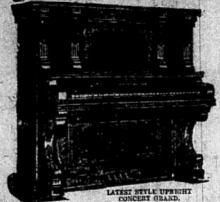

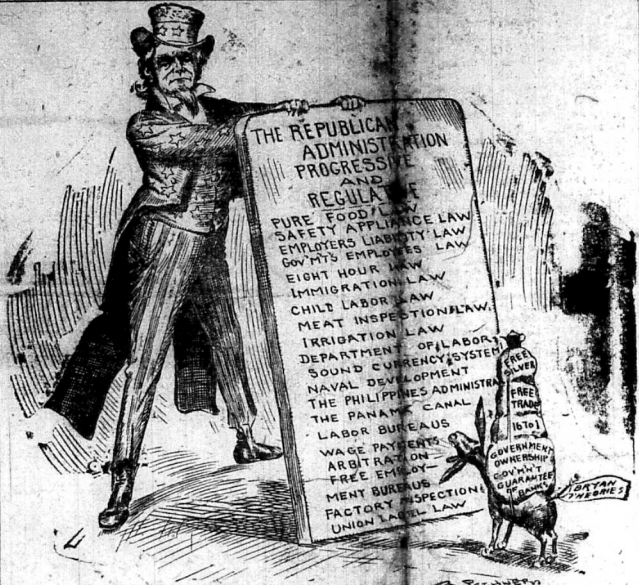

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MADE LARGE LOANS

Woman Tells of Her Connection With Brown & Co.

New York, Oct. 20.—Mrs. Minnie E. Young, mother of Lewis Gilbert Young, a member of the failed brokerage firm of A. O. Brown & Co., told at the investigation into the affairs of the firm of having made large loans to that firm.

his mother \$1,100,000 a large part of which was lost in the collapse of the San Domingo Gold and Copper company.

Mrs. Young testified that she loaned 2,000 shares of preferred stock of the American Tobacco company and \$50,000 worth of that company's bonds to A. O. Brown & Co. in 1906, and thereafter was paid \$1,000 a month for the loan.

Shortly before the failure Mrs. Young said she loaned the firm \$100,000 worth of securities to enable them to get their checks certified. This was returned to her on the day on which she loaned it.

DESPERATE NEGRO ESCAPES

After Killing Two and Wounding Another, Murderer Flees.

Lithonia, Ga., Oct. 20.—Charlie Mitchell a negro shot and killed T. L. Peek, a bailiff, and C. F. Figo, a young S. Elliott, deputy sheriff, over the head with his pistol, escaped. Peek, Figo and Elliott, it was said, had a warrant on Saturday, and went to his home near there to arrest him.

Shortly after the negro's escape he was seen by the officers approaching it. He said he opened fire on them. The officers returned the fire and attempted to rush on the negro. Peek and Figo were killed almost at the door of the house. The negro then attacked Elliott and dealt him several hard blows.

SENSATIONAL SHOOTING AFFRAY

Meridian, Miss., Oct. 20.—Eugene Chestnut, of Birmingham, was shot and killed, and L. O. Henderson, a local contractor, dangerously wounded in a sensational shooting affray on one of the principal business thoroughfares of Meridian, A. L. Clay, a sad-fare of Memphis, has been arrested charged with the shooting. The affair is said to have been caused by domestic troubles.

# THE PARTY OF YOUTH

Why Young Men Vote the Republican Ticket.

IT STANDS FOR PROGRESS.

New Voters Proud to Ally Themselves With the Party of Lincoln—Its Past Performances Presege a Still More Glorious Future.

It is not without significance that young men who have just attained their majority are found voting the Republican ticket. The reason is plain. Those young men look on the Republican party as the party of hope, the party of promise and of performance, the party for whose candidates they will be glad to say in later years that they cast their first ballot, the party whose past needs no apology, no blame of oblivion for blunders and for crimes, no record of slavery, rebellion and attempted repudiation, each stamped out in its turn by American freemen under Republican leadership.

The Republican party is eminently the party of youth. With Republicans the memory of the glorious past is but an inducement to make the future still more glorious. To the Democracy is left the congenial occupation of foun-dering in the marsh of bygone Democratic vagaries, lured on by some new and delusive will-o-the-wisp to the quagmire of quadrennial failure.

The youthful vote finds no attraction in such company. He prefers to march forward on firm ground, with the party of Lincoln, of Grant, McKinley and Roosevelt, of Taft and Sherman and Hughes—of nearly every great American, living and dead, whose career has added lustre to the closing half of the old century and the beginning of the new. The young man prefers the Republican party because it holds out a prospect for his own advancement, because in building up the nation as a whole it offers fresh opportunities to the individual, because under Republican administration there is a fair field for every man and every citizen is protected in the enjoyment of that which he has rightfully acquired.

The new voter who takes his place in the Republican ranks and casts his ballot for Taft and Sherman will have the satisfaction not only of sharing in the Republican victory, but also of knowing that he has helped to assure prosperity for the country at large and an immeasurably better chance in life for himself and those in whom he is interested than if the harpies of Bryanism had been permitted to befool the feast.

## LABOR TURNS TO TAFT.

Tellers Scant Dancer in the Fallacies of Mr. Bryan.

Convincing evidence was furnished by the conference at Cincinnati last week by Judge Taft with Oscar Straus, secretary of commerce and labor, and E. V. Powelley, former general master workman of the Knights of Labor, that the attitude of labor is growing each day more friendly to Taft. The campaign of education which the Republicans have been carrying on has been effective, and the laboring man, as Mr. Powelley told the candidate, is beginning to appreciate the fact that a restoration of business confidence through the election of Mr. Taft means more work and prosperous times for him.

Secretary Straus announces his intention to go out on the stump for the specific purpose of exposing some of the Bryan fallacies in regard to labor. Said Mr. Straus: "The most dangerous of these fallacies is presented in Bryan's slogan, 'Shut the people out.' And well may he ask it, for every one of his leading doctrines is a denial of that rule."

Mr. Straus classes Mr. Bryan's present guarantee of bank deposits as next in point of danger to his plan for the government ownership of railroads. Mr. Straus believes this guarantee proposition is as great menace as the old 10 to 1 lobby. "To guarantee deposits," said Secretary Straus, "is to guarantee the loans of the banks, for, as a matter of fact, a large part of the bank's deposits is made up of credits extended by the bank to borrowers and by them deposited or placed on the books of the banks as deposits."

Mr. Powelley said among other things after his talk with Taft: "I have never been better organized, better paid, more independent or more respected than it is today. Never was it more secure in its tenure of the outcome of the commodity or the good will and confidence of employers. All this is due to the effort of nonpartisan, well organized unions. What labor organizations now enjoy—and they enjoy more than they ever enjoyed in the civilized world before, came as the result of intelligent, ceaseless effort on the part of a nonpartisan way through their unions."

"Of course there are many men out of employment as the result of the recent depression, but to my knowledge men are returning to their old occupations all over the country and at their old rates of pay. I recall the awful panic of 1873 and that of 1893, and in neither case did men go back to work at their old wages. The case is different now, and to my mind it would be suicidal for labor to vote in such a way as to imperil the return of full prosperity, so rapidly manifesting itself."

The issue is just this: Taft and prosperity or Bryan and paralysis.

# NEWS OF KENTUCKY

Tarsley Told Information Concerning Matters of Current Interest to Kentuckians.

THE STATE NEWS IN A NUTSHELL

Here Are Found Accurately Detailed the Happenings of the Largest Import Which Are Attracting Attention Throughout Kentucky.

Frankfort, Ky., Oct. 20.—In offering \$500 reward for the apprehension and conviction of the gang of night riders who attacked a negro named Walker in his home in Hickman county, and slew him, his wife and two children, Governor Willson has made an appeal to the people of the state to "rise in their might" and put down such lawlessness. The governor says: "If two or three men had gone to this poor cabin and murdered the family, the crime would have been shocked at with its revelation of incredible wickedness, brutality and cowardice. That a large number, some fifty men, joined such a crime, multiplies the cowardliness and wickedness fifty-fold and makes every member of the band guilty of murder in the first degree, the most wicked and most covardly and inhuman murder conceivable in mortal mind."

The governor calls on the people to assemble in the respective neighborhoods in the counties, to organize and take stern, prompt and effective measures, punish every "cowardly rascal" who rides the roads to threaten his neighbors, to put an immediate end to lynching, murder and arson, and calls on the local authorities in each county to be earnest and vigilant and offers them the power of the state for the instant arrest and punishment of all guilty of these crimes.

## MORE HORSES FOR AUSTRIA

Reputed Buyer of Allen Winter Makes Purchase.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 20.—I. Schlessinger of Vienna, Austria, the reputed buyer of Allen Winter for \$50,000, has arrived in Lexington to attend the trials. He purchased two stallions and one mare to send to his breeding farm near Vienna. He purchased of W. G. ## LOUISVILLE IS CUT OFF

First Time in Twenty Years, No Cincinnati Packet Service.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 20.—For the first time in twenty years Louisville is entirely cut off from packet service with Cincinnati on account of low water. When the Louisville and Cincinnati Packet company took the Kentucky route out of the running it brought about this almost unprecedented condition in the history of navigation on the Ohio river. Louisville has been without service with lower river points for several weeks.

## Medical Men at Louisville.

Louisville, Oct. 20.—For the fourth time since its organization, the Mississippi Valley Medical association met its annual session in Louisville. Governor Willson welcomed the delegates to the state, the response being made by Dr. L. S. McMurry, of Louisville. The greater part of the first session was devoted to the general business of the association. The president of the association is Dr. Arthur R. Elliott, of Chicago.

## These Quail Come High.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 20.—Probably the largest fine ever assessed in a magistrate's court in this state was imposed on R. F. McMurry, of Sumner county. McMurry was arrested by a deputy game warden while attempting to dispose of fifty quail before the opening of the season in Tennessee. He was fined \$50 for each bird, making a total fine of \$2,500.

## Allen Winter Sold to Austrian.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 20.—Just after making a show of his field in the three heats of the West stakes, Allen Winter, winner of the Readville handicap and other good races in the grand circuit, was purchased by I. Schlessinger of Vienna, Austria, for \$50,000. Allen Winter will be raced in Austria next season.

## Chicago's Bad Air.

Chicago, Oct. 20.—The health department in a formal report issued states that the dust and soot in the atmosphere of Chicago, as shown by tests just taken in three times as great as that in the atmosphere of London. Samples of the air taken at a height of forty feet above the street level at four points of the city were analyzed. The report says this excess may be partly attributed to the long continued drought.

## Thaw May Go to Pittsburgh.

New York, Oct. 20.—It is announced here that Harry Thaw might go to Pittsburgh tomorrow or shortly thereafter, to testify in connection with the bankruptcy proceedings now pending against him in that city.
