## Points of Pride . . .

Since starting the higher education scholarship program in 2001, Women Leading Kentucky has awarded more than \$100,000 to deserving women throughout the Commonwealth. This year, 11 students received awards of \$1,500 each and one nonprofit has received \$1,000 for its scholarship fund.

During the summer, MSU ROTC had four cadets and Lt. Col. Mason selected to participate in the U.S. Army Cadet Command's Cultural Understanding and Language Immersion Program (CULP). The cadets and Lt. Col. Mason deployed for a period of 21 days to various countries (Costa Rica, Tanzania, Rwanda, and Senegal) to conduct a variety of humanitarian and educational support missions.

In June, the newly developed Bachelor of Arts in Music (Traditional Music) degree became accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music. It is the only NASM accredited program of its kind. We will begin enrolling majors in Fall 2012.

In July, the MSU Chamber Singers won the Gold Medal in the Mixed Chamber Choirs Open Competition of the World Choir Games held in Cincinnati.

The MSU Symphony Band and Percussion Ensemble recently completed a successful tour in the People's Republic of China with performances in Beijing and Tianjin.

A new Tutoring & Learning Center (TLC) in Camden-Carroll Library opened in Spring 2012. The TLC Camden-Carroll student utilization is anticipated to increase to 90+ hours during Fall 2012.

During 2011-12, overall tutoring increased 76% from 2010-11 reflecting an additional 991 student tutoring sessions.

SOAR attendance for advertised programs totaled 1,827 prospective students.

CLPD awarded 12 Scholarship of Teaching and Learning Professional Travel Grants to the following recipients: Sanjeev Adhikari, Lori Baruth, Jennifer Brimson, Hans Chapman, Sara Lindsey, Janet McCoy, Elizabeth McLaren, Adrian Mandzy, Jonathan Pidlunzy, Paula Serra, Masahito Sugihara and Yuqui You.

The Center for Economic Education hosted training sessions for Virtual Economics this year for 43 K-12 teachers in Floyd and Martin Counties and one for 70 teachers in Nicholas, Rowan, Bath and Robertson Counties.

MSU's Small Business Development Center, through offices in Ashland, Morehead, Pikeville and Paintsville, has counseled 250 clients over the past year in its 25-county service region, assisted with 21 new business start-ups and helped its clients receive over \$7 million in business loans.

The first cohort of 27 doctoral candidates in the College of Education is currently undergoing qualifying exams and capstone proposal hearings with a target graduation date of May 2013.

Nine teams from Elliott, Lee, Lawrence, Mason, Menifee and Morgan County schools competed in the third annual Kentucky Space Movie Project, which introduces high school and middle school students to careers in astronomy, applied engineering, computer sciences, satellite telecommunications, physics, and astrophysics. The project is sponsored by MSU's 21st Century Education Enterprise, Center for Regional Engagement and Datastream.

MSU's Agricultural Sciences has been active in the region; they have hosted FFA contests with over 150 high school students from the region, a number of conferences, livestock shows, livestock clinics, livestock abuse trainings, and agriculture teacher trainings to constituents. In the last year the Ag Ambassadors made 20 high school visits, collected over 1,200 student information cards and assisted with numerous other outreach projects for the department.

## Celebrating 125 years of hope, promise and opportunity.

On a fall morning in October 1887, one student arrived for the first day of class at a tiny rented cottage, known as Morehead Normal School. Another student would enroll later that afternoon, leading to 32 pupils by the end of the school year. It is amazing that the 19th century makeshift classroom became the proud University you see today.

In nearly 125 years, the sweep of history has carried Morehead State University and its predecessor institution from one humble dwelling to the high-tech world of Internet-based classes and a radio telescope/space tracking system which reaches from a campus ridgetop literally to the stars.

Since that first student arrived on campus, more than 63,000 men and women have followed and now call MSU their alma mater. We have grown by leaps and bounds, and transformed into a beacon of higher learning.

### Distinguished Teacher

**Barb Lewis**, associate professor of veterinary technology, joined MSU as an instructor in 1981. She earned an A.A.S. degree in animal health technology from Colorado Mountain College, a B.A. degree in biology from SUNY College at Buffalo and an M.A. degree in adult and higher education from Morehead State.

A member of more than 10 different professional organizations, Lewis serves on the executive board of the Kentucky Veterinary Medical Association. She was a charter member and is currently the first president of The Academy of Veterinary Clinical Pathology Technicians. Lewis has had numerous journal articles published and has presented at local, regional and state veterinary conferences.

### Distinguished Staff Service

**Brenda Wilburn**, director of counseling and health services, received a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing from Bellarmine College, a Master of Science from Marshall University, her Doctor of Public Health from the University of Kentucky and a post master's certificate for rural adult mental health nurse practitioner from Eastern Kentucky University. Dr. Wilburn joined MSU's faculty in 1992.

In addition to her many degrees, she holds several certifications, including Certified Nurse Educator, Family Nurse Practitioner, Adult Mental Health Nurse Practitioner, a Correctional Health Professional certification, as well as her license as a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE).

She has vast experience in the medical field, having previously worked the Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice, St. Claire Regional Medical Center, Pathways Inc., King's Daughters Medical Center and the Ashland Community and Technical College System.

**Julia Hypes**, associate professor sport management, earned her undergraduate degree in mass communications from Middle Tennessee State University.
