[From the New Orleans Picayune.
The Two Howitzers.]

The proceedings of the court martial, heretofore, will give the public an extended view of Major General W. W. Wood's conduct in other ways than in composing the epistles of "Leonidas." What a pity it is that the general cannot be brought to invoke inquiry as to the manner in which he conducted his command. He has been charged with having written it, by older and letter soldiers than himself. But we suppose he has learned that Gen. Scott has the original manuscript in his private possession. Those documents are troublesome things to mean of convenient memories. We copy from the American Star:

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 329.
HEAD-QUARTERS OF THE ARMY,
Mexico, Oct. 30, 1847.

Proceedings of a Court of Inquiry, of which Brevel Major General W. W. Wood is President, convened at this place by the following orders, viz.:

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 310.
HEAD-QUARTERS OF THE ARMY,
Mexico, Oct. 22, 1847.

At the instance of Major General W. W. Wood a Court of Inquiry will assemble at the Palace, or such other place in this city as may be designated by the president of the court, to-morrow morning, at 9 o'clock.

The court will inquire into the facts and circumstances connected with the removal of two small howitzers on the 14th of September, from Chapultepec—stating by whom removed, and whether with the knowledge of Major General W. W. Wood; and give their opinion of the facts which may be developed.

Members.—Brevel Major General W. W. Wood, Major General J. A. Quitman, Brig. Gen. D. E. Twiggs, Major Gen. J. W. Worth, Major Gen. P. H. Rensselaer, Lt. Col. R. P. Hammond, 3d Artillery, is appointed Judge Advocate of the court.

By command of Major General Scott: H. L. SCOTT, A. A. G.

The said order being founded on the following communications from Major Gen'l Pillow, viz.:

1. Major General Pillow to Capt. H. L. Scott, acting assistant adjutant general, as follows:

MEXICO, Oct. 9, 1847.

Captain—On the night of the 11th I was informed at Chapultepec that two small howitzers, which were mounted and captured in storming that place, had been taken from the carriages and were not to be found. Being myself unable from my wound to get out of bed, I caused a strict inquiry to be instituted for them, and was informed late at night that they were found in my own baggage wagon, and found further that they had been placed there by Mr. Welch. This was done without my order or protection. I immediately sent for Col. Howard and directed him to have them taken out, and directed my aide-de-camp, Lieutenants Rains and Ripley, to have them mounted and placed in battery for the defence of the place.

I never knew, until last night at 9 o'clock, that my order to take the pieces out of my wagon had not been obeyed, and that the howitzers were in my baggage wagon, and therefore they could not place them in battery.

I now learn, from inquiry, that they were brought to the city in my wagon, and were taken from the wagon by Lieut. Rogers and Mr. Welch, and that they probably have one each.

Mr. Rogers has retired from my staff, and he is now at the "Socialist." Mr. Welch is in the city, but I do not know where he resides.

Regarding the conduct of those gentlemen as improper, I, feeling it my duty not to suffer any persons to shelter themselves from responsibility under my protection, I feel it to be my duty, at the earliest moment, to give this information to the general-in-chief, for such action as he may think proper to take in respect to my having been so much misled by my staff. I would have personally to the execution of my orders, and would never have suffered the general to be troubled about such matters.

P.S.—I had written this note and ordered it recorded when I received the note of this city, Mr. Williams, A. D. C. to Captain Hugler.

Lieut. Rogers is not subject to my orders, as he has retired since from my staff. Mr. Welch is a citizen of the United States, and I will send him to those gentlemen and communicate the orders of the general-in-chief.

2. Major General Pillow to Capt. H. L. Scott, acting assistant adjutant general, as follows:

Copy of the note above referred to.
CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 9, 1847.

General—Being informed that you entertain the opinion that the two small howitzers captured at Chapultepec, were removed from that place with your knowledge or acquiescence, I deem it my duty to write you, in my honor, to lay before you the accompanying statements, and to ask you to favor me with such reply as justice to my-

self and the facts of the case render proper. I had hoped that my official report of the 9th inst., addressed to your adjutant general, would have been taken into consideration, but your opinion of any participation in the transaction. Whatever doubt, however, may have heretofore existed, I judge the hope that these proofs would have been taken into consideration, and that the proper persons, and will relieve me from impressions of my conduct, no less at war with my duty as an officer, than unjust to my reputation as a citizen.

3. Major General Pillow to Capt. H. L. Scott, acting assistant adjutant general, as follows:

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 22, 1847.

Captain—Inasmuch as that representations have been made to the general-in-chief, and to others, in regard to the removal of the two howitzers at Chapultepec, on the 13th of September, imputing to me a knowledge of their removal, and that such representations are erroneous, and are calculated to prejudice my character and conduct as an officer, I deem it my duty to demand an inquiry as to the responsibility of the proper persons, and to investigate the facts and circumstances connected with the removal of those guns, from their carriages and from Chapultepec, by whom removed, and whether with my knowledge, and that said knowledge of Major General W. W. Wood, to any degree censurable in the present case.

As some of the witnesses intend leaving for the United States by the first opportunity, I desire that the court may be ordered to convene as early as practicable, and that I have the honor to be, very respectfully, your obedient servant,

REPORT.

The court find and report the following facts and circumstances:

That two small howitzers, captured at Chapultepec, were removed from their carriages during the morning of September 13th; one was removed by and under the orders of Major General W. W. Wood, and the other, especially of the 3d Division, and the other, by and under the direction of Lieut. Hodge, 9th infantry; and, so far as the testimony shows, this removal from their carriages was done as early as practicable, with the knowledge, authority or consent of Major General Pillow. When the guns were taken from their carriages, they were placed, at separate times, by the two individuals who had removed them, and were placed in the baggage wagon of Major General W. W. Wood, and this, so far as the testimony shows, without the previous knowledge, authority or consent of Major General Pillow.

2. It appears from the evidence that Major General Pillow was informed by an officer acting on his staff, Passed Midshipman Rogers of the Navy, on the evening of September 13th, that two small howitzers were then in his baggage wagon, and that he had been ordered by Major General W. W. Wood, to place them in battery. The general expressed any surprise when this information was communicated to him; nor is it shown that he erred in his opinion as to the propriety of the howitzers returned to their proper place, but, on the contrary, by his language to Mr. Rogers, at the time, viz. "Very well, I think I will enclose them in my baggage wagon," there is conveyed an evident approval of Major General Pillow directed to that the moment, to retain the howitzers for himself.

3. That Lieut. Col. Howard, 15th Inf., the commanding officer of Chapultepec, did report to Major General Pillow, in conformity with the order of Sept. 13, that two small howitzers had disappeared from their carriages, and that, about the middle of the afternoon of that day, he received the report of Major General Pillow that the two howitzers had been found in his wagon. It does not appear from the evidence that Gen. Pillow directed or desired the restoration of these guns at that time, but that he directed Gen. G. D. J. Pillow, viz. "That Mr. Welch and Mr. Rogers, had interested themselves in getting those guns, to be taken away at no time, and that the [Col. H.] better not interfere with the removal of the guns, but the evident conclusion that Major General Pillow was aware of an intention on the part of Messrs. Welch and Rogers to remove the guns, and that he acquiesced in such removal and did authorize the removal in his own wagon.

4. It appears, from the evidence, that on the night of the 14th, when thearrison of Chapultepec was being reduced in numbers, and whilst conversing with the staff about the defence of the place, Gen. Pillow ordered two officers of his staff, to have these howitzers taken out of the wagon and placed in battery for the defence of the place to the general dispositions for the defence of the works.

It was ascertained by his staff officers, that a considerable ammunition could be found in the baggage wagon, and that it was not used, not mounted, not removed from the wagon, and other arrangements for defence were made without them, and reported to Major General Scott.

The impression is strong and almost conclusive, that this order of Major Gen. Pillow, to his staff officers, could not have indicated a desire on his part for a full and free removal of the guns, and that, in his proper places, as public property—of which he was far more fact of failure to fulfil suitable ammunition for their immediate use could not justify the staff officers in failing to obey the order to remove the guns from the wagon, and that the staff officers were censured for the omission.

5. That the two howitzers were brought to town on the 16th of September, in Gen. "Hodge's" baggage wagon, one was claimed by Mr. Rogers, and carried to the city, under his direction, whilst the other was carried to the residence of Mr. Welch, and for his use.

It does not appear that Major Gen. Pillow had any information of the removal of the howitzers in the city of Mexico, until the evening of October 7, subsequent

to the order of the general-in-chief, in relation to trophies, etc., when, and subsequently, he seems to have used all proper means to have them restored.

And the court is of opinion, that further military proceedings may be dispensed with.
