



Speech of Mr. Calhoun, In the Senate of the United States, January 4, 1848, upon his Resolutions.

Resolved, That to conquer Mexico and to hold it as a province, or to acquire it as a territory, would be inconsistent with the avowed objects of the settled policy of the Government...

Mr. CALHOUN said:—In offering, Senators, these resolutions, I have not been governed by the reasons which induced me to oppose the war, and by the same considerations I have been guided in my attitude to my opposition to the war...

When I suggested a defensive line, at the last session, this country had in its possession, through the means of its arms, ample territory and stood in a condition to repel any aggression...

In offering a defensive line, I did it because I believed that in the first place it was the only certain mode of terminating the war successfully...

Now Senators, I have asked that which has caused this complete disturbance of the views of the Executive for which men and money were granted...
