**Louisville, Ky., Oct. 12**—Temporary organization was effected here by the members of the Union Tobacco Growers' Association of the tobacco growers of Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, Tennessee, West Virginia and Missouri. The officers elected will serve until Nov. 12, when one of the greatest tobacco conventions ever held will meet in Louisville and name their successors for a term. The sentiment of the members was that they had the tobacco trust capitulating, and that their organization would soon dictate prices and terms all over the United States.

**Four Charged With the Assassination of James Cockrell.**

**Lexington, Ky., Oct. 13**—In the circuit court here the cases against Robert Hargis, Ed Callahan, Alex Hargis and Jesse Spicer, all charged with the assassination of James Cockrell in Breathitt county, were dismissed on motion of the commonwealth. State Attorney Allen announced that the cases had all been tried before and no conviction obtained, and that he did not think they could be convicted. The order of dismissal was accordingly entered. A similar charge against Bill Britton for the same murder was continued until the next court term.

**Soldiers Take Part in Day's Events at Douglas Park.**

**Louisville, Ky., Oct. 13**—A large crowd attended the races at Douglas park Thursday. It was soldiers' day, 100 enlisted men and officers who are here on an army tournament, being present. Enlisted men took part in two events, both of which were spectacular.

In the cavalry cup handicap Grimes ran away and ran through a fence. Mr. Matthews, his rider, was not seriously injured. In the Roman race four soldiers raced, each on two horses. The men stood as they rode and a pretty contest resulted. Mr. Haught was the winner by two lengths.

Infant driver Mr. Douglas was run through a fence and it looked like a serious accident, but neither horse nor rider was seriously injured.

**CALLS IT "POLITICS"**

**Governor Wilson Dislikes Being Called Before Grand Jury.**

**Hopkinsville, Ky., Oct. 13**—Governor Wilson, who made a political speech here and discussed the night rider situation, was summoned before the grand jury. He informed the jury he did not have personal knowledge of the membership of the night rider bands, but had sworn testimony at the capital laying bare the secrets of the organization, and at the proper time would submit the same to all grand juries in the terrorized districts. Governor Wilson said petty politics was the cause of his being summoned before the jury, but would prove a boomerang to the politicians who had done it.

**Called for Aid**

**Frankfort, Ky., Oct. 13**—Reaching an attack from night riders on the town officials of Hickman appealed to Governor Wilson to send a squad of state troops at once. The governor, upon receiving the appeal, immediately ordered Major Bassett, at Hopkinsville, to dispatch the Columbus company to the scene of the trouble.

Since the assassination of several members of the Walker (colored) family on Oct. 3, the situation in Hickman county has been very tense and other outbreaks are feared.

**L. & N. Annual Report.**

**Louisville, Ky., Oct. 13**—The fifty-seventh annual meeting of the stockholders of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad company was held here. Beyond the submission of the annual report of President Smith there was little of interest. The present directors were re-elected. The annual report of President Smith included the results of operations during the year, showing gross earnings of \$44,639,281, a decrease of \$2,600,000 compared with last year.

**Whole Village Threatened.**

**Lexington, Ky., Oct. 13**—Fire of unknown origin broke out in Turner's store at Ruddle's Mills, a village in Bourbon county, eight miles from Paris. The store and three adjacent residences were burned, and for a time the whole village was threatened.

So far as published, the principal matter to come before the court martial was to have been the question of Colonel Daniel Corman's responsibility for alleged illegal maintenance of horses in the government stables here.

**Peter Wants Recognition.**

**Belgrade, Servia, Sept. 29**—The Stamen says that the question of the visit of King Peter to the foreign courts will shortly be settled by the joint action of the powers. The expressed desire of the powers that the officers who were instrumental in the death of King Alexander and Queen Draga be removed from the active list will be complied with, says the Stamp, after which King Peter will be received with full honors at the courts.

**Night Riders After Gliners.**

**Mt. Pleasant, Tex., Sept. 29**—Unknown parties supposed to be night riders, posted notices on several signs in this county, instructing owners not to gin any more cotton until further notice. The notices were written in a scrawling hand with lead pencil and informed the giners that if they operated their plants, they would have to suffer the consequences. Five gins were heard from that got these notices.

**San Francisco, Oct. 13**—A new record in wireless telegraphy is claimed by the United Wireless Telegraph company, which from its station on Russian Hill in this city established communication with the Kahuiku station, on the island of Oahu, one of the Hawaiian group. The station at Kahuiku was caught at 1:30 o'clock this morning and messages were exchanged until 4 a. m. It is claimed that communication between those hours was uninterrupted. The distance to Honolulu is 2,200 miles.

**Chicago, Oct. 13**—The health department is a formal report issued states that the dust and soot in the atmosphere of Chicago, as shown by tests just taken is three times as great as that in the atmosphere of London. Samples of the air taken at a height of forty feet above the street level at four points of the city, were subjected to analysis. The report says this excess may be partly attributed to the loss continued drought.

**Two Negroes Lynched.**

**Louis, Miss., Oct. 13**—Jim and Frank Davis, negroes, charged with having shot and probably fatally wounded John O. Kendall, a cooperator of the Illinois Central railroad, were taken from the jail here by a mob and hanged. The shooting of Kendall occurred aboard a passenger train near here when he attempted to quiet the uproar, who had been disturbing.

PROMISE OF CAUSES FLURRY

Stock Market Subject to Wild Fluctuation.

THE NEAR EASTERN QUESTION

War in the Balkans as an Influence in American Securities Was Demonstrated in No Uncertain Fashion in the Trend of the Market on the New York Stock Exchange Monday—Another Tonic Effect Was the Upward Movement of the Hill Stocks.

New York, Oct. 6.—Prices of stocks fluctuated wildly Monday and showed an unsettling of strong conflicting forces. On the one hand was the acute crisis developed in the near Eastern question, and on the other the tonic effect of the striking upward movement in the Hill railroad stocks. It was noticeable that while prices recovered readily from the opening break caused by the Bulgarian war prospect, there was much more hesitation in following the further recovery over the Saturday level in sympathy with the strength in the Hills and weakness was renewed at the last. This was partly ascribed to the individual causes supposed to be back of the Hill movement, which it was feared, might leave the general list unresponsive.

The Northern Pacific "melon-cutting" rumors were revived in Hill circles and were responsible for the buoyant rise in that stock and in Great Northern preferred. These rumors have been so often heard before in the stock market and so often failed of confirmation that they are accepted with reserve, although assertions of the impending disbursement of reports that a dividend on Northern Pacific assets was in prospect, with distribution to stockholders of shares in a holding company. This combination was an exact reproduction of rumors heard through the summer in connection with the rise in stocks, but which was dropped suddenly out of consideration when E. H. Harriman returned from the West and prices slumped in the stock market. The flavor of renunciation about them depriving them of some of their force. The analogy was carried further by tacking on the rumors of important Harriman plans concerning the Erie. The general list was generally unresponsive to this stimulant and finally broke badly again. The late reaction owed something also to the fear of further effects from the Balkan outbreak. The small effect of the European news on the local markets was partly due to a belief that a way would be found through diplomatic cy for an adjustment of the questions at issue between the powers, leaving the immediate armed conflict restricted to Bulgaria and Turkey. In addition to this opinion there was a feeling that the harm to come to American securities even in the event of a European war might be small. A cut in the market for cotton might be supposed and the weakness in the cotton price was a reflection of this. On the other hand, a quickened demand for our breakfasts could be assumed. The effect of this assumption on the price of wheat was offset by the news of the heavy movement of grain to markets and favorable crop news. While a demand for gold might be expected to arise in the event of a foreign war, it is believed by bankers that much of the persistent foreign demand for gold throughout recent months is due to the preparations that have been going forward to meet the very contingency that has now arisen. War would undoubtedly send home to market some American securities held by foreigners, and there was, in fact, selling for foreign currencies today. There would be, however, some flow of capital into American securities, as representative values most remote from the threatened danger.
