Mr. T. Kohlman was then elected Clerk of the House, and Messrs. John D. McClellan, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Ben. Selby, Door-keeper, all unanimously.

The House met at 11 o'clock, and after various deliberations, withdrew of candidates, and renominations, Mr. Jas. F. Buckner was, on Saturday, elected Speaker; Mr. H. C. Wainwright, on motion of Gen. Jos. Gray, was unanimously elected Clerk; Mr. Jos. Gray was, by a similar motion, declared Sergeant-at-Arms.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. HUNT of New York gave notice of introduction of a bill relating to Gen. Scott, and the officers under his command.

MR SA WYDER, of Ohio, offered a resolution, stating the necessity of the enactment of certain laws in relation to the trade of the citizens of the United States with the Indians, and providing therefor, which resolution was disposed of according to rule.

MR CALB B. SMITH, of Indiana, presented a petition from the citizens of that State, praying for the abolition of slavery in the District of Columbia, and moved its reference to the Committee for the District of Columbia.

MR CABELL, of Florida, moved that the petition be laid on the table. A call was made upon this motion, and tellers appointed, when upon counting the votes it was decided in the affirmative, by 70 to 70.

A message was then received from the Senate, announcing its resolutions upon the subject of Mr. FAIRFIELD'S funeral, which were concurred in.

On motion of Mr. WILLIAMS, of Maine the House then adjourned.

FAILURE OF CUNARD, THE CELEBRATED ROYAL MAIL CONTRACTOR.—Hon. Joseph C. Cabell, of Michigan, has been compelled to yield to the pressure of time by having stopped payment. The Halifax Sun publishes the following extract of a letter dated:

CHATEAU, Nov. 30, 1847. "Mr Joseph Cunard stopped yesterday on Saturday last, and assigned all his effects to trustees for the benefit of his creditors, and his establishment is closed."

On the 15th of January 1848, the Whigs of the Washington district, in pursuance of call previously made, assembled at the Court House for the purpose of selecting delegates to attend the Whig National Convention.

The meeting was organized by calling Colonel Marshall to the Chair, and appointing W. H. Beatty Secretary.

On motion of John A. McClung, it was resolved, that the Chair shall appoint a committee of nine to nominate delegates and report resolutions for the consideration of the meeting.

The committee, consisting of John A. McClung, John Chambers, Henry Waller, Alexander Hunter, Lucien B. Goggin, Michael D. Lamb, John W. Henry, Benedict Kirk, and Charles A. Marshall, having been appointed and retired to consider of the duties assigned them, returned and reported three resolutions.

The resolutions thus reported being under consideration, John Chambers moved to amend the first by striking out the name of Archibald Dixon, and inserting Charles S. Todd, supporting the amendment by the yeas and nays.

This motion was opposed by John A. McClung, and Henry Waller, each of whom addressed the meeting in favor of the resolution as reported.

The question, having then been submitted, was decided in the affirmative, by the yeas and nays.

Before any vote was taken on this proposition, upon the motion of several individuals in the meeting, the second resolution was amended, by adding the following proviso, to those therein designated, to wit—Harrison Taylor, W. R. Beatty, Marshall Key, Joseph Forman, Michael D. Lamb, Thomas Duke, John Curtis, Benedict Kirk, Thomas Forman and E. P. Lee.

The resolutions, as thus amended, were adopted, and are as follows: 1. Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting, Archibald Dixon is preferred, by the Washington precinct, as the Whig candidate to be elected Governor; but our delegates shall be left at liberty to exercise their sound discretion, to select another candidate if it is necessary or expedient to do so.

2. Resolved, That the Whigs of this county, in the opinion of this meeting, Charles S. Todd, Harrison Taylor, W. R. Beatty, Marshall Key, Joseph Forman, Michael D. Lamb, Thomas Duke, John Curtis, Benedict Kirk, Thomas Forman and E. P. Lee, be appointed delegates to represent this precinct in Convention; and that each delegate be authorized to appoint a substitute, in case he should be unable to attend.

3. Resolved, That, in the opinion of this meeting, the Whig members of the Legislature shall, as early a day as practicable, designate some of their precinct in Convention; and that each delegate be authorized to appoint a substitute, in case he should be unable to attend.

On the motion of F. T. Chambers, the following resolution was then adopted: Resolved, That, in the opinion of this meeting, it is expedient that we should expect to carry a greater relative strength (in proportion to the size of the precinct) into the Convention, than the other precincts of this county, which may have fewer delegates.

On the motion of John A. McClung, it was Resolved, That the Mayville Eagle and Herald be requested to publish these proceedings.
