Col. CAGHAN'S DEATH.—We neglected to announce, some days ago, that the gallant Col. Crogan, late Inspector General of the U. S. Army, died recently of Cholera, at New Orleans.

On Friday and Saturday last we were on the peaceful, pleasant, and thriving town of Flemingsburg, where we found the citizens as amiable and agreeable as they were when we were "one of them."

On Thursday the Sons of Temperance had a grand celebration here. It was announced that Gen. Carey would act as Orator of the day, but for some reason, unknown to me, he did not appear, and his place was supplied by Mr. Eginton.

Yesterday the House was occupied in discussing Col. Key's Spectacle law, in which Mr. Jefferson participated. He made a very able speech in favor of repealing the law.

During the discussion of the spectacle law—and a beautiful spectacle it presented—the lobby was filled with ladies, which stimulated the speakers to protract the discussion.

Saturday was limited to reports of committees, and call of the counties, being the order of the day.

We are at a loss to know the nature of a convention which the Flag says is to be held here on the 5th of February.

The glare of ice was covered with a complete layer of ice on Saturday morning, and many were the feet that fooled their owners on that day.

STILL BURNING.—The fire is still burning in the ruins of the Flemingsburg Steam Mill, which was destroyed about six weeks ago, notwithstanding the heavy rains which have fallen since that time.

TELEGRAPH OFFICE BURNED.—We learn from the Marlinton (Va.) Gaz., that the house in that place belonging to the heirs of John K. Wilson, and in which was the office of the Western Telegraph company, and the saddle and harness store, was burnt early on Friday morning week, together with the apparatus and fixtures of the company.

We regret to give the following distressing account of the death of one of our subscribers, who we always regarded as a steady, sensible man. He lived in the lower part of this county:

"There has happened in this neighborhood one of the most singular circumstances on record. A Mr. C., that we know of, from Pennsylvania, got up one week, and took all his clothes and laid them on the fire, and then laid down on the fire; and before it was discovered and could be put out, he was burned to death and died in 75 hours. Mr. No very important business or unusual events have transpired since my last, save one bill, which will interest a portion of the readers of the Flag.

In this is involved an issue agitated during the canvass in August last, respecting Temperance authority. The committee on Propositions and Grievances presented a bill, "to restore the right to licensing tobacco, in the town of Danville, to the County Court of Boyle," with the opinion that the same ought not to pass.

Mr. Bickley, of Mason, the proponent of the measure, presented a remonstrance, and a large majority of Mr. Anderson, of Boyle, supported Mr. Bickley, on the grounds of equality and equal rights, delivering the most eloquent and powerful speech that has yet been made before the House.

Resolved, That we are utterly opposed to any agitation of the question of emancipation, being fully satisfied that any attempt to change the existing laws, or to interfere between master and slave in this commonwealth, would be productive of nothing but serious mischief to the true interests of our State.

Resolved, That we will vote for no man as delegate to the Convention who was not in favor of the Constitution of 1847-8.

Resolved, That we are in favor of the system of slavery as now existing. Resolved, That we are therefore opposed to any and all schemes of emancipation, whether contemplating the immediate and absolute liberation of the slaves, or prospective and conditional freedom.

Resolved, That we gave our suffrages for the calling of a Convention, under the belief that the question of emancipation should not be agitated in the Convention when called, and many of us would have opposed the measure, had any other belief prevailed.

Resolved, That the design of agitating the question of emancipation by a portion of the original friends of a Convention, is in bad faith, and if carried out, will be a gross fraud upon all those who voted for a Convention under the pledge given by the friends of reform, that the question should not be brought into the deliberations of the Convention.

Resolved, That by the provisions of the Constitution of the United States, the situation of slavery is recognized and protected, and Congress can pass no law, relieving or interfering the existing rights of the United States, except in the derogation of both the letter and spirit of that sacred instrument.

Resolved, That the territory acquired from Mexico belongs to all the people of this Union, and the enactment of any law by Congress, excluding the people of the South from a participation in the benefits of the territory, is a violation of the principle of removing thither with every species of property recognized as property by the Constitution of our federal Union.
