## Glenn Lane Named To 5th Term As Head Of Rowan Democrats

Rowan County Democrats assembled in harmony at the courthouse Saturday afternoon without a dissenting voice in any of several votes.

Glenn W. Lane was elected to his fifth consecutive four-year term and re-elected as Chairman, and Mrs. Arch (May) Williams was elected Secretary.

No other names were proposed with Lane and Mrs. Williams being selected by acclamation.

The committee and a 100-member attendance was a record—25 of the 26 were present. The one absentee was in the hospital, but sent her proxy.

The committee and committee members were chosen, all without opposition, at precinct mass meeting Saturday, Dec. 5. They will serve four year terms.

James Batts, temporary chairman at Saturday's meeting, predicted continued Democratic victories.

The Democrats also came up with three typewritten pages of resolutions and recommendations. These included: full time Democratic headquarters in Morehead, to be opened after the May, 1965, primary, annual meeting of the committee in early October, with others to be called by the chairman.

Appointment of a vice-chairman and an executive committee to be named soon by the chairman, a liaison committee composed of W. J. Sample, Mrs. Francis Laughlin and Mrs. Beatrice Landreth to work with, and coordinate efforts with the Rowan County Women's Clubs.

A committee composed of Roy Anderson, John Paul Kegley and Mrs. Mabel Reynolds to work to organize, promote and finance an active Young Democratic Club, open at least to the Democratic Club (a student group on the campus of Morehead State College) revising registration lists, eliminating "impossible voters" to expedite and clarify efforts of precinct workers, and alertness to programs, such as Appalachia, that could be beneficial to Rowan County.

Boiled down, the resolutions called for "planned and business-like" procedure and decisions, instead of "existing loose-lync" policy operation.

Lane reported that Rowan Democrats made contributions in the November general election. They were as follows: Lane, the only solicitor being a letter, he said, the party ended up with a \$223 surplus—almost unprecedented.

The Democrats even went into the patronage dimension in this matter. "We (the committee) find that policy, and other positions, have, in many cases, been given to those who have made little, or any significant, contribution to the party and recommend that preference, when feasible and practicable, be given to qualified people who have worked in the precincts, or made other personal sacrifices, to promote party—in other words, to those who 'lend the store'."

Lane said the committee was called to order in a meeting shortly after the May primary if that is the wish of the Democratic nominees for county offices. Purpose of this meeting would be to elect a campaign chairman, appoint campaign committee officers, and arrange for the headquarters, including personnel.

## Unbeaten Eagle Fresh Averaging 102 Points Meet Eastern Today

Morehead State College's undefeated freshman basketball team—averaging 102 points per game—takes on the Eastern State College freshman here at 8 p. m. today (Thursday).

This afternoon's contest will be the final home tilt for the Redding cats until Feb. 2, when they take on Marshall University's first-year team.

Coach John "Sonny" Allen's freshman have won their first three tilts, downing Kentucky Christian, 90-92; Xavier University's Frosh, 100-93 and the Georgetown freshman, 110-80.

With 6-5 center Bruce King averaging 30 points a game, and 6-6 forward Larry Jordan hitting at a 26-point-per-game clip, the frosh bid fair to give next year's varsity one of its most potent crop of sophomores in many years.

Starters in addition to King and Jordan, with their averages, are 6-4 Murdock Williams (13); 6-10 Wayne Martin (13) and 5-10 Mike Tarry (9).

Admission to freshman cage contests here is free.

## Yule Shopping Cut Short By Worthless Check Charges Here

One woman's Christmas shopping spree—based on worthless checks—was halted abruptly this week and the faces the prospect of spending Christmas in the Rowan County jail.

Mrs. Agnes Curtis Martin, 28, who told officers she lived in Lexington, was arrested in Asland Monday evening after passing cold checks totalling \$215 at several Morehead business places earlier in the day.

Police Chief Callis Coyie said the woman cashed a check for \$75 at Ray's Saweary, one for \$40 at Allen's IGA, a \$20 one at Bishop Drug and a \$40 one at Western Auto Store.

In addition, she passed a \$40 check at Layne's Department Store, but the employee who took the check became suspicious, called the bank and found that Mrs. Martin had no account there. The employee found Mrs. Martin in another nearby store and demanded the return of the money.

Coyie said another Morehead firm identified Mrs. Martin as a woman who had passed a cold check there earlier in the year. The woman was arrested by Asland police at the step of a Greyhound bus there Monday and Coyie and State Police Detective Edward Canfield returned her to Morehead.

"If you have the cash, we have the trash," he said in a New York antique shop. Trustfulness in advertising can be carried to ill-advised extremes.

## 11 Scarlet Fever Cases Reported

Rowan County apparently is experiencing an epidemic of scarlet fever, Dr. Kenneth S. Welsh, health officer, said Tuesday.

Eleven cases of the disease have been reported to the health department, either by physicians or school principals this week, and a number of others had been reported previously, Dr. Welsh reported.

There are probably many others which have not been reported to us, too, "the health officer said.

Prime danger with scarlet fever is not the disease itself, according to Dr. Welsh, rather, it lies in the possibility that some cases can develop into rheumatic fever or kidney disease.

## About 20,000 Acres To Be Purchased For Cave Run Dam

Land Buying Procedures For \$26,500,000 Reservoir Detailed

Farmer, and landowners in the Licking River basin from Rowan, bath, Menifee and Morgan counties heard Thursday evening at an official U. S. Army Corps of Engineers open-to-the-public meeting details on the acquisition of property for Cave Run Reservoir.

Between 400 and 500 were present. Col. Willard Roper, chief of the Louisville engineering district, opened the meeting by emphasizing that this was not a public gathering on the "pros" and "cons", or merits of the project since "Congress made that decision, and we have a mandate to proceed with construction."

The first spade of dirt on the 135 foot high, and over a half-mile long earthen dam, about four miles south of Farmers at the Bar in Rowan county line, is scheduled to be turned in March with a 1969 target completion date.

Thursday's meeting, in the Rowan County High School auditorium, was primarily conducted by Col. Roper, Major Gardner, deputy district engineer; and Fred Morgan, chief Real Estate Division, Louisville district. They were accompanied by a staff from the Louisville office.

Morgan explained that the government intends to acquire, almost immediately, the real estate on both sides of the river where the dam will be constructed. These comprise, at the moment, two tracts, but 25 tracts are classified in the dam construction area.

He said that approximately 20,000 acres will be purchased in the four affected counties, and explained that the appraisal and purchase, or condemnation, will proceed from the dam site south of the West Liberty.

In answer to a question from the floor by Otto Ingram, president of the Fleming Valley Home Owners Association, a group that opposes Cave Run, Morgan said that if a land-owner upstream desired an earlier than scheduled appraisal so, he could make plans for moving, or any other valid reason, his request will be given full consideration and usually worked out to his satisfaction.

Licking River drains 826 square miles above the dam. The reservoir at spillway maximum will cover about 4,500 acres with a 164 mile flood control pool.

The estimated project cost is \$26 1/2 million of which \$11 million has been earmarked for land acquisition and land improvement.

Morgan explained at the outset, and in answer to questions from the floor, that the real estate work was handled in the following steps: (1) A qualified staff of appraisers is selected by the Corps of Engineers; (2) They examine, in detail, the property as to production, buildings, improvements, etc.; (3) Careful analysis is made of all real estate sales in the area over the past five years with consideration given to any price increase because of the economy; (4) An offer is made to the owner, usually within 60 days; and (5) If the government and the owner cannot come to terms, the owner has recourse to the U. S. district courts.

He explained that the government must place in escrow with the court the amount offered and the land owner can receive a substantial portion of this money during litigation. (The latter is recent statute on the owner will not be at a disadvantage for lack of money during court procedures.)

Morgan also stated that the real estate owner will be invited to accompany the appraisers during on-site premises inspections so that he can pin-point monetary values that might be overlooked.

Col. Roper said past history on such land acquisition is that 90 per cent is acquired amicably and to the satisfaction of the government and the owner; it is necessary to refer about five percent to the U. S. courts because of faulty titles, missing heirs; so; a policy of fair value can be maintained.

Col. Roper said that if a land-owner upstream is satisfied with the price offered and carry their plea to the courts for a judge, or jury, verdict.

# Breathitt Says Administration Won 9 Percent Of Chairmen

Gov. Edward T. Breathitt said Monday the results of a nationwide opinion poll throughout the state show the administration has "batted" about 9 per cent.

He said he either gained some county chairmen or held his own in all seven districts during Saturday's voting.

"We mean there will never be a matter coming before a district Democratic committee that wouldn't be handled by people friendly to our administration," the governor said.

He called the triumph a culmination of party reorganization efforts that began last summer before the state Democratic Convention.

The precinct and county elections these last two Saturdays have given the administration as solid a support as I know

of in recent history," Breathitt said.

He said he hopes the administration can do as well in the legislative primary elections next spring.

"We're going to make every effort to win a Democrat in every district, who supports my programs," Breathitt said.

He included such matters as the budget, education and public safety.

"The governor said it was possible the spring primaries might be milder affairs than in the past 15 years, when factionalism predominated," Breathitt said.

He did not regard either the proposed \$176 million bond issue or proposed revision of the Constitution as legitimate controversies in legislative races.

"If these propositions carry, the administration will not take the credit," he said. "I regard both as nonissues."

Breathitt said his regime stayed out of four counties in the elections of chairmen last

Saturday.

One was Woodford, the bailiwick of former Gov. A. B. Chandler. The second was Union, home area of former Gov. Earle Clements. The third was Hickman, the territory of Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield.

The fourth was Boyd, where former Ashland Mayor Wilbur Caskey won after a bitter reorganization battle. Fire a Pitt said Caskey "has worked with him since the 1963 Democratic primary, after supporting Chandler."

District by district, these seemed to be the significant changes based on an early analysis:

First -- In Ballard County, Clyde Elrod, an administration backer, succeeds Walter Elrod, a foe. In Caldwell, James Lee Wyatt, pro-administration, replaced Ramsey Taylor, a Chandler man. -- Union had no election because of lack of a quorum, but both candidates were Breathitt supporters. Elsewhere,

Breathitt broke even or better.

Third -- Thomas Carroll, faithful to Breathitt, was elected party chairman at Louisville and the governor's followers won almost all other contests.

Fourth -- Breathitt picked up Marion County, where county judge Joe Jarbo succeeded Bill Buckler, and apparently held him own everywhere else.

Fifth -- Bert Ed Polite, favoring the governor, succeeded Dr. P. O. Lewis, an opponent in Harlan County. No administration losses were tallied.

Sixth -- Cecil Ray Perkins, pro-administration, replaced Congressman John Watts, who didn't run, in Jessamine County. Former Rep. T. J. Hill, a Breathitt supporter, replaced anti-administration candidate James Wall in Lincoln County. Nicholas County Atty. Charlie Cox replaced Luther Clay, considered anti-Breathitt. In Owen County, O. C. Jones, backing the governor, won over L. C. Lundy, no administration friend.

Seventh -- Labor leader Earl Bellew, anti-administration, succeeded in Carter County. pro-Breathitt, in Carter County. In Lawrence County, John Ben Patton, a Breathitt backer, won. This was not challenged as a loss since the situation had not changed.

# Yule Tree Safety Rules Emphasized

A word of caution has been issued to Christmas tree buyers and trimmers in an attempt to prevent fire hazards during the Christmas season.

Harold Foster, director of the fire prevention division of the State Department of Public Safety, said, "Every year, tragedy strikes families in Kentucky because of pure negligence. The selection, trimming, and care of a Christmas tree can make the difference in a happy holiday season and death, injury, and destruction."

Listing things to do, not to do, and tips to remember during the Christmas holidays, Foster offered the following list of recommendations:

"When picking out a tree, choose a fresh one. Saw off the butt at an angle an inch or more above the original cut. Stand the tree in water from the time you buy it until

you dispose of it. Don't rely on self-applied chemical preparations to "flame-proof" your tree; none is truly effective. (Trees commercially treated with oil-listed fire resistant compounds are satisfactory.) Set the tree away from radiators or fireplaces, and never where it might block your escape in case of fire.

"If you choose a plastic tree, be sure it is marked as made of slow-burning materials. If it has a built-in lighting system, it should carry the Underwriters' Laboratories label.

"Metal trees will conduct electricity, so use only indirect lighting. Lighting strings on the tree may create a dangerous shock hazard.

"Decorative lighting should be used with care. Check lighting strings before using for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets.

"Never use wax candles on or near the tree, or with polystyrene foam candle holders or decorations. Turn off tree and other decorative lighting before retiring or leaving the house.

"For outdoor lighting, use only sets listed for outdoor use by the Underwriters' Laboratories.

"Use noncombustible decorating materials wherever ever possible.

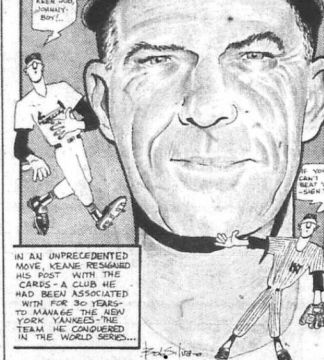
In the illustration, liberal use of planters, a skylight and garden flagstone paving brings all outdoors inside, while translucent American shades soften light from the rear window wall.

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## EXCEEDS AVERAGE

# There Are 118 Cars Here For Every 100 Families

The automobile has become a more important element in daily life in Rowan County than ever before. Because of the auto buying boom of the last few years, the number of cars now in use locally tops all previous records.

On the basis of a general survey of America's automobile population, it is found that car ownership is comparatively widespread in Rowan County. Only a small percentage of families still do not have cars.

The figures show, as of the first of this year, an average of 118 cars for every 100 families, which is more than in many sections of the country.

There has been an increase, also, in the number of two-car families. Some 13 percent locally are now in that class.

The report, which presents figures for all parts of the United States, is from the Standard Rate and Data Service.

It shows that the auto boom has had other business results as well. Among those affected are gas stations, parking lots, drive-in movies, and restaurants, to name a few.

The rise in automobile ownership has gone hand-in-hand with the rise in incomes, as would be expected. In the case of the average local worker, he is earning more than he did previously and is spending more for better living generally.

As a result, there has been a net increase of 20.8 percent in passenger car ownership in Rowan County within a period of three years.

By way of comparison, the United States as a whole recorded an increase of 12.2 percent, and the East South Central States, 14.6 percent.

The number of registered cars rose from 3,220 to 3,890. The upsurge has been due in no small measure to the intense interest of the teen-ager in cars. He wants to be back of the wheel the minute he gets his license to drive.

Car operation costs will be no lower next year, it seems, despite the Government's plan to cut various excise taxes. The levies on gasoline, oil, tires, and the like will stay as they are, according to Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon.

Continued from Page 1) than 15 percent of a farmer's land is taken, the bases are not disturbed. If most, or all, his land is taken, the farmer base goes into a pool, but is almost always reassigned to him if he purchases another farm within five years.

The Internal Revenue Service has full authority over tax procedure when an owner relocates in the same manner as the sale of a home with the seller providing or purchasing, another within a specified period of time.

The dam site is located near the Rowan County Airport, C & O Railroad, and Interstate highway 64. It will provide almost unlimited water for industry, such as pulp and paper mills. 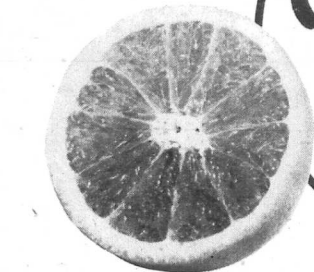

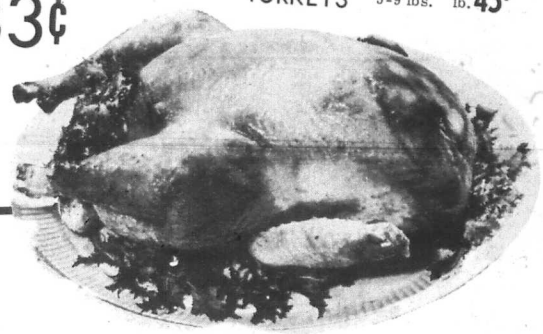
