

# Morehead Normal School News

**MOREHEAD, Ky., April 7.**—The Morehead State Normal School and Teachers College opened its spring term April 2, with an enrollment about 80 per cent higher than the spring term of last year. There are now nearly 800 students taking work in the institution, and about 600 additional students taking extension work.

The Morehead school is planning an extensive program for the summer session which begins June 4. The school has been able to secure such eminent authorities on education for special work, as Dr. O. G. Brimm, formerly of Cornell University; Dr. V. T. Thayer, professor of secondary education, the Ohio State University; Dr. W. S. Taylor, dean of the College of Education, University of Kentucky; Dr. W. D. Funkhouser, dean of the graduate school, University of Kentucky.

In addition to the regular schedule, special courses have been arranged for persons interested in primary education, junior senior high school organizations, and the work of the county superintendent.

In April, President F. C. Button added to the regular faculty, Mr. J. B. Abner, formerly county superintendent of Garrard county, and R. W. Kincaid, superintendent of Bath county schools. Professor Abner and Superintendent Kincaid will do special work for the institution to June.

Prof. W. L. Jayne, head of the rural education department, has

been making a study this year on the improvement of rural school teaching. Professor Jayne will give a brief outline of this study before the Kentucky Educational Association at Louisville.

Prof. S. H. McGuire, of the social science department, is about ready to publish his study of the efficiency of a two-room rural school compared to that of a one-room rural school.

The board of regents are now constructing a large gymnasium, a chapel building, and the president's home on the campus. Work is being pushed rapidly on these buildings, and the contractors hope to finish them by the first of September. The chapel hall will seat 1,500 persons and will be fully equipped with all apparatus necessary to stage modern plays. The gymnasium has two playing floors, a swimming pool and other rooms necessary for the carrying on of a physical education program. When completed, the gymnasium will probably be the most modern structure of its kind in the state. The construction price is approximately \$200,000.

Dean Jay L. Chambers and Miss Helene K. Davis, registrar, are scheduled to appear on the program for the Association of Registrars which will convene at the University of Kentucky April 11 to 14.

Prof. H. C. Haggan, of the agriculture department, is conducting an experiment for Ohio State University on the results obtained by

using different fertilizers on apple growing trees.

President F. C. Button conducted the memorial services in the college chapel to the memory of Aaron Howard, of Salyersville, a student in the institution who died at the Good Samaritan hospital in Lexington as a result of meningitis of the brain.

The Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. sponsored the appearance of a troupe of entertainers at the college chapel Monday of this week. Their program entitled "Rolling Stone" was well received.

Prof. W. J. Clarke has been appointed a committeeman from this district for conducting the national oratorical contest. Miss Elizabeth McKinney and Sue Lewis, of this college, are contestants for this school.
