Proceedings in Council. Thursday Evening, Feb. 2, 1849. Present, all the members, the President in the chair. The proceedings of the two previous meetings were read by the Clerk, and signed.

Repairs of committees, being first in order, the Chairman of Finance reported that a loan had been effected to pay the interest upon the debt due the Bank; and on motion of Mr. Stanton, all orders entered concerning the same.

George Graham's accutans amounting to \$82.75, for work done on the streets, were allowed; and city Collector ordered to collect and pay it over forthwith. On motion of Mr. Stanton, it was Resolved, That the funds collected for road tax shall be appropriated to cleaning the streets.

The Wharf Master's Report, for the month ending Feb. 1st, was laid before the Council, showing the net amount collected to be \$223, in that time, and the same was accepted.

The petition of John Armstrong, Esq., praying for privilege to run water across his own property, was rejected. Mr. Stanton read the report of G. W. Orr, under previous resolution; showing that the net cost of erecting a new Almshouse would be \$2,100. Dr. Dales then moved that the committee be instructed to solicit proposals for building said Almshouse, which motion was withdrawn.

Mr. Allen moved that persons who have previously purchased city lots, and failed to comply with the terms of sale, be allowed ten days time to comply with said terms. - Lost.

Mr. Ryan moved to abolish the Night Watch. - Lost. Dr. Duke offered, as a substitute, "that the Mayor and Marshall enquire into and report, as to the expediency, &c., &c." - Carried.

Mr. Jenkins moved that the committee advertise forthwith, for contracts for building the Almshouse, and that the contractors take in payment certain city lots, or the notes for which the same may be sold. - Carried.
