

SCHOOL NEWS AT MOREHEAD

President J. Howard Payne and Prof. E. V. Hollis have returned from Atlantic City where they attended the American Association of Colleges and the National Education Association. President Payne made an address at chapel Monday morning, and was followed by Professor Hollis who also discussed interesting features of the conventions.

Frank Laughlin, a former Morehead athlete, who will receive his B. S. degree in June, has accepted the position of coach and teacher at the Haldeman High school. Mr. Laughlin came from Mt. Sterling where he finished his high school work.

A highly entertaining lecture was delivered in the college auditorium Friday evening by Dr. Owen Howe O'Neill. Dr. O'Neill was the son of the finance minister of the famous Boer Republic. Having spent his boyhood days in South Africa, he spoke in a very dramatic way of his many thrilling experiences among the savages of the country.
