CITY COUNCIL MET

In Regular Session Monday Night and Passed a Busy Evening

"LID" ORDINANCE PASSED

Proposed Annex Ordinance; Light Franchise Granted; Health Board Appointed; Pool Table License Raised.

The Olive Hill City Council met Monday night in regular session. The entire Council was present; Mayor Hicks presiding, clerk Kees at the desk. After a reading of the minutes the Council immediately proceeded to business.

A number of claims were disposed of.

An ordinance was passed - the "lid ordinance" as Mayor Hicks put it - closing all business houses on Sundays, and no work except necessary household labors shall be executed on Sunday.

G. L. Bramer, was granted a 20-year franchise for electric or ceiling lights.

A proposed annex ordinance was passed, proposing to annex a portion on the South side of Tygart.

Dr. W. D. Williams, Geo. Blizard and Scott Stephens appointed City Board of Health.

R. Z. Henderson was appointed fire inspector.

An ordinance forbidding roller skating on sidewalks.

Licenses increased from \$10 to \$50 per year for each pool table operated in the city.

M. D.
