MOREHEAD, Ky. --- "Most people are constantly bombarded with radio and television jingles that they just accept them as a matter of fact, without taking much notice of them."

Jay Flippin, associate professor of music at Morehead State University, has been composing music and lyrics for radio and television jingles since 1973 for such advertisers as Kentucky Fried Chicken, Southern Bell Dairy, Beef'n Boards, Stewart's Department Store and many others.

"When you hear people going around humming your tune or lyrics, then you know the jingle is working," he says.

"The production of jingles involves a lot more than just writing them," he adds. "From a composer's point of view, there are a lot of factors that have to be considered. Most important is the time factor. Most jingles are done for either 30 or 60 second spots, so you have to figure out how to get the vocals, words and name of the advertiser all in this short time period and still make it sound great."

The process of getting all this on a sound track is also very involved, Flippin says, explaining that "most things are recorded in layers with the rhythm first, then the strings and horns, voices, etc."

He added:

"Then you have to deal with things like changes made by the advertiser in lyrics, music and copy. Sometimes you have to go back and rearrange the whole thing. So, it can be a frustrating process at times, but I really enjoy doing it."

Flippin began doing jingles as a student at the University of Kentucky. "I sort of fell into it by accident," he says. "I had friends working for a recording studio in Lexington. I started doing work for them and then-in-1977-I began working as a staff arranger and keyboard operator for---= a Louisville company and later began doing work for a production company

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MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Originating in Puerto Rico and <u>cruising</u> the Caribbean for 24 days sounds like an excursion that would be the envy of the most travelled individual.

Dr. John Philley and Randy McCleese of Morehead State University will experience the 24 days at sea as part of an Eastern Caribbean Deep-Sea Sediment Sampling cruise with the Naval Ocean Research and Development Activity (NORDA) during July.

"I've never had an opportunity to do anything like this before," said McCleese, a spring graduate from Vanceburg, "We will be studying ocean life, dredging the ocean floor and checking the sediment. The ocean depth in the region we will be in will be around 5,000 meters."

"This particular cruise will involve dredging and studying the sediments and life in the upper 50 centimeters of the ocean floor," adds Dr. Philley, Head, Department of Physical Sciences at MSU, "There will be 12 of us in the scientific contingent working in an area known as the Venezuela Basin. We will be divided into two shifts and work around the clock aboard the 280-foot USNS Lynch."

Dr. Philley added:

"We will have an opportunity to be involved in actual hands-on work aboard the ship, working directly with the crew in this dredging operation."

The purpose of the operation is to collect data to determine the relationships between biological, physical, elastic and acoustic properties in the deep-sea sediments of the Venezuela Basin.

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Caribbean Cruise 2-2-2-2-2-2-2-2

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"We are very fortunate to have an opportunity to participate in this operation," adds Dr. Philley. "Before, we have sent students on a week-long field trip to the Dolphin Island Sea Lab near Mobile, Ala. But, after that lab was hit by a hurricane we tried to find another lab to work with."

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He continued:

"We were told of the NORDA operation and contacted them and received two places on the July cruise."

As to the advantage of students and faculty participating in operations like this, Dr. Philley is very encouraged and looks forward to future cooperation.

"Being a land locked institutionalikeaweeareein Morehead, this operation will certainly give us a better perspective on oceanographic research that we would not normally receive. Also, we will be able to see and participate first hand in many of the techniques used in this type of research."

Departing Puerto Rico, the USNS Lynch will conduct research in the Caribbean between Puerto Rico, Venezuela and Hispanola.

"This will be a complete learning experience for both Randy and me," added Dr. Philley. "I also hope we will be able to send faculty and students on operations of this type as much as possible in the future."

"This cruise will be of special interest to me since the operation will concentrate on areas of particular interest to me," added McCleese. "I'm very interested in ocean life and am looking forward to the experience."

The scientific contingent will include representatives from the Naval Ocean Research and Development Activity (NORDA), the University of Georgia, City College of New York, the Smithsonian Institute and MSU.

The attitude of Jairus Deisenroth of Cincinnati was prevailing among the 17 participants in the second session of the Summer Elderhostel program at Morehead State University.

The program affords "hostelers", ranging in age from 60 to 98, the opportunity to live on a college campus for a week and participate in classes and extracurricular activities.

The program at MSU offered participants a variety of courses on Appalachian history and heritage, music, literature, and mountain style dancing.

George Eyster, director of continuing education at MSU and Elderhostel coordinator, attributes much of the success of MSU's program to the special courses.

"The letters we have received have been incredible," Eyster said. "Many of these people had attended previous Elderhostels at other universities but they applauded MSU for the unique program and our hospitality."

Franklin Kehrig of Seacliff, N.Y., described the program as "a real eye-opener."

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"I now have a much greater respect for the people and culture of Appalachia and this visit has reinforced my appreciation," he added.

He continued:

"It has been an eye-opener in other ways. I was initially tremendously impressed with the natural beauty of the campus and area, as well as the educational program. In one word, I would describe it as hospitality -- in its broadest sense."

MSU is among more than 300 colleges and universities in the United States and Canada taking part in the Elderhostel.

Members of the faculty and MSU's Appalachian Development Center staff taught classes in the program.

"The staff here is excellent for working with people, stimulating, and educating them. They seem genuinely enthusiastic and that enthusiasm spreads." added Kehrig.

Eyster says the Elderhostel program "enables senior citizens to meet others from across the country, and make great friends."

The Elderhostel Program National Office has asked MSU to join the International Elderhostel Program next year. Three groups from England, Scotland, and Ireland are expected to participate, in addition to sessions for North Americans.

"I would like to spend an entire semester here," said Kehrig. "One week just isn't long enough."

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MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University's Board of Regents Friday ratified a \$1.4 million reduction in the institution's 1980-81 operating budget, an action taken last week at the request of the Kentucky Department of Finance.

In approving President Morris Norfleet's paring of the budget from \$29.1 million to \$27.7 million, the Regents embraced the University's commitment to preserve newly-funded salary increases.for faculty and staff members already under contract for 1980-81. However, 38 positions now vacant were frozen.

"Biting the bullet is not easy but we really don't have any choice in this matter," said Vice Chairman Jerry F. Howell Sr. of Jackson, who offered the motion to ratify the budget slash.

Dr. Norfleet told the board that he is hopeful that part of the \$1.4 million will be restored in 1981-82.

The Regents learned that the budget reduction was realized by freezing vacancies, equipment purchases and planned new programs and by reducing operating expenses and limiting travel.

In other action, the board:

* Approved a reorganization of the School of Business and Economics which merged four academic departments into three.

* Transferred responsibility for in-service education to the School of Education.

* Consolidated two computing centers into a single unit in the Division of Planning.

* Adopted a new logotype for the university's publications, letterhead stationery and signage.

* Awarded honorary doctoral degrees to Dr. Jack W. Peltason, president of the American Council on Education, and Dr. W. H. Cartmell of Maysville, former board chairman.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Rising costs, politics and accusations of defacing landscape were all topics of concern at Wednesday's opening session of the Eastern Kentucky Coal Conference at Morehead State University.

Curtis Harvey of the University Kentucky, said there is no doubt that coal costs will rise because of the current rate of coal depletion and regulations being placed on the industry. He emphasized the statement, saying that a maximum of 100 permits are often required including state, local and federal, to open a mine.

Verl Johnston, conference consultant, said coal has always been in politics and the coal industry has been accused of defacing the landscapte and destroying roads. He said changes are needed in present strip mining laws that will allow land to be reclaimed, not to its original form, but instead to a flat land which will be suitable for building homes.

"We don't have enought room to put people now," added Robert Cornett, director of MSU's Appalachian Development Center. "And the only way we'll be able to get enough land is to recreate the needed land as a by-product of coal mining."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- With interest and concern about coal as a major source of fuel increasing, Morehead State University is preparing students for the future and to be effective in the coal industry.

Started in 1973 as a degree program at the University, the Coal Studies and Research Program has grown to encompass not only the mining technology curriculum, but includes seminars and energy research.

MSU offers a two-year associate degree in mining technology, a two-year associate degree in reclamation technology, bachelor degree programs for students interested in coal mining, reclamation and energy and several off-campus classes in Eastern Kentucky.

"The program tries to reach people with potential to enter the coal mining industry, people already in the industry and people who live in Eastern Kentucky but who are not directly involved with the industry," says Forrest Cameron, coordinator of MSU's mining technology program which serves Eastern Kentucky through education, service and research.

Educationally, the program is designed to produce a well-rounded graduate, who, according to Cameron, "is more attuned to the industry." The program trains students in actual mining, management, government regulations, reclamation, economics and mine safety.

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A primary concern of the program noted by Cameron "is to give students knowledge of the safe and efficient production of coal as well as a working knowledge of the constantly changing mine laws and regulations."

Currently classes are available in mine drafting, underground mine safety, mine surveying, mine equipment, mine design, ventilation and drainage, mine electrical systems, coal mine geology, coal analysis and preparation, mine laws and management, mine systems technology, surface mining and coal industry economics.

An added advantage to MSU's program is on-the-job training for students through cooperative education which allows the students to work in the industry while receiving academic credit.

Through the use of mining machinery, including a continuous mining machine donated by Eastover Mining Company, the students gain "hands-on" experience with equipment currently used in the industry.

The MSU program involves more than 75 students and Cameron says the growth "depends on the industry and how high school students perceive it." He added that "the program plans to expand through more off-campus classes which will be a major point in the future."

In an effort to assist individuals in the coal industry with information and knowledge from professionals in various areas, a "Seminar-Six Series for the Coal Industry" is also scheduled, beginning Sept. 4, with "Communications and Human Relations for Coal Company Executives, Managers, Supervisors and Personnel Directors.

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Other seminars will focus on "Teaching Methods and Instructional Media Techniques for Coal Industry Trainers and Safety Personnel," "Applied Reclamation Techniques for Eastern Kentucky Surface Mining Operations," "Introduction to the Coal Industry for Non and New Coal People," "Techniques of Coal Analysis and Preparation for the Non-Laboratory Coal Person," "The Potential Export Market for Eastern Kentucky Coal."

A major area for the future of the program focuses on MSU's new Energy Research Laboratory which will enable students to do work and research in a simulated laboratory environment. The lab, built with donations from Ashland Oil, Inc., is the first component of a Center for Energy Studies.

Cameron says the combination of all the aspects of the program, hopefully will lead to the accomplishment of the goal of the program, which "is to be a leader in energy studies in the United States. We (MSU) have an educational right to that since we are located in Eastern Kentucky and the majority of underground coal mining is done in Eastern Kentucky."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- A new supply of teaching information has been discovered by several Eastern Kentúcky elementary and secondary teachers as they return to the classroom this fall.

A workshop entitled "Using the Newspaper in the Classroom" was initiated in July at Morehead State University and the general response from participants has been positive.

"Virtually all of the feedback has been positive," says Dr. Steve Young, assistant professor of education at MSU. "Most of the participants called the workshop an 'eye-opener' because they discovered they had new resources in front of them all the time and didn't realize it."

Dr. Kent Freeland, assistant professor of education, said this was the first time MSU has offered this workshop on campus and the session attracted a wide diversity of students including elementary, middle school, junior high and high school teachers.

"When the teachers left, they were convinced that they could use the newspaper in their classrooms in <u>all subject areas and on</u> all levels," Dr. Freeland added.

Instructors for the workshop included consultants provided by various newspapers who specialize in workshops of this type. Workshop cooperation was contributed by newspapers in Morehead, Lexington, Ashland, Cincinnati, Memphis, Tenn., Richmond, Va., and Norfolk, Va.

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"The workshop consisted of taking newspapers and using them as curriculum material on all grade levels in the classroom," said Dr. Young. "The workshop students had to develop lesson plans utilizing the newspaper with every aspect of the newspaper considered as resource material."

Dr. Freeland described the newspaper as serving a purpose that the textbook can't which was always being timely. He added that because of the current information available through the newspaper, immediate feedback can be received and workshop participants also discovered that the newspaper can be beneficial in the classroom as a supplement to the text or as a substitute.

Dr. Young added that this type of workshop is also beneficial to the University in preparing future teachers and helping them understand and use the newspaper in teaching.

"Something that is important to keep in mind is the teachers do not have to use a specific newspaper or a large metropolitan newspaper," said Dr. Freeland. "The community newspapers are very useful and very effective in this type of instruction."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- If the People's Republic of China voted for the next President of the United States, Jimmy Carter would be elected.

Dr. June Dreyer, director of East Asian Programs at the Center for Advanced International Studies and professor of politics and public affairs at the University of Miami (Fla.), recently told a Morehead State University military science class that because Ronald Reagan has made the Chinese very angry with his recent statements concerning Taiwan, President Carter would be their U.S. presidential choice.

"The Chinese do like a lot of what Reagan has been saying about improving the United States' defenses against the Soviet Union and about not trusting the Soviets," said Dr. Dreyer, a foreign policy advisor to Reagan. "On the other hand, Reagan has made the Chinese absolutely livid on the issue of Taiwan."

She added that Reagan has said more than once that the United States should re-establish official relations with the government on Taiwan which makes the Chinese government on the mainland very angry.

Dr. Dreyer, the author of several books on China, said the Chinese have warned that U.S. relations would be severely damaged if Reagan upgrades Taiwan relations. Should this happen, the Chinese feel the only winner would be the Soviets because the United States and China must work together to counter Soviet expansion and assure world peace.

She also said the Chinese have not been happy with Carter's foreign policy, feeling he has allowed U.S. military strength to decline and has been weak on the issues of Afghanistan and the hostage crisis in Iran.

She added that the Chinese consider the United States an important is sympathizer against the Soviet Union although they do not consider the United States a friend or an ally.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Alexander Ginzburg, Soviet human rights activist, will be the featured speaker as Morehead State University's Concert and Lecture Series opens the 1980-81 schedule on Thursday, Sept. 25.

Ginzburg was the focal point of world-wide attention in 1979 when he and four fellow political prisoners were exchanged for two convicted spies. The five were flown to the United States in exchange for two Soviet U.N. employees sentenced to 50 years -in-prison for spying.

His open opposition to the Soviet <u>government's</u> repressive policies began in the late 1950's. He has <u>spent</u> several years in Soviet labor camps because of his activities including eight years of special regime labor camp in Mordovian Camp No. 1, the harshest of all the USSR's prison camps.

In 1976, he became a founding member of the Moscow Helsinki Watch Grove which released several studies on Soviet human rights violations and living conditions in Soviet prison and labor camps.

After three years at Mordovian, Ginzburg was taken to Moscow where he was stripped of his Soviet citizenship and exiled to the West.

At that time, Ginzburg had spent a total of nine years in prison. His mother, wife and two sons remain in the Soviet Union.

Rashad was also surprised by the atmosphere around an American university.

"Before coming here, I had heard that American cities were dangerous and that the people were all too busy," he said. "But here, at MSU, you can feel you are among friends. It is very quiet and the people are very polite, very much like home."

After leaving MSU, the men will spend three months at Eastern Kentucky University for advanced business training, then go to the Bluegrass Area Development District for on-the-job training.

"This has been a tremendous learning experience for all of us in the program," says Copeland. "I think both countries have benefitted greatly by the relationship."

Rashad adds:

"I know I can put everything I have learned here to good use and help improve my country."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Alexander Ginzburg, Soviet human rights activist, told a Morehead State University audience Thursday that he feels the Soviet Union could become actively involved in the current Iraq-Iran situation.

"Iraq has been the recipient of Soviet arms and assistance for many years," said Ginzburg, opening MSU's 1980-81 Concert and Lecture Series. "If it becomes absolutely necessary or essential, then yes, the Soviet regime will intervene."

Ginzburg, who has served nine years in Soviet prisons for his open opposition to the Soviet goverment's repressive policies, was released from a Soviet prison in 1979, and exchanged with four fellow political prisoners for two U.N. employees convicted of spying.

After being arrested by the KGB in 1977, for his human rights activities, Ginzburg was sentenced to eight years in the USSR's harshest prison camps where he served less than three years before stripped of his Soviet citizenship and exiled to the West.

Aided by an interpretor, Ginzburg discussed what he termed the most outstanding phenomenon in the last 25 years, the movement for human rights in the Soviet Union.

He described how the movement began and grew after years of mass terror under Joseph Stalin, who Ginzburg called "one of the most blood thirsty dictators the world has ever known."

Ginzburg added that it is possible for this type of mass terror to return to the Soviet Union at anytime.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Growth, in quality and quantity, is the continuing theme at Morehead State University.

From a teacher's college little known outside Kentucky, MSU has evolved into a regional university reaching out to serve Kentucky, Appalachia and the nation.

Morehead State stands today on a 500-acre campus in the foothills of Daniel Boone National Forest. With enrollment at more than 7,000 and 900 faculty and staff members, MSU features a 50-structure skyline dominated by the two tallest <u>occupied</u> structures in Eastern Kentucky, 19-story Caremell Hall and 16-story Mignon Tower.

The University is playing an important role in the research and testing of drinking water in Eastern Kentucky through the newly established Water Testing Laboratory.

The lab provides bacteriological examination of public and private drinking water to determine whether or not the water is safe to drink.

MSU is also actively involved in the training of students to enter the coal industry. The University's efforts received a recent boost with the construction of an Energy Research Laboratory.

Financed with gift funds from Ashland Oil, Inc., the lab is used by faculty, students and staff to <u>the study and analysis of coal</u> and various energy-related projects.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Melvin A. Goodman, Senior Soviet Analyst, Office of Political Analysis, Central Intelligence Agency, said that in the case of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, the warning time was there for President Carter.

He told a Morehead State University military science class Thursday that more than three weeks before the invasion, the CIA wrote a report which was provided to the White House and the National Security Council of the Soviet plans to invade Afghanistan with force.

"Our next mission was to try to determine what the motives were for the Soviet invasion and what the implications were and certainly what were the Soviet objectives in that part of the world," Goodman said. He added that he would make the argument in terms of Afghanistan and the politics of the intervention, the Soviets intervened primarily for the negative consequences that would have resulted if they hadn't used force rather than any positive gains by using force.

"In other words, I am not arguing and it is not the CIA position that the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan is part or the transformation first step in a grand scheme to take over all of Southwest Asia including the oil deposits in the area of the Persian Gulf," Goodman added. "Rather, that the Soviets were confronted with a-series of problems in Afghanistan that would have resulted in negative consequences they were not willing to tolerate and therefore felt a need to use force."

Goodman described the negative consequence as the deterioation of all the major military and political institutions that were primarily established with the help or the assistance of the Soviet Union. Therefore they had a stake in the political structure in Afghanistan.

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"The Soviets would have believed or possibly did believe, that the international perception of the Soviet Union if they did not act to uphold their interest in Afghanistan would have been one of **sector** veakness," Goodman said. "This was extremely important to the Soviet leadership because of the actual weakness they did show early in 1979 when China invaded Viet Nam. The Soviets not only did nothing about that invasion, but made it clear publicly and privately that Viet Nam had everything it needed to wage that war and therefore the Soviets were going to stay out of it."

He **Mass** added that he thought the Soviets thought that was a show of weakness but in the case of Afghanistan, the Soviets felt **des** they could do something about it.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- A method of housing tobacco is being tested at Morehead State University that could prove to be beneficial to the one-man operation.

"This method is not for someone who has a lot of tobacco to put up," said Carl Masters, farm manager of MSU's Derrickson Agricultural Complex. "But, for a one-man operation with about one or two acres of tobacco, this method is very effective and beneficial to the farmer."

The operation permits a farmer to cut his tobacco and hang it on scaffolds in the field until he is ready to house it.

The farmer then uses a front-end loader to lift the scaffolds and stack them in the barn, doing a job alone which normally would take three or four men to accomplish.

"This is a very innovative method in tobacco housing and is something new for us at the farm," added Masters. "I don't know of any farmers in Eastern Kentucky using this method, so we hope to inform them and get them interested."

The wooden scaffolds are 11 feet long, 56 inches wide and seven feet high and are capable of each holding 22 rails of tobacco depending on available barn space.

"We had a lot of tobacco here to put up this year and we needed some way to accommondate our supply," added Masters. "I knew of this method and decided to give it a try."

Masters added that MSU is currently housing approximately two of the farm's 10 acres of tobacco by this method.

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"It may not save the farmer a great deal of time overall, but it does make it possible for the one man to do the entire MOREHEAD, Ky. --- When Gary Babb and friends put on their dancing shoes, people stop to watch and marvel.

After all, Gary Babb, Irvine freshman at Morehead State University, and friends are the reigning World Clogging Champion Kentucky Chimes dance group.

The Chimes recently outdanced more than 40 groups from around the world to win the title in North Carolina and become the first team to win state, national and world championships in the same year.

Babb's clogging career began at age 11 when he taught himself to dance well enough to be invited to join the Little Kentucky Colonels dance group.

After seven years, the 1977 Grand National Championship and a fifth place individually in the 1978 Grand National Championship, Babb joined the Chimes when the Colonels disbanded.

During his clogging career, Babb has danced across the nation displaying the Appalachian-style dancing and introducing it to many areas.

"Clogging and square dancing are much the same thing, except clogging is more precise in movement and timing," said Babb. "What the dance is called really depends on what part of the country you are from."

Members of the Chimes include Babb; Mike Cassidy, 26, of Mt. Sterling and the group's leader; Teresa McClanahan, 10, of Mt. Sterling; Susie Holland, 19 and Jeanna Holland, 16, both of Winchester.

Cassidy, who won the state, national and world singles titles this year, teamed with Babb in the male duo competition and took third place in the world. "I love to dance singles competition," said Babb. "But, being number one is not all that important to me. That doesn't mean that I don't go out and do my very best, but I don't feel bad or down after a competition as long as I know that I gave it my very best."

The Chimes' performance for the world championship audience and judges received a standing ovation at the conclusion of their program, which was a thrill, but Babb says dancing isn't everything to him. He plans to continue his pre-veterinary and agriculture studies at MSU.

"The studies are important. I like MSU's agriculture program because I didn't find a better one anywhere else in the state," Babb said. "I also like the countryside around the school because it gives me an opportunity to escape which I think everyone needs to do sometime."

Clogging takes a lot of time, about three to four hours per week practicing and travelling thousands of miles a year doing shows and participating in competition, including about 150 shows nation-wide last year. But, Babb says he loves it and even after he eventually retires from competition, he will continue to dance.

"I dance mainly for the fun of it," he said. "There is really nothing like getting up in front of a crowd and putting on show."

After the world championship, the shows for the Kentucky Chimes will add regional, national and international audiences.including television and personal appearances.

The Chimes have recently taped segments for "Hee Haw" and "PM Magazine." They will also appear at the Grand Ole Opry and at the 1981 International Festival of Dancing in Europe as guests of the government of France.

By working at the farm, the students receive working experience in their respective agricultural majors. "I plan to teach vocational education in Ohio after graduation, so the work here gives me some valuable experience that contributes to my overall education," says Pam Brooks, freshman agricultural education major from Wellston, Ohio. "I also enjoy the interesting work and the atmosphere here very much."

Although most of the student workers are agricultural majors, some are not.

Joy Brumagen, sophomore graphic arts major and horsemanship minor from Winchester, plans to own horses someday and use her experience at the farm to learn as much about horses possible.

Dr. Judy Willard, assistant professor of agriculture at MSU, says the students are very important to the overall operation of the University farm.

"I don't think we could effectively operate the farm without the students," she says. "They are very eager to learn and do all and more that is asked of them."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- For 28 years the possession of a bit of Eastern Kentucky mountain lore was the goal of two rival institutions,

In 1936, the Morehead State Teachers College (now Morehead State University) Campus Club suggested that a football tradition be established between Morehead State and Eastern State Teachers College (now Eastern Kentucky University).

The tradition would involve the possession of an old "hawg rifle" which would be awarded to the winner of the two schools' annual football clash.

The "hawg rifle," also known as the Kentucky Long Rifle, symbolized the Eastern Kentucky mountain lore concerning the use of the weapon. It was also representative of the section of the state that the two institutions' students lived.

According to mountain lore, the "hawg rifle" was used in Southern <u>Appalachia to kill hogs, which often ran wild and were the staple food</u> of the region.

In the initial contest for the rifle, Morehead State defeated Eastern 19-7, snapping Eastern's unbeaten record before a capacity crowd of 4,000 in Morehead.

The most spectacular play of the contest was by "Tiny" Tim Wyant, known as "The Pride of Russell," who returned an Eastern punt 99 yards for a touchdown with just two minutes remaining in the game,

Wyant's 99-yard run is still an MSU record for the longest punt return and the longest punt return for a touchdown.

Other touchdowns for Morehead State came on a 51-yard pass interception and a 56-yard run.

Morehead State held onto the "hawg rifle" the following three years with a 26-0 win in 1937, a 0-0 tie in 1938 and a 7-0 win in 1937

The tradition ended with MSU's 6-0 win in 1963. During the summer of 1964, Eastern President Robert Martin announced that Eastern would no longer participate in an exchange of any trophies between schools for athletic contests.

Eastern held the edge during the rivalry, winning 14 times including the games from 1953 until 1959. MSU won nine times and there were two ties including 0-0 in 1938 and 20-20 in 1952. No games were played in 1943, 1944 and 1945.

In the 1963 contest, MSU capitalized on six Eastern fumbles.

The game also marked the first time in four years that the rifle remained at the same institution for two consecutive years.

The Eagles and Colonels will continue the rivalry on Saturday, Nov. 22. The game at EKU's Hanger Field begins at 1:30 p.m., but the "hawg rifle" will not be at stake.

The rifle, now in the permanent possession of Morehead State University, hangs in the Eagle Hall of Honor in the foyer of the Laughlin Health Building and Wetherby Gymnasium.

The rifle was donated to the University by the Campus Club, now Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity, and placed in the Eagle Hall of Honor.

Below the rifle is a card characterizing the rivalry between the two schools.

The card says: "Even though retired, the weapon still points toward Richmond."

In announcing the appointment, MSU President Morris L. Norfleet described the veteran educator as "a person of the highest integrity with a lifelong record of dedicated service to public education."

He continued:

Crosthwait and his brother, Harold, donated 52 acres of forested lakefront property in 1975 for the establishment of MSU's Crosthwaite Outdoor Education Center at Cave Run Lake.

"I am excited about accepting this challenge to help conduct the University's first annual giving campaign," Crosthwait-stated. "It is my hope that we can convince others who love and appreciate the University that private gift support is essential for the institution to maintain or achieve excellence in all areas."

Crosthwait will be the chief volunteer in a six-month campaign to raise funds through the MSU Foundation for the benefit of athletics, scholarships, alumni projects and other designated or undesignated purposes.

With his photography and military experience, Wright began his newspaper career with publications in Hazard, Letcher County and Knott County.where he was responsible for a variety of assignments including photography.


In 1977, he became managing editor of "The Knott County News" which enabled him to receive experience in writing, sales, circulation and the overall functions of a newspaper.

The professorship was announced at the Kickoff Dinner for MSU's 1980-81 Annual Giving Campaign, "Threshold of Excellence."

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

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MOREHEAD, Ky. --- For six summer weeks and nine Saturdays, more than 100 Eastern Kentucky high school students expand their cultural and educational opportunities through the Upward Bound Program at Morehead State University.

MSU's program, a federally funded program for culturally, economically, or financially deprived youth, serves 115 students from 12 Eastern Kentucky counties.

Diane Tabor, coordinator of the program at MSU, says that applicants for Upward Bound must meet three federal criteria before they are admitted to the program.

"The students admitted to the program must meet government low income standards, show potential for post-secondary education and not be performing up to their full capabilities in their present school environment," Tabor saýs.

Students are eligible for the program after completing the freshman year in high school and may participate for the three remaining years. The students come to the MSU campus one Saturday each month from September through May and again for six weeks during the summer with transportation, residence hall rooms and meals provided.

"The students are required to take basic courses in reading, English and mathematics," adds Tabor. "They also may select various electives and other activities including bowling, swimming, tennis and auto mechanics."

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After high school graduation, the students are designated as "bridge students," making them eligible for six weeks of college classes at MSU. Instructors for the summer program include area high school teachers and MSU faculty members.


"Since its beginning in 1966, the funding has grown and some of our methods have improved, but the ultimate purpose has and will remain the same," said Charles Gilley, assistant director of MSU's Counseling Center.

In addition to educational opportunities, the Upward Bound participants receive tutoring and counseling assistance and attend various extracurricular activities including theatrical performances, tours of local and regional industries and visits to museums.

"I've seen many changes in our students, some drastic and some very small, but all are changes for the better," adds Tabor. "I know the program is all worthwhile when I see the reactions and the enthusiasm of the students when they come into the program and when they leave."

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

MOREHEAD, Ky. ---- Although a lawyer by trade, James P. (Jim) Pruitt of Pikeville makes a good salesman -- for Morehead State University.

The 32-year-old Pike Countian recently took office as the national president of the University's more than 25,000 alumni after serving the previous year as president-elect of the MSU Alumni Association.

"I sincerely hope that each alumnus of Morehead State will ask this year what they can do to repay the institution for the help all of us received at a critical time in our lives," said Pruitt, who credits his college days at MSU with giving him the personal confidence and academic background for law school.

He was voted MSU's top chemistry student in 1967 and was on the Academic Dean's List for three years. But he feels his activities in student organizations were as beneficial as his classroom work.

Among his personal accomplishments as a student at MSU were selection for "Who's Who," vice president of the Interfraternity Council, président of Circle-K, charter member and founder of the MSU chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity, member and officer of Blue Key National Honorary and Pi Gamma Mu social science honorary and member of the University's Undergraduate Curriculum Committee.

Pruitt has been practicing law in Pikeville since early 1976. He received his bachelor's degree from MSU in late 1970 and his law degree from the University of Louisville in 1974.

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Pruitt says that he knows that many graduates love MSU becausethe school provided "a bridge from troubled adolescence to the responsibilities of adulthood."

"Personally, I feel a deep obligation to help the University continue to serve this region and state and to always be a place of opportunity," he added.

As a law student, Pruitt worked in the Kentucky Program Development Office, the forerunner of the Kentucky Department for Local Government and in 1975 became executive assistant at the Kentucky Center for Energy Research in Lexington.

His coalfield heritage and his exposure to energy research led him in April of 1977 to the post of project manager of the Pike County Coal Gasification Project at Douglas. He later left that position to devote fulltime to his Pikeville law partnership with Michael deBourbon, another MSU alumnus. Pruitt returned to the management of the gasification project late in 1979 while also maintaining his law practice.

The urge to serve MSU first prompted him in 1973 to seek and win a seat on the Alumni Association Executive Council. Before being nominated for president-elect six years later, Pruitt worked on various alumni committees, including awards, special projects and fund raising. He recalled:

"If the opportunity ever came to hold office in the Alumni Association, I wanted to know as much as possible about the organization and to know how to help others give of themselves to MSU."

Pruitt also is quick to mention another reason for his fondness for MSU. His wife, the former Cynthia Jane Price of Coal Grove, Ohio, also is a Morehead State grad. They have two children.








