

One Killed; Two Injured

In Accident Near Olive Hill Monday While Cleaning up a Wreck.

CRUSHED BENEATH ENGINE

Was a Mr. Kennedy; the Dead; Johnson and Clemens Seriously and Probably are Fatally Injured.

A wreck occurred on the Lexington division of the C. & O. at Corey Switch, about 3 miles East of Olive Hill, Sunday night and though no one was injured in the accident, one man was killed and two others so seriously hurt that they may die, in an accident which occurred while the crew was cleaning up the wreck.

A big wrecking crane was sent down from Huntington to the wreck scene and found the wreck was in the overturn of the large engine used as helper to push heavy trains over Corey Hill. While it was on return to Aden from a trip it had turned over on rounding a curve.

Grappling chains had been thrown around the engine and the monster was suspended in the air when in some manner the chains slipped and the engine was precipitated to the ground. A Mr. Kennedy, of the wrecking crew, was caught fair under the engine and crushed to instant death. A Mr. Johnson was also caught midway the body by the projecting engine and his back was broken and twisted, besides fearful and most probably fatal internal injuries which he received. A Mr. Clemens, third injured of the crew, escaped with a crushed arm and painful, but not dangerous wounds about his body. His right arm has been amputated. A special car took all three to Huntington, the injured to the C. & O. hospital.

Johnson and Clemens are both young men and single. Kennedy leaves a wife and some small children.

MOUNTAIN OF WEALTH

For Kentucky May Yet Be the Result of Search for "Swift's Mine."

Most probably the legend of Swift's silver mines will never die in tradition and history. An exchange notes that a gold nugget was picked up by a lady on the shore of the Kentucky River in Franklin county this week, and some of the Older inhabitants claim to have heard Indian legends to the effect that the hills along the Kentucky River bore their harvest of gold ore. The lead mines of that county and Scott are now being successfully worked and traces of silver have been seen for years on the Upper Kentucky. The famous

Swift Mine of tradition and story was popularly supposed to be located at the headwaters of the Kentucky in Morgan or Wolfe counties.

This famous Swift mine has thought to have been found several times. John Ramey, of Olive Hill, claims to have found a mine of silver somewhere in this vicinity and is making arrangements to develop it soon.

EVIDENCE INSUFFICIENT TO INDICT.

Grand Jury Return No Indictments Against Night Riders at Carlisle

The Nicholas county grand jury at Carlisle made the following report regarding their investigations into the killing of Hiram Hedges which occurred recently after hearing witness at Carlisle the Nicholas county grand jury found no indictments for night riding or for the killing of Hiram Hedges. Regarding the investigation the grand jury made the following report:

"We have made a thorough investigation into the matter of night riding, including the death of Hiram Hedges, having examined eight or more witnesses on this subject, and in the investigation of every rumor which we have reached our ears, but we are unable, from the evidence before us to make any indictments of any person, either for night riding or the killing of Hiram Hedges. The death of Mr. Hedges we regard as most deplorable, and we know that it has brought reproach upon the fair name of our county, but the perpetrators being shielded under the cover of darkness renders it beyond our power to determine who is guilty.

\$35,000 DAMAGES

Awarded by Pabuech Grand Jury to Hollowell against Night Riders.

In the United State Court at Paducah the jury awarded Robert Hollowell \$35,000 damages against 28 alleged night riders of Caldwell county. It is believed that this verdict will be the death warrant of night riding. The attorneys for the defense were allowed thirty days to file a bill of exceptions; at least fifteen of the defendants are large land owners. The suits of Mrs. Robert Hollowell will be tried at the fall term.
