Forger Gets 5 Years Six Night Riders Sentenced to Death

In Person of Former Assistant Auditor and Claim Clerk, **JUDGE C. E. BOOE**

And the Noted Kentucky Politician Immediately Begins to Serve His Prison Sentence.

34 INDICTMENTS YET FOR TRIAL

At 5 o'clock last Friday Judge C. E. Booe, former assistant and claim clerk, who robbed the State of Kentucky of over \$40,000, was taken to the penitentiary to begin serving his five years sentence ruled upon him by Judge Stout the same day after the charge of forgery; the defendant waiving arraignment, confessing guilt and asking the mercy of the court.

He was sent to the bath house and given a suit of stripes like the other prisoners. He will be assigned to some position in the clerical department by the contractors of the prison labor.

Judge Booe came into the courtroom accompanied by his attorney and claim clerk, who robbed the State of Kentucky of over \$40,000, was taken to the penitentiary to begin serving his five years sentence ruled upon him by Judge Stout the same day after the charge of forgery; the defendant waiving arraignment, confessing guilt and asking the mercy of the court.

Auditor James was paid \$2,000 and Auditor Hager \$1,488 Thursday. This covers his thefts during the first three months of Hager's administration and his ten months under James. Suits have been prepared and were entered Saturday against the estate of Auditor Coulter for the amount stolen under his administration and against Hager for amounts stolen from the state under him. Judge Stout ruled that the trials on the other indictments should be passed until the April term of court. It is understood that an agreement has been reached between the commonwealth and the attorneys for Judge Booe that he shall be given fifteen years in the penitentiary.

A. W. KOZEE DEAD.

A. W. Kozee, well known as "Uncle Wiley," died at the home of his nephew, John Everman, three miles north of town Tuesday morning at two o'clock, from blood poisoning, superinduced by gonorrhea, from which he had suffered many years. Mr. Kozee was sixty-one years of age, and a most honorable and upright citizen. He was Deputy County Clerk at the time of his death and was making his home with County Clerk James Falls, at his town residence.

He became very sick on Monday, the 28th ult., and was taken to his nephew's home next day to pass through his final unsuccessful fight with death. During his life he had filled many places of trust, that of a politician, who was respected and in every instance given entire satisfaction. He had, at different times in life, filled positions as clerk and manager in general stores, bookkeeper in bank, assistant postmaster, Justice of the Peace, etc., to his own credit and to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Uncle Wiley, as he was familiarly called, was never married, and never affiliated himself with any particular religious organization, but was a sober, upright citizen of excellent morals.

His remains were laid away to wait Gabriel's call, in the Everman burying ground, where many relatives and friends drew near to take a last long farewell. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. G. W. E. Wolford, whose earnest words went straight to the hearts of his audience. This paper understands that Squire Kozee was a comparatively wealthy man, and that his nearest relatives are two half-brothers living at Wheelersburg, Ohio, and several nieces and nephews living in Carter county. "Uncle Wiley" was well known almost over the entire county. He was bookkeeper for the Olive Hill National Bank, here, for several months. Many will reflect of his death with sad hearts and the feeling of the loss of so good a man and so popular for his unexcelled morality and ideal citizenship.

Jury Says Six Must Hang For Murder of Capt. Rankin.

TWO GET 20 YEARS EACH.

Convicted Were Handcuffed and Taken to Prison Under Heavily Armed Military Escort.

THEY ARE REFUSED A NEW TRIAL.

Death to six convicted night riders, twenty years imprisonment for two and an emphatic denial for a new trial is the mandate of Judge Jones in a sentence handed down last Saturday at Union City, Tenn., in the trial of eight night riders for the killing of Capt. Rankin. Friday, February 19, 1909, is the date set for the execution. Sentenced to death: Garrett Johnson, Sam Applewhite, Tid Burton, Roy Ransom, Arthur Clear, Fred Pinion.

Twenty years' imprisonment: Bud Morris, Bob Huffman. Court convened Saturday to hear the argument for a new trial. Counsel for the defense introduced several witnesses to substantiate the various grounds of their motion. Judge Jones listened attentively to the testimony. The question of the competency of the jury panel was withdrawn by counsel for the defendants.

The court said it was firmly of the opinion that all evidence introduced at the trial was competent. Judge Jones continued: "I said some time ago to the grand jury that it was a sad, sad day when these men left their quiet homes, that their wives had not taken them around the neck and pleaded with them for God Almighty's sake to stop and not band themselves together for such unholy acts; that the evidence in this case is bristling with perjury, and the jury has returned into this court a verdict against Bud Morris and Bob Huffman of murder in the second degree, and which must stand.

"The jury has also returned a verdict in the first degree against six of these defendants, and in view of the manner in which the life of Quentin Rankin was taken I can see no mitigating circumstances in this crime. It was not done in the heat of passion, and has none of the elements of mitigating circumstances and that part of the verdict will be disregarded."

After a moment's breathless silence the court said: "Bud Morris, you will stand up." "It is the opinion that you be incarcerated in the penitentiary for twenty years and be deprived of your rights of franchise."

Bob Huffman next received the same sentence. Judge Jones, after a pause, continued: "Garrett Johnson, you have been tried on the charge of murder in the first degree. A motion for a new trial is overruled by the court. It is considered and the judgment of the court is that you will be remanded to jail until Friday, the 19th day of February, 1909, when you will, by the sheriff of this county, be hung by the neck until you are dead, and may God Almighty have mercy on your soul." The same judgment was pronounced on the remaining five defendants, convicted of first degree murder.

Counsel for defendants asked for a writ of error, and gave notice of an appeal to the State Supreme Court. Perfect silence prevailed in the court room during the pronouncing of the sentences. The defendants, each in turn, arose, pale and worn, and received the words of Judge Jones.

The court then directed the sheriff to see that the defendants be carefully looked after and a proper guard be supplied. Court then adjourned.

A THIRD BANK.

Last Monday was another banner day for Olive Hill in new business circles, when a meeting was held in the Stamper Opera House and a new bank was organized—the third bank for Olive Hill and the second banking institution organized here within the past thirty days.

The capital stock of this new bank was placed at \$15,000 divided into 150 shares of \$100 each, and upon there was an actual and active rush for the stock, which was wiped up like chaff before a wind. For a time there was great excitement and enthusiasm on the part of such an extreme that it became necessary for the chief promoter, A. J. Stamper, of this city, and J. P. Witt, also a heavy stockholder, to take hold of the "reins" and steer the meeting to quiet. It was explained that

the entire capital stock was given subscribed, or rather that to issue stock for the demand the capital stock would have to be raised to a high figure, that it would be impossible to supply all the stock in the institution that was wanted. We understand that some of the incorporators actually had to do some "whittling" on the amount of their stock in order to let a few shares out to the most enthused parties, and yet, we are told that something like twice the whole capital stock left the meeting in the form of disappointed and dissatisfied stock purchasers. However, the capital stock was held at \$15,000, authorized at \$25,000, and the following are the incorporators, except the last three, who are only stockholders, and the amount following their names represents the amount of their stock: G. A. Stamper, \$2,500; W. B. Stamper, \$2,500; J. P. Witt, \$2,000; W. B. Witt, \$2,000; R. A. Carpenter, \$1,000; N. D. Tabor, \$500; Geo. Rayburn, \$1,000; E. S. Hitchens, \$1,000; Willard J. Stamper, \$500; Mrs. A. J. Stamper, \$500; W. T. Christian, \$500; making the entire \$15,000 capital stock.

Mr. A. J. Stamper, the chief factor in the organization of this third bank, tells us that when the directors are elected, which date will be the fourth Monday in January, 1909, the capital stock will most probably be increased on account of accounts dating some who were so disappointed in their failure to obtain stock Monday, yet he does not say definitely that it will be done as the matter will be optional with the board of directors after their election. They will be chosen from among the incorporators.

It is the intention that all the stock shall be paid in immediately and at one time and that the institution will open for business so soon as a suitable location shall have been agreed upon and fixtures received. The corner of the Stamper Hotel on Cross and

Front streets seems to be the most favorable location at present and will most probably be the home of the new bank. It is a concrete building and well suited and convenient for the business.

That nothing of any of the incorporators or stockholders is to be exempt but is to stand back of the bank as security of the depositors and those dealing with the institution, it is needless to say, will add untold prestige to, and confidence in, the institution, but we cannot speak of this with exact authority. We asked Mr. Stamper concerning this in particular and he replied that he did not deem it pertinent to allow anything that the public would consider "boasting" or "flattering" to the new venture for publication, but as he made no further statement we feel free in saying that such is true, and that means several millions lack of the venture, for the incorporators are among the richest men of this section and with this guarantee would be sound as the government.
