Martha Norris, assistant professor of agriculture at Morehead State University, says the two-year horticulture program at MSU is continuing to grow with students gaining as much hands-on experience as possible.

The campus greenhouse plays an important role in the program because students learn to compute heat, cooling, ventilation, environmental factors necessary for greenhouse operation and even how to design and layout a greenhouse.

Students involved in special problems prior to MSU homecoming, work with mums and carnations. The students work with the crops through all phases of growth, learning as much about the care and maintenance of each as possible.

Some landscaping on the MSU campus is the work of horticulture students who also provide flower arrangements for various University functions.

"Horticulture is up and coming today," added Norris. "So many people are becoming more aware of the economic conditions and want to grow their own food products, so they are taking time to learn about growing, care and maintenance of various products."

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Another area of the program that is attracting much attention is landscaping.

"Landscaping is becoming popular among our students and interested individuals," Norris said. "Probably because more people are getting interested in beautifying their yards and property."

In the MSU program, recognized by the Board of Regents as a center of excellence, students in the landscape design classes learn to landscape their own yards as well as malls, schools, and residential areas.

"A student is prepared when he or she finishes our horticulture program," Norris added. "He or she is prepared to enter the work field as greenhouse managers, flower shops managers, landscape workers, own and operate their own shop or just know more about horticulture for their own personal interest."



MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "The best rehabilitation is age."

Gary Frazier, assistant professor of sociology at Morehead State University, says that work with juvenile offenders "is a frustrating business" because the "kids are in and out of institutions."

"Eventually some juvenile offenders will stop getting into trouble with the law," adds Frazier. "The only consistent thing that juvenile offenders have in common is age. Age changes them a lot."

In Frazier's juvenile delinquency class at MSU, from 30-40 students per semester receive insight into working with juveniles.

"We try to give the students historical background on how juveniles were dealt with in the past," added Frazier. "We also discuss the theories of dealing with the psychological, biological and sociological backgrounds of the juveniles."

Also discussed are overall views of the juvenile justice system, police and their role, juvenile detention centers, juvenile probation and how it works and discussion of the juvenile institutions.

As a class, Frazier takes his students to at least one juvenile institution per year to receive on the site education of what it is like inside an institution and how the institution functions. The students also observe group sessions at an institution for field experience.

"Most of our students feel they want to work with juveniles when they decide on an area of corrections," Frazier said. "But, I think working with juveniles is more difficult than working with the adults because all the adolescent tendencies are still present."

All the students are not corrections students, as Frazier noted many are education majors or future public school teachers.

"We have a lot of education students taking this course," he added. "They take this course hoping to get some idea as to what they may encounter in the public school classroom because teachers really aren't trained to deal with the disruptive child."

As for a comparison of boys and girls, Frazier said that there seems to be far fewer girls than boys institutionalized for juvenile offenses.

"Girls seem to have less chance of being arrested, going to court and eventually being placed in an institution than boys," he said. "I'm not sure about the exact reasoning for this but it seems like our society just doesn't like to send girls to an institution."

He continued:

"We not only try to keep our students as well informed as possible on working with juveniles and the institutions, but we also try to keep them up to date on any legislation that affects the juvenile system."

Does Frazier's class and teachings prepare the student for work with juveniles?

He is confident, adding that former students now hold professional positions in juvenile work.

"I try to get our students involved as much as possible so they will have a good understanding about what the work is like," he said. "I also encourage anyone who is concerned about the program to talk candidly with individuals who have completed the program."

MOREHEAD, Ky.--- Nights and days that don't end, earth tremors, howling blizzards and minus 40 degree temperatures are all part of the way of life in Iceland, but two Morehead State university students say they would go back.

John Hutka and Ray Keeton, both radio-tv majors from Morehead, spent two years doing radio work together at Keflavik Naval Station in Iceland as part of American Forces Radio Service.

The Base at Keflavik is a satellite communications station and part of the Defense Early Warning System.

"This was a public service radio station," says Hutka. "Our purpose was to keep the military people and their dependents who were stationed there in touch with the United States. When you're in a place like this, restricted by the climate, the culture and a military environment, its easy to lose touch with the real world."

Keeton, who hosts "New Day" on MSU's station WMKY five mornings a week, said. "We ran the station about like any other radio station. I did the morning show and John did the night show. We aired music, news and commentary. We were the most listened to station on the island so we tried to have a little of something for everyone."

"Since so many of the native Icelandics listened to our station, we had to be careful not to use anything that might upset relations," saya Hutka. "They are a very literate, very proud people. They are trying very hard to preserve their culture and heritage, so naturally they don't like a lot of influence that our people have brought to the island."

Keeton says that finding something to do during off hours was sometimes a problem.

"I did a lot of discos for community functions and on base" he said. "During the winter months, there was hardly any daylight and the weather was so severe there just wasn't that much you could do. There were times when the wind was so strong and the temperatures so low that you would literally freeze to death in a matter of minutes if you went outside."

"It was better during the summer months," says Hutka. "Softball was a big sport. Some games would go on forever because it would be daylight 24 hours a day."

He continued: "Sometimes you became disoriented when its either all dark or light. You would forget if its morning or night when you wake up."

With all this, he says that if he was ever in the military again he would go back. "I like the people, the island and the work", Hutka said. "We had a lot of fun and got a lot of valuable experience."

Hutka, who does production work for WMKY, began his radio career while stationed on the island of Diego Garcia, a communications station in the Indian Ocean.

"This was even more remote than Iceland," he says. "There were 2,000 American sailers, 30 British, and us. I liked Iceland better."

A junior at MSU, he says that after graduation he plans on staying with radio work and "would like to get into radio-tv journalism if possible."

"I'll definitely stay with it says Keeton, a sophomore. "I've been in radio so long I can't imagine doing anything else. I would like eventually to own my own station," 5-12-80jh

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "Mining is more than digging coal. You can't just dig the coal and forget about the people and their communities."

Forrest Cameron, coordinator of Morehead State University's mining technology program, says that students in the MSU program must be aware of the sociological and environments aspects of coal mining as well as the actual digging.

MSU is the only state four-year university within Appalachian Kentucky offering a program in mining technology.

The students receive instruction in several aspects of the coal industry including hydraulics, welding, reclamation and political science.

"We want our students to leave the program prepared to be production or personnel managers or other administrators," added Cameron. "We try to give our students a thorough knowledge of the coal industry and teach them to be able to interact with people."

He continued:

"We introduce our students to the equipment that will be used in the industry, but they can usually receive the operation instruction on the job."

The mining technology program at MSU began in 1973 and has consistently grown, offering courses on the economic, environmental, legal, technological and sociological aspects of mining.

Students also receive practical on-the-job training as summer interns with coal companies.

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This is also the first time MSU has participated in a program which allows a student to work full-time for a semester in an actual coal industry setting and receive college credit.

There are MSU students working this semester for Collins and May Mining Company in West Liberty.

"The strength of the MSU program over smaller institutions, added Cameron, "is that MSU is a four-year institution and the students have opportunities to interact with people from a variety of backgrounds from the region."

He added:

"We try to teach our students to interact and communicate within the many facets of the coal industry. We also try to give them the exposure and instruction necessary for coal management positions in private industry, government or labor."

According to Cameron, a primary concern of the program is to give students knowledge of the safe and efficient production of coal and a working knowledge of the constantly changing mine laws and regulations.

"We work with agencies such as MSHA (Mine Safety and Health Administration) and the Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals to keep abreast of the many regulations affecting the coal industry," Cameron said.

He continued:

"Our students also have access to political science courses which are vitally important because of the various government rules and regulations and coal companies need individuals who can read and understand these laws."

Cameron described a strength of the program as the students' access to the knowledge and expertise of Dr. David Hylbert, professor of geoscience at MSU.

"All of our mining technology students have access to Dr. Hylbert, who is probably the top authority on the geologic aspects of coal mine roof controls," Cameron added. "Our students take Dr. Hylbert for classes and receive valuable information from him."

Cameron, who formerly was associated with the mining technology program at Pikeville College, says that often the success or failure of many mines depends upon the ability of the coal companies to mine coal profitably and still comply with the laws.

Students in the MSU program are also made aware of the social implications involved with the coal mining industry.

He added that reclamation is now a very important part of the mining cycle.

"We try to get students into the program who are interested in all the various aspects of mining and I think we have succeeded," he said, adding that the program has experienced very good response from employers in the industry.

Cameron added that the program receives advice on trends in the industry by MSU's coal mining studies advisory board which is chaired by Cloyd McDowell, past president of the Harlan County Coal Operators Association, and is composed of various business persons.

Cameron added that he spends many of his summers working in the coal industry in some capacity to learn about the new techniques and ideas.

"By actually working in the industry during the summer, I experience the changes and new methods and whatever the student might face in the industry," he said. "I feel that this is beneficial to our students because I can tell them of the current activities in the industry."

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Several companies have become involved with the program. Ashland Oil, Inc., recently donated funds for the construction of a coal mining technology laboratory on campus and the Eastover Mining Company donated a continuous mining machine.

"The lab should be ready by the fall semester," added Cameron. "It will enable our students to work and do research in a simulated lab environment. They will also do chemical analysis, coal preparation and other lab projects which will be a big plus for our program."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "The force would be so strong that if man entered or got too close, he would be torn apart atom by atom and explode."

Dr. Russell M. Brengelman, professor of physics at Morehead State University, says that any object, light, particles, planets or man, coming too near the boundary would have no escape, but would be swept into its center.

The inescapable force is a black hole, most recently described in a Walt Disney film.

`With the release of the film, the public interest has been aroused in the phenomenon which has intrigued astronomers and physicists for more than half a century.

Dr. Brengelman has been involved in the study of the "holes in the universe" for several years and adds that increasing student interest has been a major factor in his continuing study of the various theories surrounding the existence of black holes. He has also prepared a slide presentation based on the popular theory of stellar death in relation to black holes.

"The reason for the varying theories stems from the fact that black holes are hard to detect because they can't be seen," Dr. Brengelman said. "The strongest evidence we have been able to gather for the existence of black holes has come through observing the burning out or the death of large stars in the universe." Small stars die more gently than larger stars which die in violent explosions or collapse. As the star begins to die, it shrinks in diameter, the central pressure increases and the force of gravity at the core also increases.

The force of gravity increases so much that it overwhelms electrons, heat, light pressures with all increasing, pulling every part of the star toward the center. The force eventually takes over and seemingly pulls the star into a black hole. This force is so strong that even light can no longer escape.

"This accounts for the fact that the black hole can't be seen," Dr. Brengelman added. "If man could somehow enter the black hole, he would probably experience a great distortion of time and space. Space would flow as time and upon entering, time would appear to stand still."

The presence of a black hole is detected through strong gravitational fields producing spectral lines that evolve into a wavelength and spin rapidly.

The one black hole that is theorized to exist comes from an x-ray source in the constellation Cygnus X-1-7. Cygnus X-1-7, observed only by its motion, is five times the mass of our sun and orbits a Blue Giant Star which is estimated to be 20 times the mass of the sun. In the movie, Cygnus was the starship.

"No external observer will ever be able to see into the blackness within the gravitation radius, unless, as some scientists predict, a craft is developed which could withstand the force of gravity," Dr. Brengelman said. "Until then, the events that theoretical physicists predict happen there can never be proven."

Morehead State University and the University of Kentucky have announced the formation of a cooperative outreach master's degree program in nursing.

The program is designed for working nurses who wish to further their education on a part-time basis.

"This venture represents the latest in a series of programs designed to demostrate Morehead State University's commitment to teaching, research and public service in Eastern Kentucky," said MSU President Morris L. Norfleet. "We are proud to be partners with the University of Kentucky in this new program."

"We are very pleased that the development of this cooperative effort will provide the opportunity for graduate education to nurses in the area served by Morehead State University," said UK President Otis A. Singletary.

Studies in the areas of clinical adult nursing and parent-child nursing will be available to participants on the Morehead State campus. Students may enroll for up to nine semester hours of courses there. A minimum of six students must enroll for each area of study to be offered.

Clinical courses will be taught at MSU by faculty from the UK College of Nursing. The courses also will include clinical learning experiences local at health care agencies.

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In addition, students will take seven hours of core courses at the UK campus in Lexington. Scheduling for these courses will be flexible.

It is estimated that students in the program will be able to earn their degrees in an average of two to two and one-half years. The degrees will be awarded by the University of Kentucky. The graduate program in nursing recently received continuing accreditation from the National League for Nursing.

Officials at both universities are hopeful that the program will result in having more clinical nurse specialists, teachers, and nursing administrators available to serve the people of Appalachia.

Applicants for the program will be required to meet the same qualificiations as on-campus students. Classes for the initial semester are scheduled to begin in the fall of 1980. April 11 is the deadline for submitting applications.

JULIAN BOND

JULIAN BOND has been the embodiment of the New Politics since 1968, when his appearance at the Democratic National Convention: in Chicago symbolized the changes taking place in the party, and which would soon be felt across the nation. JULIAN BOND co-chaired the challenge delegation from Georgia at the Convention, and his fight there against the hand-picked delegation led by then-Governor Lester Maddox made his name familiar to Americans of all political persuasions. He seconded the nomination of Senator Eugene McCarthy, and was himself nominated for Vice President — the first Black in history to be so honored. His age (28) disqualified him for the post.

But JULIAN BOND's propensity for the dramatic confrontation has obscured the political changes, sometimes monumental, which he has inspired. His victory over Lester Maddox and his Georgia state party regulars at the 1968 Convention ended the traditional "unit rule" and ushered in the sweeping changes in the Democratic National Conventions to follow. Earlier, he had brought respectability to dissent against the war in Vietnam by overcoming opposition to his assuming his duly elected seat in the Georgia legislature. Vowing his intention to fight against the war, he had been denied access to the legislature by his colleagues in the Georgia House until the US Supreme Court finally ruled in his favor. BOND has long been in the forefront of the battle for civil and human rights in his native South, and today stands almost alone as one who has chosen to stand and fight for his ideals — both within, and against, the system.

JULIAN BOND sees the New Politics as an outgrowth of the civil rights movement of the 1960s. As one of the founders of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, he participated in the voting drives, sit-ins and other activities of that movement, until his campaign for State Representative in 1965. Soon, the movement gave way to action within the system.

Since then, BOND has spearheaded a number of grass-roots campaigns to foster full participation in the political process by minorities. "We are changing the color of Southern politics," he explains. "The way to do that is not to go after the big jobs but to concentrate on the little ones closer to the people. If enough Blacks are elected at the grass-roots level, it's bound to have a major impact on politics at the top. And if the South is to be freed politically, it will have to be remade from the school board up." In effecting a meaningful change in the politics of the South and providing an alternative to the conservative Southern Congressional bloc, he is creating, county by county, a solid political base for progressive candidates. In 1965, there were fewer than 100 Black elected officials in the South today there are over 2,000, and the number continues to grow, thanks partially to the efforts of BOND and the organizations he sponsors and supports."

In recent years. BOND has received a good deal of exposure outside the political arena. He writes a nationally syndicated weekly column for Newspaper Enterprise Association, Inc. In a lighter vein, BOND hosted the popular Saturday Night Live television show in April, 1977, and played the part of a civil rights lawyer in the Warner Brothers movie, Greased Lightning.

JULIAN BOND is a spokesman for politics at the human level, carried out for human ideals and concerns, not just for the politicians, and power blocs. BOND was there at the beginning of the New Politics, and he still stands today as the ideal of the American dream: a man who will stand and fight within the political system for the rights of the neglected.

JULIAN BOND was born in Nashville, Tennessee, on January 14, 1940. While attending Morehouse College in Atlanta he became active in the civil rights movement in the South, helping found the Committee on Appeal for Human Rights (COAHR) and the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC).

BOND was elected in 1965 to the Georgia House of Representatives, but was barred from taking his seat by legislators who objected to his statements on the war in Vietnam. Despite winning two special elections in 1966, he still did not take his seat until 1967 after a Supreme Court decision that the Georgia legislature had erred in refusing him his place. He eventually served four terms in the House and, in November of 1974, was elected to the State Senate, where he now serves.

BOND was co-chairperson of the Georgia Loyal National Democratic Delegation, an insurgent group, at the 1968 Democratic National Convention. The Loyal Democrats were successful in unseating the regular, hand-picked Georgia delegation. BOND was nominated for Vice President, but withdrew his name from consideration because of his age.

JULIAN BOND serves on the Boards of Directors of the Delta Ministry Project of the National Council of Churches; Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Fund; Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Social Change; Center for Community Change; Highlander Research and Education Center; National Sharecropper's Fund; Southern Regional Council; New Democratic Coalition; and the Voter Education Project. He is Board Chairperson of the Southern Elections Fund and President of the Southern Poverty Law Center

BOND was recently named to Time magazine's 200 Leaders List. His collected speeches have been published under the title A Time to Speak. A Time to Act. His poems and articles have appeared in Negro Digest, Motive, Rights and Reviews. Life, Freedomways, Ramparts, Beyond the Blues, New Negro Poets, American Negro Poetry, The Book of Negro Humor and elsewhere.

Perkins is chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee and has authored more education legislation than any member in the history of the Congress. He was the chief architect of the federal student aid programs in higher education, including work-study, loans and grants.

Dr. Norfleet reported that Rep. Perkins was the unanimous choice of MSU's Founders Day Committee.

Gov. Edwin Morrow signed the bill on March 8, 1922, which led to the establishment of state normal schools at Morehead and Murray. The institutions actually opened their doors in 1923.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- There was little fanfare recently but the hardwood industry in Eastern Kentucky received a boost when a wood drying kiln began operation near Morehead.

Advice and encouragement from Morehead State University's Appalachian Development Center played a key role in the construction of the kiln by the Harold White Lumber Company near Morehead.

Built at a cost of more than \$100,000, the facility is the first in the region and is designed to make processing hardwoods for lumber dealers faster and less expensive.

White said most of the lumber now being dried in his kiln is destined for shipment to furniture makers in Germany and Italy, supported by the presence of Dr. Giambaolo Borgonovo, a lumber broker for European furniture makers from Italy.

"Appalachian hardwoods are considered the best in the world for fine furniture making," said White. "This is especially true of oak, and Eastern Kentucky has an abundant supply at a time when there is a world wide shortage."

White hopes to triple his current potential and increase his investment in the dry kiln operation from \$100,000 to \$300,000.

For more than 20 years, he has been in the lumber business but has either shipped his lumber green, bearing the extra cost of shipping because of the added moisture weight, or has been forced to use distant dry kiln facilities.

White says that drying his own lumber will constitute a financial savings and that the savings margin is likely to increase with the current energy situation and potential increases in shipping costs.

In addition to using the dry kiln to process his own lumber, he plans to make the kiln available to other area lumber dealers.

Now that the area has a source of dried hardwood, according to White, there is a better chance of attracting furniture manufacturers and other wood-related businesses.

"We are confident that the opening of this kiln will prove to be a significant event in the history of the hardwood industry of Eastern Kentucky," said MSU President Morris L. Norfleet.

The facility was designed and built entirely with private funds.

Keith Yarber, Mt. Sterling graduate student at Morehead State University, has surprised himself with the development of his current broadcasting career.

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MOREHEAD, Ky. --- A new swine finishing platform is currently being tested at Morehead State University's Derrickson Agricultural Complex.

The platform has a 14x40-foot feeding floor built about 16 to 18 inches above ground for accumulation of the waste underneath. The slatted floor with 3/4-inch cracks is built on runners so the entire platform can be moved to a new location as desired.

The portable feature aids in controlling diseases, in that new locations are more likely to be disease free. Once the platform is moved, all variations of waste handling equipment are suitable for disposing of the waste.

The platform keeps the swine out of the mud, a most desirable management feature during wet weather. In addition to the partially shaded and ventilated sleeping area on the back side, the platform has heated drinking water and feed provided from a portable self-feeder. Feed is added as needed by the use of a tractor front-end loader

The first group of pigs tested when on feed at 110-pounds per pig and were finished-off at a 222-pound average, 67 days later. Feed conversion was 4.05pounds of feed fed per pound of gain. Gross returns above feed costs and the value of pigs when started was \$34 per head.

A second group of 40 head weighing 70 pounds per head is being started. Normally, pigs weighing about 50 pounds per head would be used, but the heavier weights being used at MSU better fits other swine facilities and feeder pig scheduling at the farm.

The platform is estimated to have a 10-year life with the two-inch rough oak lumber flooring needing replacement about every three years.

Total value of the platform and equipment is about \$2,500.

Three to five groups per year can be fed-out depending on the weight of the pigs when started and the clean-up time required between groups.

Space requirements per pig vary depending on the size of the pigs. Some similar commercially made models suggest about eight square feet per head.

The platform was built by MSU's buildings and grounds personnel.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Costumes play a vital role in theatrical productions whether it be on the screen or on the stage.

Marvin Philips, associate professor of speech and theatre at Morehead State University, and students combine their creativity and imagination to design costumes for MSU productions.

Philips has been involved with many facets of both the professional and collegiate theatre, and works with MSU's theatre in designing costumes for plays and musicals.

"The director must decide what he wants the costumes to say about the character in each scene of the play," says Philips. "So, the designer and director must work together."

The designer then makes a costume analysis chart, which lists each character, each scene and what the needs are according to the demands of the script and the director's interpretation.

The designer must consider the time, the mood of the play, the nationality of the characters, the characters financial status, personality and what colors and styles will create the most authentic representation to the audience.

"The use of color in stage costuming is very important," Philips says. "Colors may refer to certain periods or eras and the designer is limited in his use of color to a certain extent. He cannot let himself be influenced by other periods or styles."

Philips adds that colors have the psychological value of controlling attitudes, creating emotions and even causing a visual change in the character.

Stage Costumes 2-2-2-2-2-2-2

"Colors, such as red and green which are opposite to each other, are used to help force opposition in emotion or opinion between the characters," he adds.

To illustrate a developing relationship between two characters, wear a minimal amount of the same color. The use of that color then increases as the relationship develops.

When the costume analysis is complete a pencil design is made which is converted into color plates.

"The color plates must be closely examined to assure that all color: and lines work together to make a statement to support the mood or thesi: of the play or the intentions of the director," Philips added.

When the plates are approved, the actors measurements are taken and the costumes are made.

Upon completion, a costume line-up is held to make a final check of the costumes representation and authenticity.

The amount of time and expense is creating stage costumes depends on the historic period, the numbers of characters, the type of show, the type and amount of fabric, and how many short-cuts you'll be able to use," says Philips.

He added that one consideration is using short-cuts in costume construction would be distance from the audience.

"In film and television, where your audience would be very close, authenticity is mandatory," he says. "With theatre costuming, where the audience is not so close, you can fool the eye with various substitutions."

Philips and his student assistants' creativity and imagination will be on display in MSU's up-coming productions of "Night of the Iguana," April 17-26 and "The Other Side," April 1-3.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--- Morehead State University's campus radio station, WMKY, has taken on a distinctive new sound.

Beginning April 1, the National Public Radio (NPR) member ______, station began use of a recently_installed satellite receiving dish. The station formerly received its NPR feeds via telephone cable "land lines."

Through the satellite program WMKY will recieve programs through four channels beamed from Western Union WESTAR I or WESTAR II satellites.

"Each channel may be used to receive four separate feeds, or may be combined for stereo or quadrophonic sound," explains Larry Netherton, manager of WMKY.

"And each channel will generate at five kilohertz quality."

Programs will be beamed to the satellite_disc, located on the MSU campus and transmitted by cable to the WMKY studios. Channel feeds will be monitored at the studio by the control toom engineer.

Student engineers will receive a complete training program on the use of the new facilities for monitoring the satellite feeds.

"With four channels, we have the opportunity to air programs live, while at the same time, we can be taping shows for delayed broadcast," says Netherton.

He adds that there are benefits in using the satellite program.

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"It gives us flexibility in programming, he says. The fidelity of programs aired are enhanced, particularly musical programs. We'll be able to offer a greater number of specialized minority programs. And, though expensive at the outset, it will cost conceivably less than using the land-line hookups."

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The station is operating now on a 30-day experimental period, using both satellite and telephone cable land-lines.

Programs presently being aired via satellite include "Morning Edition" and "All Things Considered."

The satellite program is expected to be operating completely in one year and Netherton also expects to expand to six channels in the near future.

Georgia State Senator Julian Bond, while addressing an audience at Morehead State University last night, urged students and guests to become more active and vocal in bringing about necessary changes in the country.

"I don't believe that those people who believe in change through political action and voting should start running out to pick up picket signs," said Bond. "But I do believe that the movement among young people has got to be revitalized again if we are going to see any appreciable social changes in this country."

Bond, who has been active in politics since the 1960's was the first black in history to be nominated for vice president of the U.S.

He helped found the Committee on Appeal for Human Rights (COAHR), the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), served four terms in the House and was elected to the State Senate in 1974.

Bond's address highlights Black Awareness Week which is sponsored by the Black Coalition at MSU.

Georgia State Senator Julian Bond told a Black Awareness Week audience at Morehead State University Wednesday night that he thought the American people should once again become more active and vocal in continuing the fight for necessary social changes.

"I don't believe that those people who believe in change through political action and voting should start running out to pick up picket signs," he said. "But I do believe that the movement among young people has got to be revitalized again if we are going to see any appreciable social changes in this country."

"Problems are not all soluble at the ballot box. It takes a combination of political action and street action to see them out."

Bond has been active in politics since the 1960's, was a leader in the civil rights movement and founded the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, serving as the organization's communications director from 1960 to 1965.

After election to the Georgia House of Representatives in 1965 and denial of seat, he joined the Georgia House in 1967 after a Supreme Court order.

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Bond led a delegation of pro-civil rights Democrats to the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago and was placed in nomination for the vice presidency making him the first black in U.S. history to be nominated for the office at a major party convention.

Bond said he had no immediate political plans outside the state of Georgia at the present time and added that he likes being a state senator because state government is close to the people.

"As opposed to being a member of Congress where you don't immediately see the results of the actions you take, in state government you can vote an appropriation and be able to almost immediately see the results," he said.

Bond discussed the current presidential race, referring to President Carter as a "phantom President, held hostage in the White House."

Strongly disagreeing with Carter's economic policies, he said, "The President has put forth one budget and snapped it back, putting in its place a proposed belt tightening that will completely cut off all economic circulation to the American poor."

A staunch Kennedy supporter, Bond said he felt Kennedy was the only candidate with a background of experience in promoting the rights of all Americans.

"I would like to see the imposition of wage and price controls and a reform in the tax system in an effort to revitalize and expand the private economy in this country," Bond said.

He blamed the Nixon administration for beginning a movement to undo the progress made by blacks during the civil rights movement and added that a crisis now threatens to disrupt the progress made so far.

He described the spreading tax revolt and the growing resistance to affirmative action as "populous prairie fire" and "the first battle in a war between the haves and the have nots."

He added:

"Some years ago the idea of racial justice seemed a new and popular fad. But when it began to pinch union members, the possessors of seniority and the Alan Bakkes, its popularity began to slide.

"In the long run though, the cost of justice is never so great as the cost of denying it. That cost is measured by indicators such as crime, human decay, and social disentegration.

"Two hundred years of endless struggle have convinced many that the prize will never be won and black children in Watts and Harlem are wondering why their American dream is a nightmare."

Because of the "worsening economic situation" Bond said he expects to see a great deal more activism and more interest in current affairs for the 1980's.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "I get looks of doubt and uncertainty sometimes when I'm meeting a landowner for the first time, but usually when they find out that I know my business they can overlook the fact that I'm a woman."

Ann Trofatter, a Virginia graduate student in communications at Morehead State University, works as a service forester in Eastern Kentucky for the Kentucky Division of Forestry and is the first female to be hired in this capacity in the state.

Ann and husband Glen set another precedent when they began work for the state in December, 1978, by being the first married couple to be hired as service foresters in Kentucky.

Ann, a graduate of Clemson University in 1977, says she returned to school to get a degree in communications because "forestry depends so much on communicating well with the people in the areas where you work as well as with fellow workers in the department."

Her job as a service forester involves providing consulting of technical assistance to land owners, fire control, tree planting, erosion control and timber stand improvement in a 15 county area.

"A big part of the job of forestry is acquainting the people in the area with the services and knowledge available to them," says Ann. "Often people damage forest areas or neglect and misuse their timber lands because they've never been told how to best utilize them." She added:

"It's sometimes hard to get people used to new ways when they've been doing things a certain way for generations."

This is one reason Ann says she would like to see an improvement in the area of public relations for forestry.

"There's a great need for education in Eastern Kentucky such as education in utilization, production and timber land improvement."

She added:

"I would like to see more programs instituted in the school systems and in other areas where young people can become familiar with forestry because Eastern Kentucky has such an abundance of timberland. Many of the people don't realize what a financial asset it is or can become in the future."

Ann consults with land owners in the area showing them how and where to build fires lanes, marking trees to be cut, advising them on tree planting, grazing and other aspects of timberland maintanence.

In the area of fire control, she also works as a firefighter.

"I helped fight about 15 fires in Rowan County last year," she said. "During spring and fall "fire seasons" we're kept pretty busy, but I enjoy doing it."

She and her husband have also volunteered to help fight forest fires in the West and says she knows this isn't what people usually think of as woman's work but she thinks it's excitin."

Ann, a Girl Scout veteran of eight years in her hometown of Falls Church, Va., doesn't find the outdoor aspect of her job as physically demanding as some might think.

"I've always been an outdoors person, so tromping around in the woods alone and occasional confrontations with snakes and other varmits are all part of the job."

In addition, the Regents increased his salary from \$49,500 per year to \$58,500, effective July 1. The new contract runs through June 30, 1984. It replaces his existing four-year contract which was to expire June 30, 1982. Dr. Norfleet has held the MSU presidency since Jan. 1, 1977.

District Judge James M. Richardson of Owingsville, a member of the MSU board, characterized the new contract and salary increase as "a strong vote of confidence and reaffirmation of the board's solid support of President Norfleet."

The new pact and salary increase were approved by unanimous vote of the eight members present.

MSU's 1980-81 operating budget totaling \$29,113,665 was adopted by the Regents. Projected income includes \$19,418,400 in state appropriations and \$4,270,420 in student tuition and fees. The largest expense item is instruction at \$8,608,215.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- All things considered, the odds that Morehead State University's Women's Bowling Club would qualify for the National Collegiate Bowling Tournament were very slim, much less finish in the top ten.

Yet the women bowlers overcame the odds, won a berth in the May 1-3, nationals in Milwaukee, Wis., along with the top women's . teams from California to New York, and finished ninth.

The hard work, money-making projects and long journeys to tournaments paid off as the MSU women became the first MSU women's team to achieve national recognition.

"Going into the national tournament, we were ranked 14th in the nation," said Coach Larry Wilson. "All of the girls' hard work had finally paid off. We made it to the nationals and finished ninth."

The hard work and road to national recognition included winning the Southern Intercollegiate Bowling Conference (SIBC) Division VI Championship with a 19-1 record, second place in the regional tournament (losing only to Virginia Tech in the 18-team field), and the championship at the sectional tournament with an overwhelming margin of 413 pins over runner-up Appalachian State and 778 pins over third place Virginia Tech.

Although the MSU women were capable of holding their own with the rest of the field, the good luck was lacking and the bad luck was dominant during the two days and 12 games of national competition.

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"At nationals, we just couldn't get any breaks to go our way," said Wilson. "Our bowlers were hit by a lot of splits and lot of problems."

MSU's anchor bowler Donna Wiziecki, Michigan City, Ind. junior, finished the national tournament well off the leading individual pace she had set during the season while Nancy Arnold, Wayne, N.J. freshman, led the MSU individuals with a 19th place finish.

Sporting a 180-plus average, Wiziecki had her problems in Milwaukee, bowling several games below par. Arnold, a 173 bowler, picked up the pace and her individual effort received strong support from Vivian Gilbert, a 168-sophomore bowler from Glasgow; Melisa Clark, 163, Pikeville sophomore; Diane Wright, 159, Louisville sophomore; Sue Althouse, 158, Waverly, Ohio; Kathy Veerkam, Cincinnati freshman and a 150-bowler who had a 233 in the sectional tournament; Terri Wogoman, 145, Arcanum, Ohio; and Kim Phillips, 144, Middlesport, Ohio sophomore.

Wiziecki rolled the highest game of the SIBC Tournament in Montgomery, Ala., with a 267 and rolled a season high 614 series in conference competition.

To her own list of individual honors, Arnold finished second in the Ohio State Match Game Tournament with MSU teammate Gilbert locking down eighth place.

Club members work as hard off the lanes as they do on the lanes, as money must be raised to pay for all expenses.

Projects have included washing and waxing cars, selling t-shirts, light bulbs, hamburger coupons and baked goods. "Our bowlers spent a lot of time between tournaments working to raise money for our travel and hotel expenses, entry fees, linage fees and uniforms," added Wilson.

The MSU women's team was becoming a team to reckon with as the tournament trail continued toward Milwaukee, especially in the South and Atlantic coast regions.

"While we were in Alabama at the SIBC Tournament, several bowlers asked us where Morehead was," said Wilson. "After we became the SIBC champs and continued to win tournaments, I think most of the bowlers from across the region knew about Morehead and knew who we were when we walked into the bowling centers.

"I think even more bowlers will know about Morehead State now."

MOREHEAD, Ky. -- "Roughing it" doesn't really have to so rough. Maj. Mike Campbell, associate professor of military science at Mogebead State University, explains that the only real limit to the extent of luxuries on a hike or camping outing is based on what the hiker or camper is capable of carrying over the selected distance.

With the camping, hiking and backpacking season in full swing, Campbell offers beginners, novices and experienced backpackers tips that will increase the enjoyment of the outing.

"Backpacking is really just an extended hike," Campbell says. "You live off what you can comfortably carry in your pack and travel on foot anywhere from one day to as long as it takes to complete your trail."

Campbell, who teaches a backpacking class at MSU, says that a backpack should include essentials such as waterproof matches, a pocketknife, a high carbohydrate spack and a compass.

"A first aid kit is also necessary and for overnight trips, a space blanket or sleeping bag should be included," he adds. "The backpacker can also include any desired material or equipment in his pack but keep in mind the total weight of the pack which should weigh no more than 45-pounds.

"The length and time of the excursion should be determined by the individual's physical capabilities and the hikers' knowledge of backpacking in general," Campbell says. "In state and national parks, the trails are listed by severity and the trail selected should be determined by the capabilities of the weakest member of the backpacking group."

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Backpacking_.... 2-2-2-2-2-2

Campbell <u>offers</u> advice to beginners <u>including</u>"don't go out and buy fancy equipment." He suggests the beginner borrow the basic equipment the first few times out, practice with the equipment and go out with an experienced backpacker to get accustomed to the outing.

"Your basic jeans and sweat shirts are usually ideal for the outdoors and shoes should be sturdy. Above all, the attire should be comfortable and not binding," he added. "Also, a change of clothing should be taken in case of an unexpected change in the weather and to avoid any possibility of hypothermia, or the loss of body heat."

As for trails and areas for backpacking, Campbell says that Eastern Kentucky has a number of well designed trails including Natural Bridge State Park, Carter Caves and Jenny Wiley.

"These trails, including the Sheltowee Trace Trail near Morehead and the Simon Kenton Trail, are well marked and equally good trails for the novice and the experienced backpacker," he added.

When planning a hike and selecting a suitable trail, Campbell says the first consideration-should be to "know yourself and know" the terrain you plan to hike."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University's "lunch box campus" at three Eastern Kentucky industries is turning out its first "products" this week.

MSU offers academic courses leading to associate degrees in industrial management technology for supervisory and other salaried employees at A.O. Smith Electric Motor Division in Mt. Sterling and Rockwell International and GTE Sylvania in Winchester.

As evidence of the success of the "lunch box campus" approach, two Rockwell employees, Roscoe W. Johnson and Jimmy Murray, received their associate degrees at MSU's spring commencement in May. -- Programs are currently underway at Rockwell which began in the fall of 1977, 34 employees are now participating. A.O. Smith has 47 employees involve in its program which began in January, 1980. Sixteen GTE workers also participate.

"This is a very unique program," says Dr. Robert Newton, Head of MSU's Department of Industrial Education and Technology. "We are teaching an industrially-related curriculum in an industrially-related environment."

"As far as we know, no other institution of higher education in Kentucky or in our region offers anything like this," adds Newton. "The program allows. employees of these industries to actually pursue a degree without traveling to our campus."

The curriculum is geared toward a particular industry with classes offered during the day for second and third shift personnel and in the evening for first shift workers. Industrial Education 2-2-2-2-2-2-2-2-2-2-2-2

"Our entire corporation is very interested in education, training and upgrading our personnel," says Dwight Cotton, supervisor of labor relations and safety at A.O. Smith. "We are the only Smith plant out of 14 which is involved in an educational program like this and we think it is very important.

Del Diederich, general plant manager of the Mt. Sterling facility, echoed Cotton's remarks.

"We like to draw from our own ranks for supervisors in the basic areas of production, manufacturing engineering and quality control."

He continued:

"In our rapid growth, we once brought people into jobs who had all the basic abilities and understanding of our policies and problems but they also had some basic educational deficiencies."

Via the educational program, the participating companies hope to enhance present abilities and add new skills to better prepare the employees for advancement and promotion, within the company and in life.

"There are possibly 80 or 90 percent of the employees now taking courses who had no intention of ever going to college," adds Cotton. "But since this program began, their self-image has improved and their motivation has increased."

"We've had motivation, cooperation and organization in putting this program together and finally getting it off the ground." Diederich said. "We have masses of people who think they could never have gone to college. But this organization and the University's cooperation have opened a door to them."

Lou Wingate, manager of manufacturing at A.O. Smith and a student in the program, calls the program "very good and most helpful."

He added:

"Taking these classes helps me get involved with the other employees and study a curriculum which is tailored to our particular work needs." The program is as much a benefit to the employees, as to the instructors, says Newton.

"This program keeps our faculty in touch, involved and updated in the industry," Newton says. "Our faculty have the opportunity to discuss changes in programs, techniques and policies of the areas in which we are involved in teaching."

He added:

"Our faculty also have the opportunity to meet and discuss their respective areas of expertise with their counterparts in industry as well as learning from the students themselves. All of this helps make us better instructors."

The agreement between MSU and A.O. Smith is the result of careful and determined planning.

"We met with MSU officials to discuss a two-pronged approach concerned with providing specialized training for our employees," says Joe Craft, personnel manager. "We discussed training in a non-degree area and then sought the possibliity of a degree program being tailored to our specific needs and that is what we finally agreed on."

The University provides opportunity for proficiency credit to employees up to 16 credit hours.

Tuition for A.O. Smith students is handled by a special arrangement between the company and Mt. Sterling National Bank.

"We have a corporation tuition refund program which permits our employees to receive a complete refund when they complete the course work," added Diederich. "Payments for tuition are made directly to the University by the bank and then the students repay the bank when they receive tuition refunds from the company.

"We are delighted with the cooperative program with Morehead State University and are looking for great results." 5/28/80

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "It's not app-a-Lay-chia," he says. "Only non-natives and dictionaries pronounce it that way."

Cratis Williams should know how Appalachia is pronounced. He is an Eastern Kentuckian and respected scholar and founder of a phenomenon currently sweeping Appalachian campuses called Appalachian Studies.

Williams, professor of English, former dean of the Graduate School at Appalachian State University (Boone, N.C.) and current special assistant to the chancellor, is a nationally recognized authority on the cultural heritage of Appalachia.

He will be among the guests at Morehead State University's Fourth Annual Appalachian Celebration June 23-27, as a scholar-in-residence. The celebration, sponsored by MSU's Appalachian Development Center and the Department of Music, will feature Williams in a free concert on Monday at 8 p.m. with Appalachian musicians J.P. and Annadeene Fraley, Edna Ritchie Baker and Alfred Bailey.

In addition to the concert, Williams will conduct a one-hour session dealing with ballads, storytelling and collecting techniques each day in addition to a public program on Appalachian speech.

Williams, a native of the Big Sandy Valley, grew up in Cains Creek, about 25 miles southwest of Louisa in Lawrence County Kentucky. and attended a one-room schoolhouse.

"Cratis has always been proud of being an Eastern Kentuckian," says his sister Mabel Barber, a retired MSU faculty member. "Even when he was young, he liked to visit and listen to older people talk. He was interested in the heritage of our people right from the beginning." The eldest of five children, Williams spent a great deal of time with his grandfather who owned an operated a country store in Cains Creek. During those years, the country store was more than just a place to buy provisions, it was a kind of community center where people went to socialize.

By listening to the stories, the songs and the music, Williams developed an awareness of the Appalachian culture and heritage.

In high school, he began collecting and learning traditional and native ballads, songs and hymns exactly as they were sung, and studied the speech and rhetoric of the mountain folk.

His master's thesis on the ballads and songs of Eastern Kentucky has been published and his doctoral dissertation has been considered "the most comprehensive and valuable current work on southern highland literature."

He has described the Appalachian people as the only major sub-culture still criticized for their heritage, but adds that the mountain people were really better educated than others at the time of early settlement.

"Our ancestors' education was, in spite of the criticism, superior to that of other colonials," he said. "Their schools were for both boys and girls and they were not taught English, but kept their original dialect."

He has said that people in other parts of the country "laugh at us for our curious English. But, are 13 million people with their own history wrong? We're only different."

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MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Known as one of the better institutions at which to receive an education in music, Morehead State University seems a logical site for a musical organization to be formed.

And so it was. Ten years ago, Kate Hawkins, assistant to the director of bands at MSU, and Gladys Wright, a campus visitor, organized the Women Band Directors National Association (WBDNA).

To celebrate the organization's 10th anniversary, the membership will return to Morehead for the 1980 summer meeting June 30-July 2.

Prior to the formation of WBDNA, according to Mrs. Hawkins, women were left out.

"At national conventions for band directors, usually only men would attend," she said. "Band directors are notoriously friendly and can talk until the wee hours of the morning. So, the men would gather to talk and leave the women out. For this reason, women would not attend the conventions."

Realizing the problem, the WBDNA was organized and Mrs. Wright was elected president. Twenty-two charter members gathered for the initial meeting in Morehead and since that time, the membership has increased to more than 250 members nationwide.

The problems facing women band directors, aside from being a minority group, are numerous, says Mrs. Hawkins.

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Women Band Directors 2-2-2-2

"A man can give 24-hours a day to his band while a woman can't. A man who devotes that much time to his band is considered to be dedicated while a woman who spends that much time is considered to be neglecting her family, which is another problem. How does a woman marry, have children, raise a family and be a good band director all at the same time?" she added.

Mrs. Hawkins feels the group's endeavors have been successful.

"We started as a minority group, in a quasi-social sense," she said. "There was, at one time, the feeling that we were an auxiliary group but we wanted to be recognized as a good and forceful group. We have since established ourselves as a strong and independent organization."

WBDNA is the only national association for women band directors and the membership is open to professional women in the band directing field as well as students entering the instrumental music field. More than 50 women band directors from 10 states are expected to attend the anniversary meeting.

Although the group's size will probably never be large, Mrs. Hawkins feels a steady and continuous growth over the next few years will be experienced.
