The Meeting to-day. This being the day appointed for a Conventional meeting in this county, it is earnestly hoped that our citizens, favorable to the object of said meeting, will turn out to a man.

They should recollect that they have always protested against any interference with this delicate subject, and that, to be consistent, they cannot disregard their former pledges now.

These Commissioners, of whom three are to be appointed, will each, if the bill passes, receive \$3,500 per annum, and provision is made for a Clerk at a salary of \$1,000, and an assistant at \$1,500.

Mr. J. W. Davis fully concurred with the gentleman from Henderson, (Mr. Towles), and he advocated the passage of the bill, believing it was desired by the people of his county, and that the present law operated oppressively.

Mr. Underwood opposed the bill, because he believed it would have a tendency to throw the suits now litigated in the General Court into the Federal Court, where the costs were far greater.

Mr. Robertson-Judiciary—a bill limiting the jurisdiction of the General Court in certain cases, read and passed.

Mr. Robertson-Judiciary—a bill to incorporate the Euclipsian Mineral Spring Hotel Company; read and passed.

Mr. McLaning moved to amend, so as to compel the defendant, in case he demurs, which was overruled, to answer immediately, unless the Court, for good reason shown, should give further time, &c.

After considerable debate, the amendment was adopted and the bill passed. And then the House adjourned.

The object of these offices, as appears from the proceedings of Congress, provide a board of Commissioners, by whom all claims against the government can be examined and reported to Congress for its final decision.

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Legislative.

(Continued from the Daily Commonwealth.) IN SENATE. WEDNESDAY, JAN. 17, 1849. The Senate was opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Norton, of the Episcopal Church.

Mr. Grey, from the committee on Internal Improvement, reported the bill providing for a survey for a railroad route from Louisville to Columbus, and from Lexington to the Eastern line of the State, with an amendment, providing for a like survey from Louisville to the Tennessee line, in the direction to Nashville.

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Mr. Madison C. Johnson to be Attorney General of the Commonwealth, in place of O. G. Cates resigned.

Mr. Bruce Porter to be Attorney for the Commonwealth in the 11th Judicial District, in place of Walter C. Childs, resigned.

Mr. Charles S. Waller to be re-appointed Clerk for the Penitentiary.

Mr. James A. Lee to be Mayor of the city of Louisville.

The resolutions of Mr. Swift, which we noticed yesterday as having passed the Senate, and which were introduced, allowing the committee to go behind the legal returns made to the Secretary of State.

While they were pending in the House, Mr. Reader moved an amendment to the Committee be instructed to examine the evidence upon the subject, and to ascertain who has a majority of all the legal votes for Governor.

On this motion, Mr. Reader examined the constitutional and legal provisions bearing upon the subject, and conclusively showed that the returns made to the Speaker of the Senate only could be used, in the first instance, to determine who was elected and returned as Governor.

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The Markets.

REMARKS—Since our last weekly report there has been a decided improvement in all branches of trade. The stock of groceries is large, and meets with ready sale at low prices.

WHEAT—The price for the past week has been low and quiet, and pleasant for the transaction of our trade.

RICE—The price, at the commencement of the week, took a sudden rise, and is yet rising slowly—in all, it has risen about 35 cts.

GRAIN—The general market is 15c to 20c per bushel, according to kind and quality.

COAL—No sales to report. All on hand intended for shipment to the South.

MEAT—Small white would readily command 20 to 25c per hundred.

REMARKS—Receipts very light; we quote at 15 to 16c as the uniform price.

REMARKS—Retail at 20 to 25 cts per bushel for best make.

REMARKS—But roll, in market, 15 to 20c—8 to 10 from Store.

REMARKS—Wool 9 1/2c; Star 22, Spinn 25c, Cattle—Sales at 2 1/2 to 3 1/2.
