Officials Commit Outrage, At Least Against Drinkers

It was enough to make a drinking man cry! Saturday afternoon was hot, dry and dusty. The temperature had soared to its highest mark of the year, well above 90 degrees.

Although the spring foliage was well developed, it still wasn't heavy enough to give any real spring sun, determined, it seemed, to extract the maximum amount of moisture from both man and earth.

Up in small hollow, about 100 yards off Key, engaged in an activity which to the casual observer of the world.

Using hatchets, their hands, and nearby rocks, the four engaged themselves busily for the better part of the afternoon, sipping open cans, breaking bottles against rocks, or just generally hacking around on metal containers in cardboard cartons.

Their activity was carried out at the city dump, a top divide hill and only a short distance from the Morehead - Flemingsburg highway.

Two Arrested As Raids Net Beer, Whiskey, Wine, Gin

More than 1,100 containers of beer, and 103 half-pints of whiskey were confiscated here last week in two raids on alleged bootleggers.

Dehart was taken into custody Friday at "The Clock," a house three and one-half miles west of Morehead, and was placed under bond for a hearing on June 7. McClure was arrested Saturday at his residence near Sharkey, where the raiding officers found 171 cans of beer and 33 half-pints of whiskey.

He also entered a plea of not guilty and was held for June 7 hearing.

Cooperating in the two raids were State Police and the Sheriff's Department.

Rowan County recorded its second traffic fatality of 1965 Friday when a car struck and killed John B. Kidd, 33, south of Morehead.

Kidd, who was on crutches, apparently died instantly about 11 p.m. when a car operated by Barry Douglas Forman, 18, of Morehead, struck him near the State Highway Department garage about one and one-half miles from Morehead on Ky. 2.

Kidd reportedly had left a bar at the intersection of U.S. 2 and Ky. 2, and was walking south when a car struck and was driving north and met a car which temporarily blinded him.

Clearfield Woman Improving After Injuries By Car

A Clearfield woman, on her way home from work at the Morehead Company, was critically injured Monday when she struck by a car on West Main Street.

Investigating officers said Mrs. Betty Carpenter, about 33, was in a crosswalk near the intersection of West Main and the Upper Sandusky, O., when the automobile driven by Rose Fiddler Jr., of Louisville, a Morehead State College student ran into her.

Mrs. Carpenter's head struck the windshield of the compact car, shattering the glass, and she was thrown 57 feet from the point of impact, Patrolman Chester Lewis said.

The mishap happened about 4:52 p.m.

Mrs. Carpenter was taken to St. Clair Medical Center where a hospital spokesman said Wednesday that her condition was fair, after having been declared critical for two days.

She suffered a back injury and severe lacerations of the face.

Fiddler told officers he was driving west at about 15 miles an hour.

Eastbound traffic had halted for Mrs. Carpenter in the crosswalk, but Fiddler told officers he did not see the woman until an instant prior to the car's impact with her. There were no skid marks at the scene.

The accident happened in brackets. The woman was hit practically head-on, Lewis said.

Nine-Shot Gun Emptied At Edsell Weaver

Fleming County man was reported in good condition this week after being shot five times by his brother-in-law at a drive-in restaurant and one-half mile north of Morehead.

Edsell Weaver, 28, of Flemington Landing, was hit once in the leg and hip when the brother-in-law, Mickey McKee, about 20, opened fire, emptying a nine-shot .22 caliber pistol, State Police said.

The incident happened outside the Pat and Mice Drive-In about 1:30 a.m. Sunday.

McKee fled the scene. Senior State Police Detective Robert L. Stamper said, but surrendered to the Morehead Post about 2 a.m. Sunday.

He was arraigned before County Judge W. C. Flannery and was released under \$5,000 bond.

McKee allegedly fired the shots to a distance of about 10 feet after Weaver had started toward McKee's car. Officers said trouble had erupted between the two prior to the Sunday shooting.

According to statements taken from the two men, McKee had cursed Weaver and called him names and Weaver had started toward his brother-in-law's parked auto when the shooting began.

Sweeper Bid Study Slated By Council

City Council received and took under study, Tuesday two bids for the purchase of a street sweeper.

Cardinal Cartier Co. agreed to provide a unit for \$8,475.20, plus sales tax, while Rudd Construction and Equipment Company asked \$9,480 plus tax for its sweeper.

Council decided to hold a decision in abeyance while the bids were gone over more thoroughly.

A decision was made to build sidewalks on the east side of Elizabeth Street providing property owners will donate rights-of-way for the project.

Art J. Bowne, who has previously served 14 years on the Morehead Utility Plant board, was named to that body by council, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Clay Stuedeman.

Bowne was not reappointed in March and has been off the board since that time.

Council did not come to a decision on a replacement for Stanley Casaday on the City Tax Equalization Board. Casaday had been appointed last month, but declined to serve.

There are 15 Red Cross chapters and 102 community, military and veterans hospitals in Kentucky participating in the Red Cross Blood Program. Breathitt said, through regional blood centers in Louisville, Huntington, W. Va. and Nashville.

In the past year Red Cross regional centers provided 44,184 units of whole blood to patients of Kentucky hospitals without charge for the blood itself.

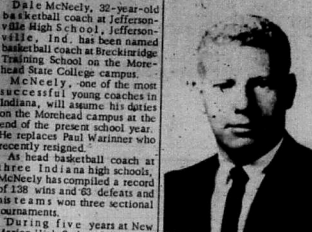
Bemie Schreuder, camp director of the Frenchburg Conservation Center of the Job Corps, released the following information on the center being established along highway 77 on Tar Ridge.

He has been in custody since Mar. 16 after being arrested at West Liberty. At first it was thought that the women had burned to death, but a pathologist established that both victims had been slain with shotgun pellets.

Immunization Level Here Ranks Above Nearby Counties

Although Rowan County's immunization level has been rated relatively low by standards applied in a recent sampling, the county doesn't fare too badly when compared with at least two nearby counties which have been surveyed since December, 1963.

Whereas Rowan County's rate of protection against polio by Sabin's vaccine stands at about 45 percent of the 0-39 age group, only slightly over 35 percent of neighboring Lewis County's populace has been given this same protection.

Records at the Rowan County Health Department show that 17,765 doses have been administered by that unit, while the remainder have been given by private physicians.

At the same time, the Health Department records show these figures for other immunizations given there since 1957:

A Health Department spokesman said this week that a major part of the problem which contributes to the low immunization rate here is the failure, or refusal, of parents to permit immunizations in the schools.

Of a potential 1,700 children in the Rowan County system who could have received certain shots this year, only 820 did. Permission was not received by school officials from the parents of the other nearly 900.

Although state law requires certain immunizations before children can attend school, the law apparently is not being enforced stringently here.

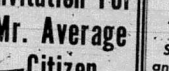

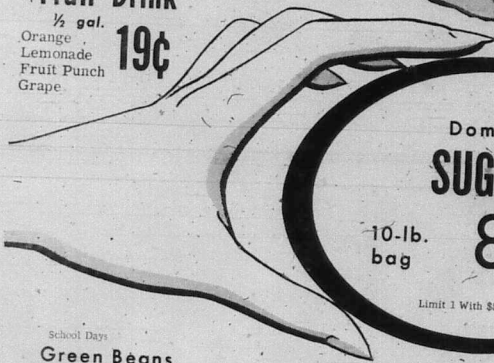
