

Instructors for the workshop will be Betty Bowling Spohn and William Pfeifle, who are involved with the Teacher Improvement Project System at the University of Kentucky.



MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University's speech team placed ninth in the nation and first among schools of comparable size in the 15th annual National Forensics Tournament, according to Forensics Director Phil Martin.

The competition, held at Marshall University in Huntington, W.Va., April 24-30, drew teams from 120 colleges and universities from all over the United States.

"While it took the efforts of all nine members to achieve our high ranking, four students made outstanding contributions," Martin said.

Vonda Ramey, a sophomore from Morehead majoring in business, was fifth out of more than 200 entrants in the informative speaking event with a speech on gossip.

Winning fifth place in prose interpretation was Kevin Cockrell, Jeffersonville freshman, who presented a selection from the short story "Shooting the Chicken Out Narrows." A history major, Cockrell was among more than 300 speakers in the event.

Another freshman, Tara Lail of Cynthiana, was ranked among the top 12 national competitors in the poetry interpretation semi-finals with the selection "The Common Woman." The speech/theatre major competed against more than 250 speakers in the event.

A speech on the dangers of diplomatic immunity won Lisa Shemwell, a sophomore journalism major from Winchester, a quarter-finalist ranking in persuasive speaking, placing her among the top 24 of the more than 200 entrants in the event.

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

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Thirteen Morehead State University mining technology students will be the first students in the nation to take part in a two-week spring training program at the Federal Mine Safety Academy, Beckley, W.Va., according to J. Wes Blakely, MSU chairholder in mining, energy studies and reclamation.

Ordinarily the training site for mine inspectors, mining company officials, and other professionals, the Federal Mine Safety Academy is for the first time in its history involving students in its specialized training, Blakely said.

"Morehead State University is fortunate to have been chosen as the first school to send students to the Academy for this special training," Blakely said, "and the instruction they will receive there is unparalleled anywhere in the industry or in the academic world."

Blakely, who arranged the program in cooperation with federal mine safety and health administrative officials, will visit the trainees at the Academy and participate in their evaluation. He holds MSU's MAPCO Chair in Mining Research and Technology, an endowed chair established in 1983 through a grant from MAPCO, Inc., a Tulsa-based energy corporation.


He said the MSU students were carefully selected for this project, and that those who are juniors will have an opportunity next year for a second training session at the Academy.

Topics for training in the spring of 1986 will be motive power and electricity, two other significant areas of underground mining accident generation, Blakely said.

"We hope that programs such as this one will get the concepts of safety firmly planted in the heads of our students even before they graduate from the University," Blakely said, "and certainly before they actually enter the mining industry to further their careers."





MOREHEAD, Ky. --- A three-day workshop on "Artificial Insemination and AI Management Training" will be offered at Morehead State University May 14-16.

The classes will be held in Derrickson Agricultural Complex and taught by Fischer Harned, a Kentucky Artificial Breeding Association (KABA) field supervisor since 1969.

MSU's Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources and KABA will co-sponsor the workshop, which may be taken for college credit. Graduates also will be certified as KABA technicians.

According to Phil Kenkel, agribusiness specialist in MSU's Appalachian Development Center, only three to five percent of beef cattle in Eastern Kentucky are artificially inseminated. "The old assumption that AI is too expensive and time consuming is wrong," says Kenkel. "It is now feasible to own AI equipment for herds as small as 20 cattle."

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- When Congressman Hal Rogers turned the first ground for a new vegetable processing facility near Beattyville, a year of work by a Morehead State University staff member moved a major step closer to visible service to seven counties.

Phil Kenkel, agribusiness specialist in MSU's Appalachian Development Center, has been involved from the beginning in the formation of Kentucky Mountain Farms Cooperative, a vegetable growing cooperative which expects to process 400 acres of bell peppers and cucumbers during 1985.

The April 27 groundbreaking in Lee County marked the beginning of construction of the cooperative's processing plant which will sort, clean, and pack locally-grown produce for shipment to Georgia Vegetable, whose markets cover 40 states.

According to Kenkel, the vegetable producers themselves contributed more than \$40,000 of the initial funding, and a \$66,000 community block grant provided the balance. Kenkel, who has an M.B.A. degree and an undergraduate degree in agriculture, coordinated the financial analysis and projections which are part of the Kentucky Mountain Farms business plan.

"Farm operations are not being forced to function as businesses," said Kenkel. "The financial analysis programs we now have at the Appalachian Development Center set up on personal computers will help any business--including agriculture--better plan costs and potential income. The service is available to anyone or any business. We have, over the past year, helped many potential or existing business operators better plan their financial operations," he said.

According to Jerry Gouge, manager of the Kentucky Mountain Farms Cooperative, Kenkel and others at MSU also helped with member surveys, grant applications, and organizational efforts.

"Tobacco is on the decline in Kentucky," said Gouge. "Eastern Kentucky farmland and farm methods are ideally suited to vegetable production. No one producer can afford a processing facility, so a cooperative was the only solution," Gouge added.

"There is a statewide program--the Kentucky Agricultural Marketing Cooperative--with a processing plant in Lexington and we may deliver some of our produce to it. The Appalachian Development Center at Morehead State has been an active participant in all aspects of this new development," the cooperative manager said.

Kenkel also has been active in creating another agricultural cooperative, the Northeast Kentucky Beef Improvement Federation, which is now in its second on-farm performance test. "Agriculture is one of Eastern Kentucky's major industries," said ADC Assistant Director for Business Development Wilson C. Grier. "The role we can best play is financial analysis and help with planning. Our services are offered to the region at no cost, part of the University's commitment to regional service," Grier said.

MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Morehead State University has moved to further reduce administrative costs by abolishing its Office of Community Services and transferring the functions to other campus agencies.

As a result, Keith Kappes has been assigned the additional duties of director of conferences while retaining his responsibilities as assistant to the president for university relations. Supervision of the MSU Speakers Bureau has been shifted to the Division of Academic Affairs and management of Button Auditorium has changed to the Department of Communications.

MSU President Herb. F. Reinhard said the action would save at least \$30,000 yearly by eliminating two full-time staff positions, both of which were vacant at the time, but will not affect the "essential" functions of the former Office of Community Services.

"In addition to reducing our costs, this new arrangement will be more efficient and will allow us to give conferences a higher priority by making a cabinet officer directly responsible for the use of our facilities by external groups," Dr. Reinhard said.







Another workshop highlight will be instruction in word processing with hands-on experience on Apple computers.



MOREHEAD, Ky. --- Alabama, the popular music group, has an album and a single currently on country music's "Top 20" charts and a Morehead State University alumna can claim a share of the credit.

MSU graduate Lisa Palas collaborated with songwriters John Garrard and Will Robinson to create Alabama's latest hit single, "There's No Way," released from the group's "40 Hour Week" album.

A former Miss Morehead State University, she is a Richmond native. The daughter of Ernest Palas and Nancye Thornberry, she earned a bachelor's degree in music composition and a master's degree in music with emphasis in higher education at MSU.

After working for two years in the MSU Admissions Office, she moved to Louisville, joining the Louisville Children's Theatre: Stage One as a writer and arranger. Three years ago she decided to move to Nashville to advance her songwriting career. She began working in the copyright office at the Nashville Songwriters Association and continued to pursue her dreams.

"I didn't really take my writing seriously until four years ago," said Palas. "But, I began working at it when I was a freshman in high school."

Her aunt, Dr. Louise Hickman, MSU coordinator of informational sciences and professor of business education, remembers music has always been a part of Palas' life.

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"Even as a child, she would compose music for plays that she and her brother, sisters and cousins would put on during family gatherings." "It seems like there was never a family get together that Lisa didn't have something planned," said Hickman.

Palas says her education at MSU really made it all possible. "President and Mrs. Adron Doran were big influences on my life - even when I was a child - and they made it possible for me to attend MSU," she said. "So much of what I'm able to do today is from what I learned there."

Dr. Frederic Mueller, professor of music, was her private teacher and helped her in writing and composition. "When she came, she had marvelous ideas, but didn't know how to put them down. She soon learned and there wasn't anything she couldn't do," said Mueller. "Lisa had a tremendous 'imagery' of music and could recall it very well. She would write a composition in her mind at night and put the notes down on paper the next day," he said.

At MSU Palas performed with the Stage Band and wrote many of the compositions it played. She wrote her own song for the 1971 Miss Kentucky pageant. "Without so much support from the Music Department, expecially Dr. Mueller, I wouldn't be where I am today," said Palas.

Since in Nashville, she has had several songs recorded. Country music artists like Tammy Wynette and Charlie McClain have recorded songs written by Pallas, but the first big break really came last spring when Billy "Crash" Craddock recorded and released one of her songs "Tell Me When I'm Hot." Palas 3-3-3-3-3

In June 1984, Palas signed an exclusive contract with Alabama Band Music and the Maypop Publishing Company. "I had to shake myself and I still sometimes forget it's not a dream," she said. "Working with veteran songwriters John Garrard and Will Robinson has helped me to learn a lot," she added.


Palas still writes for the Louisville Children's Theatre and one day a week she does volunteer work for a Methodist church prayer line in Nashville.

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


