Letter From a Citizen.

Mr. Editor—
I ask for space in your paper to say a few things that I would like to say to the public. I feel sure that it is known to all who have taken the pains to in even a small way inform themselves, that a bill is now pending in the Kentucky Legislature which if enacted into a law, would knock our Olive Hill courts out. The intention of the bill was not to destroy the Olive Hill Circuit Court, but was aimed at some other counties that have 2 courts as we have in Carter. When the bill was introduced we felt almost certain that our Grayson friends would take advantage of it to knock us out and move all the Court back to Grayson. This would most certainly re-establish the law breakers in this end of the county, as they would be free from the seat of justice that it would be almost impossible for them to be brought to justice. Sure enough, when the bill was placed in the hands of the proper committee of the House, our Grayson friends hid them away to Frankfort to urge the passage of the bill. To counteract this we sent Judge H. L. Woods to Frankfort also. One of the first men Judge Woods met at Frankfort was the Hon. Thos. D. Theobald. When asked what he was doing at Frankfort, like Peter, when accused of being one of the Savior's disciples, bitterly denied having anything to do with the matter, all of which would have made the original Annanias turn green with envy. Now the reader will remember that it has not been so very long since Mr. Theobald, standing in the presence of the now Governor of Kentucky, and a large audience of the citizens of Olive Hill and vicinity swore eternal good-will to Olive Hill and all her industries, and declared that if he was elected to the office to which he was then aspiring—Circuit Judge—he would not only not move the court from Olive Hill but would give us a sure enough court, one that would court for something, and if he was defeated he would still be our friend, and denounce the intimation that was a broad in this part of the county that he would, if elected, remove the court all back to Grayson, as

a wild eyed rumor, as false as a fanatical dream. With this assurance from Mr. Theobald we felt that he would be the last man to rise up against us and try to destroy the hope we have of ever bringing the law-breakers in this part of the county to justice.

The sequel will show how well he kept his promise, for a few ago he appeared boldly before the House Committee that has in charge the bill and told them the court here was a farce and ought to be removed to Grayson, that we had no court house nor jail, and that there were not over 5 men in Olive Hill who wanted the court here. Every law-abiding citizen in and around Olive Hill would be opposed to having the court taken away from here. The influence of the court held here was most wonderful. Law violators struck for tall timber, and those who were already in the clutches of the law were severely punished. Law and order reigned supreme, where lawlessness was running riot. But Mr. Theobald made another very extravagant and uncalculated statement to that Committee. He declared that there was not a man in Olive Hill who was qualified to practice law. I am not prepared to say just how well our lawyers are prepared to practice their profession but know that the records will bear me out when I state that Mr. Theobald examined under oath, as many as five of the lawyers of Olive Hill, and stated to the court, under oath, that they were well qualified to practice law. Now, Mr. Editor we are prepared to fight the men at Grayson who have for so long a time been prodding us in the ribs. We know they are enemies, for they say so boldly and we know just where to place them, but it is hard to tell where to place a traitor. Mr. Theobald threw one arm around Olive Hill and while pouring out his earnest protestations of friendship and love, with the other hand he plunged a knife into our liver.

Yes, he betrayed Olive Hill with a Judas kiss. My good mother taught me while I was a small boy to regard Judas as an arc traitor of modern times, but that was before the days of Tom Theobald in Carter county. But you might ask are there any men

in Olive Hill who would like to see the court here abolished and give the answer yes. You know that there is an old adage that says: "No roguer ever felt the halter draw, with good opinion of the law." And that is true in Olive Hill. "We have men here who are living the lives of law violators, just as Mr. Theobald lived for so many years, and they would love to see the court moved to Canada if possible. A lot more could be said but this will do for the present.

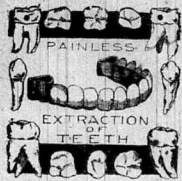

Washington News.

Possibly a provision for the "physical valuation" of railroad property may be tacked on as an amendment to the Aldrich Currency Bill. The two subjects are not so far apart as might be imagined at first glance. The Aldrich Bill provides for the issue of additional bank notes based on the value of railroad bonds, among other bonds, deposited as security with the government. It is held that it would not be fair to allow an issue of notes up to 75 per cent of the market value of the bonds, as provided for in the bill, without ascertaining as near as possible the exact value of railroad property represented by the bonds. The same effort for a physical valuation of railroad property was made when the recent rate law was passed. Senator La Follette of Wisconsin was the father of the measure and it was warmly approved by the President, but it was fought by the railroad interests and finally knocked out. Now Senator La Follette is pressing the bill again and there is some chance though not very much of its being added to the Currency Bill as an amendment providing that railroad bond should not be accepted as security for note issues till the actual value of the property against which they are issued has been ascertained. The President is said to be in favor of this addition to the bill and there are several of the Republican senators who also will back it. There is little question that such amendment will have the support of the Democratic side of the house and possibly of the Senate as well.

The minority is fighting what it recognizes is a losing fight against the Aldrich bill. It was attacked again this week by Senator Clay of Georgia who pointed out that same fault that has been found in it by other speakers, that it practically surrendered the money issuing power of the government to a few corporations and financiers who would be able to expand or contract the currency almost at will. Senator Clay declared that all the money issued by the national government was fiat money with the exceptions of the gold certificates. He said that it was just as good as gold because the guarantee of the government was behind it and it would continue to be good so long as the government was solvent. He favored the minority plan of issuing \$500,000,000 of straight Treasury notes to be used by the government in paying its running expenses, being allowed to find their way into the channels of trade. The scheme is not much more scientific than that of the Aldrich bill itself, though it at least has the advantage of not being so easily manipulated in the interests of high financiers.

The report issued this week as to the physical condition of the natives of Alaska is the work of the medical bureau of the army and states that the ravages

of consumption are more pronounced among the natives than in any other part of the country. The conditions for the propagation and spread of a disease in the native huts is almost ideal and while white men living under sanitary conditions are remarkably healthy in this cold region, the physical deterioration of the natives is marked and alarming.

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Doings in The Hall of Our Legislature.

This will probably be the most interesting session of the Legislature ever convened, and will deal with some very important subjects as now confronts the state. Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 18.—The senatorial race and the county unit bill are still in the throes of a death struggle that is liable to drag every other interest into the vortex and all sink or swim as a result of this struggle. The session is half over and practically nothing has been done. Both sides are attacking each other on an important legislation for fear it may have some effect on the senatorial fight. The tobacco legislation is being neglected, school legislation is being neglected, in fact everything is being postponed or neglected. The legislative bodies remain in session but a short time each day and seem positively averse to doing any serious work. The Democrats say the county unit bill will pass the house this week, while the Republicans say it will not. Those who claim to be the best posted say, just as they are next week, that a senator will not be elected till the county unit bill is disposed of finally in some way. Of course there are all kinds of rumors about it. One man will tell you that he heard a Democrat who has been voting for Beckham say if Bradley could get enough votes to elect Beckham he would vote out of the house and not vote on that ballot, thus electing Bradley. Another man will tell you that he has heard three or four Republicans who are strong for the county unit bill say that if the few Union Democrats try to combine with the Republicans and elect anyone but Bradley they will vote for Beckham. Still another man will tell you that the county unit bill has nothing to do with it and that Bradley will win as soon as one of the Democrats in the house is unseated, which event will occur this week or next.

This legislature is not far behind its predecessors in the number of "sacred-crow" bills before it. By "sacred-crow" bills is meant bills that are introduced just to secure some corporation or some interest into doing something or paying something to have the bill defeated. A story is told of one green member that he asked an old member how he could get some railroad passes for his friends. He was told that the proper and usual way was to introduce a bill to require all railroads to push their trains with locomotives instead of pulling them. He drew up the bill and was about to offer it, but his joking friend found it out just in time to prevent it. The next day a new member wishes to make a "sacred-crow" law and keeps his car packed promises by introducing bills on all imaginable subjects. The titles to these bills are published in the newspapers and usually that is the last heard of them for they die in the committee and the author returns home and tells how he made a desperate effort to have his important measures passed, but he could make no headway because the corporations fought them, when as a matter of fact no corporation probably ever heard of his bills. They have made a "sacred-crow" habit, and usually run for congress on it. They retire to the cooling shades of private life. This is not always the case, however. For five of the Kentucky legislators, viz., J. B. James, Ben Johnson, W. P. Kimball, Harvey Helm and John Langley, have served in the legislature. Congressman Olin James (Crested Star), Senator Swager Shierley, Joe Rhinock, J. E. Remett and D. C. Edwards had never served in the legislature.

During the first two weeks of this session it looked like every member of the legislature wanted to have the honor of introducing a bill to repeal the dog tax law. Two or three bills were introduced every day to repeal it, and it was freely predicted that the first bill passed would be one to take the tax off of dogs. A change has taken place, however, and now it seems very doubtful if the tax is repealed at all. Nearly all these repeal bills were the result of campaign promises, the candidates pledging themselves to introduce a bill to repeal the dog tax as soon as the legislature met. They have kept the promises, but now the sheep men are making themselves felt. Several delegations of farmers from different counties have appeared before the committee having the bills in charge and while the discussions have been warm and no anti-dog tax men have been insistent, there has been a decided change in sentiment. The sheep raisers say the law is just now beginning to be understood and its effect appreciated; that hundreds of sheep were lost last year by dogs, but the owners have been paid full value for the sheep, something that was never done before. They urge that if the law is given a further trial of two years it will be thoroughly demonstrated that the law is an absolute necessity and works to the advantage of everyone.

So far only two bills have passed both houses and are ready for the approval of the governor, these two being a bill giving the governor the power to suspend a stenographer from his office and a bill providing for several messengers and stenographers for the senate and house. A number of bills, however, have passed one house and may pass the other before the session ends, amongst the number being the Creelins tobacco bill which provides a heavy fine for a violator of a contract to not tobacco. It has passed the house and may come up in the senate this week and be passed. The Newman bill to prevent the sale of adulterated or misbranded field seeds has passed the senate, and it carries with it an appropriation of \$20,000 a year to have seeds tested by the Experiment Station, and if found to be adulterated or misbranded, the dealer will be fined. The Newman bill appropriating \$10,000 for buildings on the state fair grounds in Louisville has also passed the senate. Other bills that have passed the senate but not the house are as follows: Appropriating \$20,000 a year to carry into effect the bill to prevent the sale of adulterated or misbranded foods, drugs and liquors. Fixing the salary of the lieutenant governor at \$2,500 per year. Providing for a vote on the question of amending the constitution so that property may be classified for taxation. Giving the holder of a partnership time and a lien on the land for the cost of the lien. Appropriating \$50,000 for a new governor's mansion. The following bills have passed the house but not the senate: The Creelins tobacco bill, the Leland pure food, drug and liquor bill, which is the same as the bill passed by the senate.

Pollies must be a very fascinating game for it seems as if it were gets a good hold on a young man he never lets it alone. As an example of this, the two members for United States Senator, W. C. Bradley and J. C. W. Beckham were both, in their boyhood, paged in the Kentucky homes of their representatives. They both became imbued with politics while associating with the politicians in the legislature, and both have followed the game till each is the recognized head of his party in Kentucky. Bradley was a page in the historical sessions of 1861-62, being appointed to the position by Sergeant-at-Arms John L. Smedley. Twenty years later, in 1881-82, Beckham served as page, being appointed by William E. Bailey of Woodford county, who was sergeant-at-arms that session.

A strong fight is being made, especially by the Shelby county dairymen, against the Simmons bill, which seeks to eradicate tuberculosis from dairy cattle by the compulsory administration of the tuberculin test under state supervision, and providing for an indemnity not exceeding \$60 for each infested cow that is destroyed by order of the state authorities. Dr. H. D. Rodman, president of the Kentucky Dairymen's association, and others who have urged the passage of the bill, say it is in the interest of public health, and is the only way to secure pure milk. Those who oppose the bill say the tuberculin test is not at all infallible and not nearly so good as the bacteriological test, and indicate that the bill is really in the interest of the retailer's purpore. The height of the outgrowth of the campaign in the cities for purer and better milk; but it is doubtful about it being passed.

The following new bills of importance have been introduced the past week on Sunday: Act providing for official stenographers for circuit courts at \$1,500 per year salary. Act to award the deposits in the hands of the state treasurer and sheriffs to the highest bidder. Act to prevent the opening of the notes on Sunday. Act to prohibit any officeholder from serving as committeemen for any political party. Act to reduce the state tax on insurance premiums from \$2 on the \$100 to \$1 on the \$100. Act to regulate the manner in which common carriers shall settle claims for loss of or damage to freight shipped in this state. Act to authorize the use of the old state house building in Frankfort for another state normal school. Act to provide for better school houses and to establish a state board of construction and inspection for school buildings. Act authorizing the commissioner of agriculture to furnish poles to the tobacco growers of each county and appropriating money to pay expenses of warfare against the tobacco fly.

The constitution provides that not more than two proposed amendments to it can be voted on by the people at any one election, and that the legislature shall not authorize a vote on more than two amendments at any one session. The senate has already passed two bills authorizing votes on two proposed amendments, and therefore cannot authorize any more this session, unless the house should refuse to concur in those already passed. This one of any chance to vote on the amendment which proposes to allow a vote of the whole state on prohibition, until next session. One of the two bills passed by the senate proposing an amendment to the constitution, is of vital importance, as it provides for the classification of property for taxation.
