembo favors the competition and traveling. He has had many opportunities to enjoy both.

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In high school he twirled at King's Island for the Dinah Shore television show and on the steps of the capital building in Washington, D.C. during the Cherry Blossom Festival.

His first national competition was in 1977 in Denver. Since then Dembo has won several titles including Regional Senior Boy Champion, Regional Two and Three Baton Collegiate Championship, Ohio State Three Baton Championship and also qualified for the top ten at nationals.

"My weakest trick is my elbow rolls. It's superhard to toss the baton four times and catch it flat on my elbow and keep it spinning," Dembo said.

When he began twirling he was the only male high school twirler in Ohio. At his first national competition, there were only six males competing compared to 19 this year.

"There is a definite difference between the twirling styles of men and women," he added. "When women twirl they're judged on their gracefulness and dancing abilities whereas the men are judged on speed, variety and techniques. There is a whole style of tricks and techniques for both."

He enjoys sharing the spotlight with MSU's female feature twirler Tammy Jo Worthington, Greenup junior, "I think the world of her. She's the greatest," he said. "When I'm twirling and make a mistake, Tammy Jo helps me out and when she's having trouble, I'll try to help her."

The sophomore business administration major would like to open his own twirling studio and feels that "twirling will be 'in' again someday," that "now flags and rifles are popular but in three or four years, twirlers will be back."

He has already had considerable teaching experience working with the Lebanon High School flag and rifle corps, majorettes and his own flag and rifle group at Lebanon's YMCA.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "We are trying to identify potential sources in Kentucky to prevent any possible epidemics."

Dr. Ted Pass, professor of microbiology at Morehead State University, is referring to the extensive research being done at MSU in the area of histoplasmosis, a disease that can be fatal to humans.

Caused by a common fungus, "histoplasma capsulatum," the organism has been found in bird roosts of Kentucky and most publicized in Indiana where at least 15 persons have reportedly died of histoplasmosis during the past year.

Under a recent \$39,000 grant from the Department of Human Resources, Dr. Pass and eight assistants have identified 69 bird roosts in Kentucky with 52 cultured for histoplasma capsulatum and 21 culturally positive for the fungus.

"It is extremely dangerous to disturb positive areas of the fungus," said Dr. Pass. "If the area is disturbed by either building demolition or the ground being agitated, people can become infected by inhaling air contaminated with a large number of the fungal spores."

He continued:

"Through our research, we are trying to make people aware of the situations surrounding histoplasmosis. We want to inform the people that bird roosts, primarily of blackbirds, starlings and cowbirds, are potential health hazards."

The average bird roost, according to Dr. Pass, is eight acres but the majority of persons who come in contact with the roosts are unaffected.

"When affected, persons feel flu-like symptoms within six to 18 days of contact," Dr. Pass added. "The symptoms may persist anywhere from two to six weeks. During this time the person will either get over it or the problem will become more severe."

Dr. Pass noted that the project has become more significant since the recent epidemic of histoplasmosis, the largest outbreak in medical history, in Indianapolis which is reportedly the result of disturbing a blackbird roost.

"Morehead State is the only university in Kentucky and possibly the only one in the nation doing what we are doing in this field," Dr. Pass added. "We are now running approximately 1,000 soil samples per year, testing for the presence of positive fungal spores."

Dr. Pass recently visited Indianapolis and met with officials to discuss the histoplasmosis outbreak in that city.

"I visited sites where there were bird roosts and took some soil samples," Dr. Pass said. "We are now testing those samples here at Morehead State and trying to assist in tracing the source of that particular outbreak."

Dr. Pass added that positive bird roosts have been identified in the Kentucky counties of Barren, Carroll, Casey, Christian, Graves, Grayson, Hardin, Harrison, Hart, Henry, Jefferson, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Pulaski, Rowan, Shelby, Taylor and Warren.

"In a sense, what we are trying to do is a type of preventive medicine," Dr. Pass said. "We hope to identify positive roosts and then try to prevent any serious health problems."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- How did the national universities in England develop?

Dr. Charles Holt, associate professor of history at Morehead State University, will be researching this development during a sabbatical leave in England beginning in January.

The project is a follow-up of eight weeks of research conducted last summer at Columbia University when he received a National Endowment of the Humanities Fellowship.

Dr. Holt added that he will be studying how civic universities or regional universities in England which were started with local support to meet local needs, developed into national universities.

He will also be conducting research on the Liberal Party in the manuscript room at the British Museum and the House of Lords Library including the papers of several Liberal Party members such as Gladstone, Scott, Spender and Campbell-Bannerman.

Dr. Holt explained a few of the adjustments he and his family would be making in England include driving on the "wrong" side of the road and grocery buying.

"In England, you sack your own groceries and usually shop daily," he said. "Also while in England we will have to find a butcher for our meats and a farm to buy poulty and produce."

"We intend to live as Englishmen, shop as Englishmen, attend English schools and churches and live as part of an English community," Dr. Holt said.

As an historian, Dr. Holt will continue to stay "on top of the field" with his research and return to MSU and make his history classes "come alive."

"I'll be able to relate to the students with a perspective," said Dr. Holt. "They won't be able to get the real experiences of having been there from a textbook."

Although excited as though it were his first trip to England, Dr. Holt did his dissertation research in England in 1973-74, and was a faculty sponsor for 18 MSU students during an historical tour of England, Wales and Scotland during the summer of 1977. He was also faculty sponsor for 25 MSU students during a tour of France, Switzerland, Austria, Italy and Greece during the summer of 1974.

However, he and his family will also try to visit Scotland and Wales.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- With Christmas approaching, a toy doesn't have to be expensive or sophisticated to capture a child's imagination or attention.

"Toys need not be expensive, nor do they have to be so electronically advanced as to have pre-determined functions," says Karen Hammons, instructor of education at Morehead State University.

The primary function of toys is to entertain, but more important is the relation to the imagination and problem-solving capabilities.

"Children are very basic," says Hammons. "They don't require a stimulus to their imagination. The imagination is present and simply requires an outlet." Hammons adds that in selecting toys for a child, the basic consideration should be what the child likes. Every child is different with individual likes and dislikes and his or her choices should be respected to insure the child uses and benefits from the toy.

The greatest asset a toy can have is to be simple, versatile and encourage the child to create his or her own function.

"Something as simple as a box, plastic containers or old clothes can provide a child with hours of unlimited entertainment," she added.

The same is true for books, building blocks, games and records.

All are relatively inexpensive and especially good in clueing in a childs imagination and retaining his interest for several hours and in a variety of ways.

In her work with pre-school and elementary age children, Hammons has observed that the simple props which can be used in "playing house" have the greatest attraction as well as aiding in overall development of the child. The child is afforded unlimited bounds for creating situations and solving problems.

The parents of special children are often concerned about the right types of toys or "what toy will help the child" to overcome his particular situation.

"The special child doesn't play the same way as another child, but does not require a special set of toys," Hammons explains. "Special children obviously can not communicate their ideas in the same manner as other children, but can create their own method through the most basic of toys. The same crayons, blocks, trucks and dolls are encouraged for the special child to broaden imagination, aid in coordination and communication."

Hammons stresses that the most important gift that can be given to a child is the gift of time.

"Tickets to movies or ballgames, going to the park, or simply sitting down for a while and playing house can be the greatest gift of all, the sharing of your ideas and imaginations."

The Crafts I class at Morehead State University has made these and other fantasies, come true through soft sculpture.

Soft sculpture is a relatively new form of art, which involves the use of soft man-made materials, including vinyls, foils and various textures of cloth.

First introduced in 1968, soft sculpture was a phase of Crafts I, which also includes weaving, macrame and batik. Kathy Lauderman, graduate assistant and instructor, currently works with 26 students enrolled in two sections of the class.

"I have students with a variety of interests and backgrounds from business majors to home economics majors to advertising majors enrolled," says Lauderman. "The only real requirement for the class is to have an imagination."

Students begin with an original idea, preferably a larger than life fantasy. Patterns are made from newspapers and pinned together to insure capturing the three dimensional effect. Newspaper pattern pieces are then cut out of selected materials and sewn together.

"I had one girl do everything, including all her stitching, by hand," Lauderman explained. "So knowing how to use a sewing machine isn't a real necessity in our class."

Soft Sculpture 2-2-2-2-2

The sculptures are then stuffed with fiberfill or foam.

One student, who created a six foot guitar, used a foam mattress to achieve the three dimensional effect. The guitar has all the essentials for playing, including fret markings and strings.

Other creations in soft sculpture include a two foot roll of candy, three foot fiddle with bow, 12 foot snake and a four foot candy bar which unwraps with the bar inside.

These and other soft sculpture are on display during the MSU student Christmas Art Sale in the Claypool-Young Art Gallery until Dec. 14.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Dr. Cratis Williams, nationally known authority on the cultural heritage of southern mountaineers believes there is true beauty in the native dialect of the Appalachian people.

A mountaineer himself, Dr. Williams grew up in the Big Sandy Valley, referred to frequently as Kentucky's "Last Frontier." In high school, he began collecting and learning traditional and native ballads, songs and hymns exactly as they were sung, and studied the speech and rhetoric of the mountain folk.

Dr. Williams told Morehead State University history classes that people in other parts of the country "laugh at us for our curious English."

"But, are 13 million people, with their own history, wrong? We're only different," he said.

Describing the Appalachian people as the only major sub-culture still criticized for their heritage, Dr. Williams said the mountain people were really better educated than others at the time of early settlement.

"Our ancestors' education was, in spite of the criticism, superior to that of other colonials," the Appalachian State University professor said. "Their schools were for both boys and girls and they were not taught English, but kept their original dialect."

He continued:

"Of the 13 million people in Appalachia, more than 94 percent can trace their ancestors back to the Scotch-Irish in times of the American Revolution."

He calls this the basis for the characteristics of this dialect.

A professor of English and former Dean of the Graduate School at Appalachian State, Dr. Williams holds a bachelors and masters degree from the University of Kentucky and received his doctorate from New York University.

Dr. Williams' articles on mountain speech and idiom appeared over a ten-year period in "Mountain Life and Work," published by the Council of the Southern Mountains, headquartered at Berea College.

Through his research, Dr. Williams has received various awards including the O. Max Gardner Award for distinguished contributions to the welfare of the human race in 1973; and the Brown-Hudson Award of the North Carolina Folklore Society, recognizing him as "Master Folklorist of Appalachia 1975."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Do you believe in magic? That the hand is quicker than the eye?

Eighteen year old Mark Sparkman does and he can prove it.

A native of Morehead and a freshman at Morehead State University, Sparkman has practiced magic for seven-years.

"I saw 'The Magic Circus' on television one night, featuring magician Mark Wilson," he explains. "It really caught my attention, so I went to the library, started checking out all the books I could find on magic and began studying the art which is also how most magicians started."

Sparkman's first performance was at the age of 13 for a group of Cub Scouts which isn't unusual because many magicians turn professional around the age of 15.

"Mark Wilson was a professional performing magician by the age of 13," Sparkman noted.

He continued:

"To tell you the truth, I really stunk in that first performance. The tricks worked, but I had no style."

Personal style is extremely important to the success of a magician, as it is to most professionals in the performing arts. Originality and creativity in style and presentation are what holds audience attention and makes magic a true art.

The first magic trick Mark learned was the relatively common card trick involving finding the selected card when returned to the full deck. Since then, he has advanced into visual illusions, rope effects, coin tricks and other "close-up" magic.

Mark also has included some audience participation tricks in his performances, such as restoring a torn newspaper and selected card tricks.

Magic is not an expensive hobby and can be performed by anyone, requiring only the most basic props. Essentially, tricks can be performed with any object and learning the art is a simple matter of reading, research and practice. The only price you pay is in time.

"I practice every day during any free time I have," Sparkman says.

He adds that his only regret is never having a chance to talk to any professionals.

He is now a member of the Society of American Magicians and hopes to alleviate this problem by attending the Magicians Convention in 1980.

He hopes to practice magic professionally someday but until then, he'll work toward a college degree at MSU.

"I'm undecided right now as to my academic concentration but Ithink I'd very much enjoy teaching," the young magician said. "I'm
particularly interested in the field of psychology, since it.
is closely related to the many techniques used in magic."

Sparkman has displayed his talents at parties, clubs and organizations throughout the area and is anxious for more exposure. His performances are usually 30 minutes to an hour.
