

The bill to repeal the double court law which was passed by the Legislature two years ago, has been passed by the recent Legislature, signed by the Governor, and will in ninety days become a law. That some of the methods employed by some of our Grayson friends to knock out our courts here since the appropriation by the Fiscal Court to build a court house at Grayson, till the passage of the bill above mentioned, has been decidedly unkind, and at times pretty shady, goes without saying. Olive Hill made an honest effort to maintain and keep the court here, but was tired to defeat by that air song of promises never kept. But we have neither time nor inclination to grieve over spilled milk—no fight to make on Grayson nor any of her citizens. Grayson won by methods that we would have scorned to employ, but she won, and is welcome to her victory. We are defeated, but not vanquished. On the contrary, it has learned us that the old, old motto that was given to the Commonwealth more than a century ago, when she was in swaddling clothes, "United, we stand; divided, we fall," holds as good today as it did more than a hundred years ago. It is true it has been a rather expensive lesson, but all the more valuable on that account. We have had factions and factions in Olive Hill—we now have a faction. Grayson has done for us what we ought to have done for ourselves. Long ago, namely, cut off the other end of the string. Now we are all pulling the same end. As I have intimated, we have no fight to make on Grayson; we are not going to tear down any of her public structures, to procure donations on which to build. We have ample room at home. The experiences of the past few months have taught our people a valuable lesson; it has been a regular eye-opener to them, and it has opened their eyes, too, to the all-important fact that in union there is strength—the importance of standing together. There is a future for Olive Hill; and while we are just now slightly disfigured, we are still very decidedly in the ring. Like John Paul Jones, "We are just getting ready to fight." A three-story, seven thousand dollar business house is now being erected by one of our up-to-date business men, Mr. N. D. Tabor; a three-story, five thousand dollar building by his affiliate brother, Mr. F. S. G. Tabor; a new brick and granite church is in process of erection and will be completed this year; several other business houses will be built here within the year, besides thirty or forty new residences. Another brick yard is almost sure to be built here this year and a large Baptist church is one of the strong probabilities of the season, so you see we will have enough at home to employ our time without hunting trouble and raising rackets with our neighbors. If, however, some feels like he is hungry and thirsting to just set down on us, let him try a box of tablets, points all up, first, and if he succeeds well, then he might try us. As to the question of a court here, that matter will adjust itself in proper time. We are not worrying about that matter just now; we have other matters to attend to. To our Grayson friends we say: The latch-string of Olive Hill hangs out as usual. Pull the string and come in and help yourselves to what you see, and if you don't see what you want, just call for it. We will make you welcome, as we have always done in the past. In conclusion, let us say to Olive Hill: Have your family funds if you must, scrap with your wife, sue your dear bubby for divorce and alimony,

shoot your neighbors dog if you find him in the pantry, cut your mother-in-law's throat, or shoot the hired man if he happens to make a mistake and hugs your wife instead of the cook, but for Heavens sake.

The "Judge" says Taft will be Winner.

The leading Foraker and anti-Taft organ in Ohio, the Cincinnati Enquirer, Sunday threw up the sponge and admitted that the nomination of Judge Taft for President is now certain.

It was the Enquirer that Senator Foraker used as a vehicle for his year-long campaign against Judge Taft, and every anti-Taft movement was eagerly recorded in that journal.

The Enquirer, however, despite certain defects, strives to be a newspaper, and Sunday it gave to its readers a fair summary of the situation. The correspondents of the Enquirer figure it out that the battle is all over and that all opposition to Taft is now farcical.

For instance, the New York letter shows that while the seventy-two votes of New York State will be cast for Gov. Hughes on the first ballot, that Judge Taft will be the second choice of at least sixty of the delegates, and that the moment that the name of Hughes is dropped the vote of New York State will be cast for Taft.

The Illinois correspondent shows that Cannon will get the delegate vote of Illinois over Taft only as a courtesy, and that Illinois is certain to vote for Taft on the second ballot. The same is said of Wisconsin, where Senator LaFollette is making a canvass.

Moreover, the Enquirer figures it out that while Taft is certain of second instructions from a dozen states that will vote for other candidates on the first ballot, the indications are that he will not need this vote, as the odds are now three or four to one that he will win on the first ballot. The West is solid for Taft; the South is everywhere instructed for him; New England is coming up solid, and he will get at least an even split in the Middle West. Only in the dozen states where there are favorite sons and in a few Southern states where there are always contesting delegations is there even a shadow of opposition.

The absurd attempt to make the public believe that Mr. Roosevelt is a candidate failed of its purposes. Many people differ with him, but no partisan organs can never make the people of this country believe that he is not an honest man. The newspapers that said Mr. Roosevelt is a candidate are falsifying the facts in a vain effort to make capital.

The nomination of Judge Taft at Chicago is now as certain as anything in the future can be. Nevertheless it behooves the Taft men in Kentucky to continue active. Kentucky instructed for McKinley in 1896 despite W. O. Bradley's effort to prevent it, and Taft, winning the nomination as easily as did McKinley, should receive Kentucky's vote.

The Public's Irre- sistible Hero.

By a vote of four to three the great or near-great lawyers of the Judiciary Committee of the Senate declare that:

First—Interstate commerce is under the exclusive control of Congress.

Second—Congress has no constitutional right to forbid interstate carriers from violating the laws of the State and defying its police power.

Hence forty-free states may adopt prohibition, but one may be the center of a vast interstate traffic in whisky beyond the reach either of the State Legislature or of Congress.

The reason here is so much anarchy in the world is we have so much law that is merely injustice, established for the worship of the ignorant and the oppressed.

There are night riders in Kentucky because there is a law-defying Tobacco Trust in New York.

There is a strong antagonism to the railroads in the South because the railroads resist state legislation under the plea of federal regulation, and resist federal regulation under the plea of state rights.

There is a growing sentiment for prohibition because there is organized defiance of regulation of the liquor traffic.

There are strikes at the coal mines because there is a Coal Trust at Pittsburgh.

There is growing impatience with the reign of the rich because the burdens of the rich are shifted to the shoulders of the poor.

Gentlemen of the Whisky Trust, of the Coal Trust, of the Transportation Trust, this is the voice of a patient, though hampered people:

"My will fulfilled shall be:
For in daylight, or in dark,
My Thunderbolt has eyes to see
It's way home to the mark."

Bradley for Fairbanks.

Senator-elect W. O. Bradley has given out a ringing statement, announcing that he favors the nomination of Fairbanks for President. He pays a high compliment to the character and ability of Secretary Taft, and says that he would make a great President if elected. He calls attention to the opposition of the labor unions and the negroes against him. He refers to the organization and activity of the Federal office-holders and their efforts to nominate Mr. Taft. He says if they succeed they will lead the party to another defeat. He concludes by saying:

"I sincerely hope that the Republicans of Kentucky will rebuke these self-constituted masters, and see to it that the boys in the trenches and the people who constitute the backbone of the party go to the various county conventions, assert their independence and forever break the yoke of official control. Each and every Republican is entitled to select his candidate for President without dictation or fear from any source—high or low."

I do not believe there is any doubt of the success of Cannon, Fairbanks or Hughes, if nominated. Frankly, I favor the nomination of Mr. Fairbanks, because I believe he is the most available candidate.

First—He is the unanimous choice of the Republicans of his state.

Second—He is a man of exalted integrity, spotless record, great ability and will not antagonize any views of the Republican party.

Third—He is our neighbor and friend. In the late campaign, he came to this state and did valiant and effective service for the success of the Republican ticket.

Fourth—The people of Indiana did more to assist us in that campaign than those of any state in the Union.

Fifth—Mr. Fairbanks is the intimate friend of Mr. Roosevelt, and any attempt to make the contrary appear is unfair and unjust to both those distinguished parties.

It is perhaps unnecessary to add that whoever the nominee of the Republican party may be will receive my hearty and unqualified support."

Party Reorganization

The outspoken sentiment of the Democrats of Kentucky at Frankfort on the occasion of the Beckham banquet was unreservedly that if the party in the State is to be saved some steps must be taken to put the party organization in Louisville into the hands of men who can hold honest primaries and conventions.

Nine out of every ten Democrats at the banquet were free to say that the Democratic changes last year were thrown away by the conduct of the Louisville machine. With the Court of Appeals decision in the 1905 contest cases starting the party in the face, it was plainly suicidal to put up the same old game in Louisville. History shows that through the assistance of leading candidates on the Democratic State ticket last year Bingham, Bullitt, Lincoln, Blaine and Thompson were denied a fair primary and the machine was allowed to name its ticket. Then the party, both in the city and state, went down to defeat.

The same will be true of all future contests if that gang in Louisville is allowed to remain in charge. Louisville is not always decisive of the result, but the fact remains that the Democratic ticket has never yet lost Kentucky when it carried Louisville and has never yet been defeated except by the vote of Louisville.

There is everywhere among the Democrats of Kentucky a disposition to throw off the yoke of the old Haldeman gang in Louisville. Deprived of party spoils this gang is, indeed, impotent. It cannot send 2,000 men to Democratic primaries in Louisville.

Should Secretary William H. Taft be nominated for the presidency by the Republican national convention it is altogether probable that Frank H. Hitchcock will direct his campaign as chairman of the Republican national committee. Hitchcock has just resigned as first assistant Postmaster General to assist the Taft campaign for delegates in the South. Hitchcock was first lieutenant to Gen. B. Cortelyou, who was chairman of the Republican Committee during the Roosevelt campaign, and the acquaintance made in that capacity has been extended greatly during his term with the postoffice department. In the latter capacity he had direct charge of the fourth class postmaster and used his influence in building up a formidable political machine.

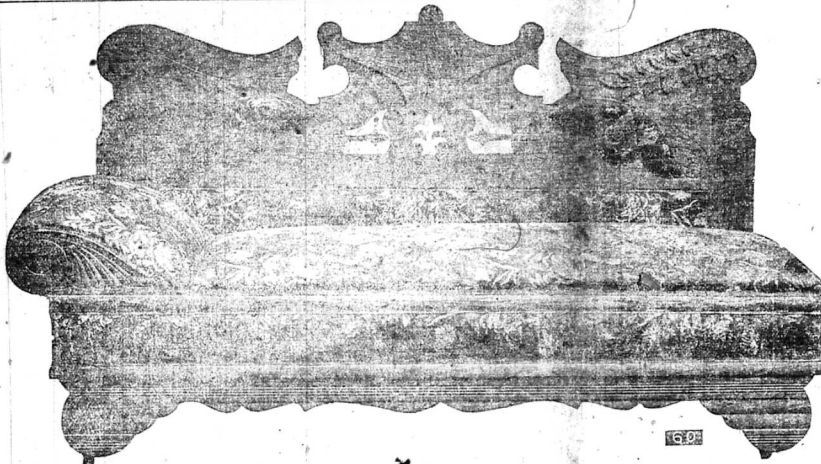

WASHINGTON LETTER.

Official announcement has been made from the Navy Department that Japan has invited the battleship squadron to visit some Japanese port on its voyage around the world and that the invitation will be accepted. The invitation was brought to the State Department by Ambassador Takahira and was almost the sole topic of discussion at one of the Cabinet meetings this week. After considerable debate it was decided to accept and the announcement was then made. It was rather an embarrassing situation, an invitation that this government had not sought, that it did not want to accept and could not decline without an appearance of churlishness since there was to be hospitality extended and received during the forthcoming visit of the squadron of Australia. It has been announced pointedly that there would be no festivities, nothing but a business trip, after the fleet left Manila till it reached home. This was calculated to take the edge off the failure to make any call at a Japanese port. But the Japanese government apparently did not want to leave this easy way out and now the visit will have to be made. Yokohama probably will be the port of call. The distance from Manila there is 1,800 miles and the voyage will necessitate recouling. This will take several days and the hospitalities on both sides probably will occupy ten or twelve days. This with the lengthened voyage will make the fleet almost a month later than it otherwise would be in reaching the Atlantic coast.

These are not very bright days around campaign headquarters on either side. In fact it is likely that the coming presidential election will entail a smaller expenditure of money than has been the case for many years past. The Republican Committee is worse off in this respect than the Democratic. Usually the Republican party has had about all the money there was to have. But this year there is a marked disinclination on the part of the big corporations to contribute. In fact it is said that many of the corporations think they have been hardly dealt with and would not be sorry to see the Republican party defeated. It would be a certainty that a Democratic President with a Republican Congress would be able to do practically nothing in the way of legislation and a Democratic house with a Republican Senate would also tie up the administration very effectually. There has been no big contributions on either side of the campaign fund so far and it begins to look as though there would not be. The Democrats are rather the better off of the two for money, but not for votes, and it is possible that a hint of adverse tariff legislation might bring some of the recalcitrant manufacturing interests to time.
