SUMMER OFFERINGS—NON-CREDIT ACTIVITIES

Band Camp

Dates: July 22 to July 31

Fee: \$25.00 (This fee covers all expenses of the camp.)

The annual Morehead Band Camp offers an inexpensive musical vacation to high school boys and girls of Eastern Kentucky. A small number of singers, as well as instrumentalists, are enrolled. Band work consists of daily ensembles, one or two private lessons for each "Camper," and considerable instruction in small groups under the director of the camp or his assistants. Vocal work includes a daily lesson and possible group singing. The enrollment is limited to approximately fifty out-of-town students.

SUMMER OFFERINGS—CREDIT ACTIVITIES

SHORT TERM—June 14 to July 21

This term is designed to meet the needs of those elementary teachers whose schools begin during the month of July. Students who enroll for the Regular Term may select classes from the Short-Term if necessary.

The maximum amount of credit that may be earned during this term of five and one-half weeks is six semester hours.

REGULAR TERM—June 14 to August 6

During this period students may complete one-half of a semester's work. The courses offered are those which meet the needs of teachers in service, particularly those who are juniors, seniors, or graduate students. Provision is also made for entering freshmen and other lower division students.

The normal student load for this term is eight semester hours.

WORKSHOPS

To meet the needs of students who may not be able to enroll for one of the longer summer terms, and those who may desire a short period of intensive work on a special topic, the following workshops have been planned.

The activities of these workshops are being scheduled for the afternoons so that those enrollees who wish to do so may schedule other classes that meet before noon.

Workshop in Music for the Elementary Teacher (Music 300)

Dates: June 28 to July 9

Credit: Two semester hours

Incidental fee: \$15.00

The activities of this workshop will be selected to meet the everyday needs of teachers in the music program of the elementary school. Credit earned may be substituted for Music 221— Music for the Elementary Teacher, which is required for elementary certification. This course may be taken for graduate credit.

The Director of the Workshop will be Mrs. Lureata Martin of Huntington, West Virginia, who will be assisted by the regular staff of the Morehead Department of Music. During the school year, Mrs. Martin serves as Director of Vocal Music in the Cabell County Schools of West Virginia. She has directed similar workshops on the Morehead campus during the past three summers.

Writers' Workshop (English 390 and 490)

(Enrollees who participated in the Writers' Workshop previously and received credit for English 390 may receive credit for English 490.)

Dates: July 26 to August 6

Credit: Two semester hours

Incidental fee: \$20.00

This Writers' Workshop is being provided for college students, members of non-college literary groups, and other individuals with an interest in writing who desire an opportunity to have their work—fiction poetry, or exposition—discussed and analyzed by authors and critics; and to offer, through a series of lectures, a further understanding of the work of contemporary authors.

Enrollment will also be open to teachers who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity of learning methods of evaluating manuscripts and of teaching writing, and to teachers, and others, who would like to spend a short, intensive period in reading the works of the authors participating in the workshop.

The workshop will be under the direction of Dr. James McConkey of the Morehead Department of English and visiting faculty members will include Mr. Robert P. Tristram Coffin, well-known poet, novelist, and essayist; Mr. Joe Creason, Kentucky journalist; Mr. C. P. Lee, teacher and writer from the University of Tennessee; Mr. Clark Livenessparger, editor; Mr. Ralph Morrissey, of the Nashville *Tennessean*; and Mr. James Still, poet, short-story writer, and novelist of Knott County, Kentucky.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

ADMISSION TO THE FRESHMAN CLASS:

Without Examination. Graduates of high schools accredited by the State Department of Education are admitted without examination, provided they have earned credit for 15 units of high school work acceptable to Morehead. No specific courses are required for entrance, but not more than four units in one subject field will be accepted. If credit in a foreign language is offered for entrance, at least one unit in the language must have been earned.

By Examination. Students who have earned 15 units of high school credit acceptable for college entrance may enter Morehead provided they pass an entrance examination satisfactorily.

Special Note. All students desiring admission as freshmen must have their credits certified by their high school principal or superintendent. These transcripts should be mailed directly to the Registrar of this college by the person certifying them and must be on file at the time of registration.

ADMISSION TO ADVANCED STANDING:

Students entering Morehead from other colleges must present a statement of honorable dismissal from the college attended previously and must satisfy the entrance requirements here. The college does not accept transferred credit carrying a mark of "D." Official transcripts of college and high school credits should be on file in the Registrar's Office prior to the date of registration.

ADMISSION AS A SPECIAL STUDENT:

Students 21 years of age or over, who have not met the entrance requirements of the college, may be admitted as special students and are permitted to carry courses for which they are prepared. Special students are not considered as candidates for any degree or certificate until they have fulfilled college entrance requirements as well as all other requirements for a degree or a certificate.

ADMISSION AS AN AUDITOR:

By payment of the required fees, admission may be secured to a class or classes as an auditor. An individual desiring such admission must apply to the Dean of the College. No credit will be given for this work, nor will the student be permitted to take an examination for credit.

ADMISSION TO THE GRADUATE SCHOOL:

Graduates of accredited four-year colleges are admitted to graduate work on application to the Director of Graduate Instruction. This application must be accompanied by a transcript of under-graduate credits.

Graduates of non-accredited colleges must meet the conditions for graduation at Morehead State College before the application for graduate work will be approved.

If the student's undergraduate preparation is inadequate, this deficiency must be made up by taking designated courses which will not be counted as graduate credit.

The applicant for a degree must arrange a program of graduate work under the direction of his graduate committee and he is not admitted to complete graduate standing until this program has been approved by his committee.

CURRICULA

The curricular offerings at Morehead are varied. Students may pursue programs leading to the—

1. Temporary certificate.
2. Provisional Elementary Certificate and degree.
3. Provisional High School Certificate and degree.
4. Standard High School Certificate.
5. Bachelor's degree without a certificate.
6. Bachelor's degree and the certificate in Vocational Home Economics.
7. Bachelor's degree with an area in Business Administration.
8. Provisional certificates for superintendents, principals, and supervisors.
9. Standard certificates for principals and supervisors.
10. Degree of Master of Arts in Education.

DEGREES

The college awards two undergraduate degrees, the Bachelor of Arts and the Bachelor of Science. Each degree may be taken either with or without a teaching certificate.

The degree of Bachelor of Science is granted to those students who complete all of the requirements for graduation and who earn a minimum of 60 semester hours of credit in the following subjects—agriculture, biology, chemistry, commerce, geology, home economics, industrial arts, mathematics, library science, and physics. Students completing any of the other four-year curricula are granted the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BACHELOR'S DEGREE

The candidate for the degree must meet the following general requirements—

1. A minimum of 128 semester hours of credit.
2. An average standing of 1.0, or higher, on all residence work completed at this college.

3. At least three-fourths of the credit in residence at some standard college; at least one year in residence and the semester immediately preceding graduation at Morehead.
4. A minimum of 43 semester hours of work offered for the degree must be earned in courses numbered 300 or above.
5. The credits earned must include a minimum of 12 hours in natural science and 12 hours in social science. Three of the twelve hours required in social science must be earned in History 400.

Majors or minors may be selected in any of the following subject fields:

AREAS OF CONCENTRATION

To meet the needs of high school teachers who will teach entirely in a general subject area, Areas of Concentration may be selected in lieu of majors and minors. A person who concentrates in an area is not required to offer minors in any other field, but any single subject in which he has as much as 12 semester hours of credit outside his area of concentration may be added to the face of his certificate as a teaching field.

The chief advantages to be gained from following this plan are: first, the trend in secondary education is toward teaching in one department or field of work; second, greater opportunity is afforded for integrated preparation; and third, with the greater emphasis on graduate preparation for secondary teachers, extensive knowledge in some general field becomes exceedingly important as an adequate background.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE MASTER'S DEGREE

The master's degree may be earned in either of two ways. a. If the student elects to write a thesis, the degree may be secured by completing a minimum of 36 weeks in residence and a minimum of 24 semester hours of work in regular courses. b. If the student so desires, he may do additional course work in lieu of writing a thesis. In this event the minimum requirements for the degree are 30 semester hours of credit and 36 weeks in residence.

TEMPORARY CERTIFICATE

A Temporary Certificate, valid for two years at the elementary school level, may be issued to a person who has earned a minimum of 64 semester hours of standard college credits, 48 semester hours of which have been earned in residence, with a scholastic standing of "C" on the total credits earned, in courses prescribed for the first two years of the teacher training program approved for elementary teachers. This Temporary Certificate may be renewed once, for a period of two years, on the basis of 16 semester hours of additional college credits earned in residence from courses prescribed for the four-year elementary curriculum. Under present regulations, this Temporary Certificate will not be issued after July 1, 1956.
